Smokefree zones extended

All Rotorua sportsgrounds, skate parks, bus stops and shelters are becoming smokefree zones under Rotorua Lakes Council's extended Smokefree Outdoor Spaces Policy.

Counting down to the Government's goal of New Zealand becoming a smokefree nation by 2025, these outdoor spaces are being added to the current list of smokefree zones in Rotorua as phase one of the policy.

The policy is to be implemented in two phases over two years.

Rotorua Lakes Council will launch phase one on Wednesday [22 February] at the Arawa Street bus stop in the inner city. Staff will be there from 3pm - 5pm.

"We want to create a positive and safe environment for young people," says Rotorua Lakes Council Strategic Development Manager, Rosemary Viskovic.

That is one of the messages council staff will be sharing at the launch on Wednesday, along with a free sausage sizzle, banners and giveaway goodies like pens, bottles, cups and balloons.

Phase one also includes no smoking at the i-Site and library surrounds, Rotorua International Stadium, all youth spaces and all council-controlled reserves and parks. Phase two, which will start in January 2018 will include outdoor paved eating places, Eat Street, inner city markets and entrances and exits of public buildings and facilities.

The Smokefree Outdoor Spaces Policy has been developed in partnership with local health and community organisations with a vested interest in the policy.

“Rotorua Lakes Council was one of the first to make local parks smokefree and it’s great to see the council is now extending its policy to include a wider range of public places,” Toi Te Ora, Public Health Service Medical Officer of Health, Dr Phil Shoemack says.

“This will help children to grow up in a smokefree community.” Healthy Families Rotorua manager Mapihi Raharuhi says one of the desired outcomes is to ultimately prevent the uptake of smoking now and in future generations by minimising the exposure to our tamariki (children).

“This policy is one of many strategies that can help achieve that and we’re looking forward to sharing that message at the launch on Wednesday.”

Council has had a Smokefree Outdoor Spaces Policy since 2008 and in recent years there have been approaches to Council requesting an extension of the coverage areas. A 2015 survey reinforced public support and in December 2016 Council approved extending the policy to include additional smokefree zones.

New (phase one) smokefree zones launching 22 February 2017 include:

- * All bus stops and shelters
- * i-Site and library surrounds, including Jean Batten Park
- All sports grounds
- * Rotorua International Stadium
- * All youth spaces and skate parks
- * All council-controlled reserves and parks including lakefront reserves

January 2018 (phase two) smokefree zones to include:

- * Outdoor paved eating places
- * Eat Street
- * Markets held in the inner city
- * Entrances and exits to public buildings and facilities used by the public

Currently smokefree:

- * Council-managed Tokorangi Forest
- * Council-owned playgrounds
- * Rotorua Community Youth Centre Trust premises
- * Tennis facilities at Lynmore, Okareka and Manuka Crescent
- * Child Care Centres, including kindergartens, playcentres, creches and kohanga reo on council

Reserve land and immediate surrounds

- * Public toilets
- * Smallbone Park hockey turfs and Westbrook netball courts
- * Rotary Market at Kuirau Park
- * Council workplaces

FLU VACCINES

We still have **No Arrival Date** for the **FLU Vaccines** this year. However call the Medical Centre in the middle of March to check on the likely delivery date. If you are over 65 years of age you maybe eligible for a **Free Tetanus Vaccine** as well your **Free Flu Vaccine**- your nurse will check when you come in.

HUMAN PAPILLOMA VIRUS VACCINE (HPV)

From January 1 2017 this vaccine is funded for boys as well as girls aged 9 to 26 years of age. You may be starting to get information from schools as the public health nurses will be visiting to undertake vaccinations. This virus can cause genital warts, various cancers and other diseases. VACCINATE ON TIME

All childhood vaccines on the National Immunisation Schedule are **FREE** to **ALL CHILDREN** in New Zealand before they turn 18 years. All immigrant and visiting children are eligible for free immunisations and free Well Child Tamariki Ora services.

The first vaccine is at 6 weeks and at this age the Dr will also check babies general health. This is a very important appointment for baby and mum. 
Room 1-3 interviews: Parent-teacher interviews for Room 1-3 will be held on 5 & 6 April. Appointment times will be available later in the term.

Malcolm Lumsden: Who is the greater polluter, cows or people

Recently while I was in a shop doing business, a very self-righteous lady loudly pronounced that I was one of those irresponsible farmers who allowed their cows to "pee and poo" everywhere resulting in our rivers all being polluted, writes Malcolm Lumsden. I quietly replied to her that over her lifetime, she would pass as much pee and poo as a cow because she would probably live 11 times longer.

She would also use all manner of chemical substances for her health, washing herself, her clothes, and dishes, all of which would ultimately enter the water via sewage pond discharges.

As well she will send tons of toxic rubbish to landfills, and own vehicles that will pollute the roadside waterways with toxic residues. She was not impressed with my response. Our rivers were the most polluted in the world she retorted.

I reminded her that by international standards, the Waikato is the fourth cleanest river in the world. In fact I said, my dear old cow Daisy will on a really hot day only consume about 70 litres of water, compared with the urban average usage of 200 to 230 litres per human.

Our 6.4 million dairy cows only drink about 500 million litres per day compared with 4.5 million people using 900 million litres per day. Daisy I said, will spread her waste naturally on the soil where it will be filtered and used by plants.

On the other hand human waste gets piped away and will basically have the solids removed before being discharged into waterways, chemicals and all. Storm water is full of nasties from the concrete urban jungles and roads, and goes straight into waterways.

So why, I asked, are you picking on Daisy who lives a toxin-free lifestyle, consumes few resources, and discharges a pittance of what humans do into our environment?

Daisy I suggest is also more productive than most anti-farmer advocates.

Gasping for rebuttal, my lady then said we should become organic farmers. Look at Cuba, they are still growing food and have had no fertiliser for years. Well I responded, science says organic farming cannot feed the world and needs twice the land of modern farming to produce the same amount while being less environmentally friendly.

But I conceded I would be happy if she wanted to reduce her standard of living to that of the average Cuban with a rate of pay similar to those workers in Cuba. It would certainly reduce my rates bill.

As I walked away, I heard the man behind the desk say to the council lady, "You picked the wrong fella to have an argument with today."

I felt quite uplifted in the knowledge that the argument can be had. The fact is, most good urban folk only get one side of the story.

Urban businesses that have an impact on the environment will be next.

Wake up New Zealand, if agriculture is hobbled by this socialist madness, and New Zealand continues to bite the hand that feeds it, maybe life in Cuba may start to look attractive after all.

"Defrost the Bl&^%y chicken."





International Interest in Ngongotaha care Village

Whare Aroha CARE's CEO, Thérèse Jeffs, spoke about the care village the organisation is building on Tauki Street, Ngongotaha, at Alzheimer's Australia's Great Expectations research conference in Canberra last week.

Mrs Jeffs, CEO Whare Aroha CARE, was surprised to receive the invitation saying "when we started designing our village to give people with dementia a better life, we knew it would be transformational but it didn't occur to us that it would attract world-wide attention. It's very humbling that something we felt we had no other choice but to do is being held up as exemplary."

The Whare Aroha CARE Village under construction at Ngongotaha is modelled on the acclaimed De Hogeweyk dementia village and will be the first in the world to be built based on the vision of De Hogeweyk.

"Lots of people are interested in designing their aged care services around the De Hogeweyk vision but because it is yet to be replicated there is no blue-print for how to put it into practice. To transform the way people are cared for means evolving the whole system – from Ministry of Health contracts, to the design of the environment itself, to the daily tasks of our staff".

Mrs Jeffs has also been invited to speak on 'Designing for Quality' at the Australian and New Zealand Society for Geriatric Medicine Annual Scientific Meeting to be held in Rotorua in May. In February a delegation from Noosa Care in Australia visited Whare Aroha CARE to see the concept for themselves. When all stages are complete, the Whare Aroha CARE Village will look like a normal New Zealand town on a smaller scale.

It will have a supermarket, cafe, hairdresser and clubrooms on a street which flows down to the lakeside promenade. Spilling off the village centre will be 13 single-level 6 and 7 bedroom households that look like the range of New Zealand houses. Whare Aroha CARE is a community-owned not-for-profit charitable trust governed by Rotorua Continuing Care Trust.

If you see any car parked up at the cemetery at night just call the police as they not visiting their dearly beloved who have passed on. Be the last place I would be at night that's for sure. However, Since the trees were removed and new kerbing and channelling and roadways installed the idiots who in the past have done wheelies close to head stones and graves have decreased but vigilance by you is the word.

Facebook

I use this social network extensively to release items to friends and family and the community regarding matters relating to council and I find it excellent to explain what council's role is, in certain matters. The recent publicity by news hub on the house rentals a certain family in Rotorua who is charging in many people's view, is exhortation for homes people have labelled hovels isn't common place. However, the vast majority of landlords and there are thousands, are responsible landlords who do play by the rules. If you rent or lease a property you usually pay rent in advance and a bond of which must be lodged with the department of housing to hold in case of dispute or non payment of rent or damage detected at cessation of the rental period. Methamphetamine is a huge issue and I note many of the rental management companies are doing meth tests when a tenant leaves and before a new renter takes residents. The cost of someone cooking this crap in a house is devastating

to any homeowner or landlord. The cost of repair and insurance to cover the repair costs is extensive. This is but one factor why rents are increasing others are general insurance, rates etc. Denise and I sell many Tenanted Properties and in most cases the tenants treat the house as theirs and improve gardens and never miss a beat with the rent or reporting any issues. Landlords also have a role to ensure privacy and just can't turn up unannounced to view the property. Both parties have rights so check through department of building and housing if in doubt. Know your rights and responsibilities.

Health and safety - Just to clear things up, people can and have a right to live in filth not care for their gardens grounds have car bodies on their sections etc. however if people report seeing rats, mice or strong odours from rotting matter etc. then council environmental health officers can act on a complaint only. Also a government department Toi te Ora have a public health role to maintain through the medical officer of health and if you have any doubts or want to know what your rights are call them they are the old public health dept. the role of inspecting and licensing motels, hotels and accommodation providers was councils role but the government took that away from council a few years ago. Council has no right to enter private property without due cause or as set out in law like dog control, health and safety of food premises etc. everything council does is prescribed in law.

Fly dumping.

If you have rubbish to dispose of it is now user pay at the landfill and with the new recycling bins most household rubbish is dealt with. There have been teething problems yes and we have an assisted bin program for the elderly who don't have neighbours to help them get the full bins to the kerbside. Each case is determined on its merits. Also council will assist with bins for clubs and Marae to make sure they are assisted to recycle. However there is no excuse for flydumping and with the green waste people at Ngongotaha that is covered. contd overpage.....

Whitewater can be left free of charge at the Car body place in Riri st. Most other computer stuff, tvs etc can be left at the Recycling centre in Te Ngae Rd for a small charge. So there is no excuse. If you see a car with a loaded trailer heading north of Rotorua take the number plate (most phones have cameras) and if you want to follow at a safe distance. Do so. If you suspect they are pulling over to dump, call the police give them the number plate and trailer plate numbers and leave it to them. It is costing you hundreds of thousands a year to clean up to these pig's mess. There are now locals at Ngongotaha doing night shifts to catch the culprits. One must be a truck capable of dumping huge amounts they will be caught. Sad aye. We are onto them and I will name and shame them. I'd love to catch them put it on a trailer and dump it on their front lawn.

Council rates

Every three years council tenders out the provision of rateable valuations (commonly known as RVs) for every rateable property in the Rotorua district and it is a legal requirement. The company Land Mass from Tauranga have started the task as the new rateable valuations are sent out to every property owner usually in November of the year prior to the new RVs taking effect in this case on 1 July 2018. You have the right to appeal what valuation your property is given. At the 2014 valuation most properties in the residential areas went down by on average 15%, farming went up up to 80% and lifestyle stayed relatively stagnant however lakeside or riverside properties did go up by 10-15%. How much general rates (not fixed charges like rubbish, sewerage water and the UAGC) are effected by the rateable valuation. In the Rotorua district we are selling properties \$80-120,000 above the existing RVs on average. That doesn't mean to say you will get a rate increase, because if the average increase in RV is say \$85,000 and yours goes up \$200,000 then you will pay more general rates but if your RV only goes up \$60,000, below the average in the residential band of rateable properties then you will get a decrease. Interesting we never hear from people who's rates go down. It's a complicated system but no one has come up with a better way to fund local government via a land tax which is basically what rates are. Every property is rated, there are some that are statue barred from paying general rates by government legislation like schools, churches, Marae, government departments etc but they do pay fixed charges for sewerage, refuse, water (most on meters) on a user pay bases. None of DOC land or reading pays rates. Forestry pays very very little.

If you have any questions do not hesitate to ask on the council webpage which you can use to come direct to me on.

Community consultation.

You will get your say and have it on the ROTORUA Way on the website and you would have been consulted on access to footpaths etc for the disabled, and I thank progress Ngongotaha for being pro active in this. Also when the three year plan is developed you will be consulted on it and submissions will be heard by full council including the elected members of the Maori advisory committee and rural/urban community board members of the council committees. This I enjoy and gee I get peeved when I hear people say council doesn't listen. Oh we do listen but like all the needs in our community sometimes we have to say No and we can't give everyone everything. We have some major issues like sewerage we have to address asap as we have to be out of Whakarewarewa forest by 2019. Its going to cost tens of millions to upgrade the existing sewerage plant so the product coming out of it for discharge is more pure than the water coming down the Utuhina, Awahou and Hamurana rivers etc. The science tells us this can be achieved because like some local authorities, we can't treat sewerage to a good level it must be the very best level and we can't dump it at sea. I understand it will be drinkable.

Flooding in Parawai Road

Council is looking into the effectiveness of the Cesspit and the water levels in the drain across the road. I will keep monitoring to see what solution can be found.

BIG CONGRATS

In my role as a Councillor you get invited to some events that by being there and hearing the exploits of our young people you know the future is in capable hands. The impact of the people who share their knowledge about life and teach them the topics they choose to learn about is more profound than ever. Teachers are really the biggest influence on our kids and there are some top ones in the Rotorua area. I speak of WHHS. As I went to the annual celebration assembly representing the mayor (but I go anyway in my own right) to hear of the academic achievement, bursaries and scholarships the year 13s of 2016 achieved. It amazes me that these students have the time and are dedicated not only to their studies but sport and numerous opportunities they get to represent in overseas in sport. Mrs WRIGHT A TEACHER AND MENTOR of the senior pupils and who is very well liked by all students spoke of attitude and how that determines your own success. She is so right as there are huge opportunities to succeed and be whatever you want in a safe caring environment at school and those kids with parent and grand parent support regardless of socio economic grouping succeed. To Jim Gemmell principal of WHHS I can see the culture you and before you Mrs Pelham have created at WHHS is working. You obviously have a supportive board and senior management who allow you to as a team produce such outstanding results across years 11, 12 and 13 in NCEA. It was great to see Ngongotaha Mamaku Kaharoa and Hamurana kids featuring as top achievers. Long may this continue as the primary schools in our area give our young ones a great start. **Cr Charles Sturt**

KAHAROA SCHOOL ENROLMENTS

The Board invites applications from parents who wish to enrol their sons and daughters at Kaharoa School for Term 2 2017.

Enrolment at the school is governed by an enrolment scheme, details of which are available from the school office.

The enrolment period runs from 14 April 2017 to 7 July 2017.

The Board has determined a limited number of places are likely, at some year levels, to be available for out of zone students in this enrolment period.

The exact number of places will depend on the number of applications received from students who live within the school's home zone.

For students seeking enrolment within the enrolment period, the deadline for receipt of applications for out of zone places is 31 March 2017.

Written applications to The Board of Trustees for out of zone places should be made on the schools out of zone enrolment form and posted to the school office, 296 Kaharoa Road, RD6, ROTORUA 3096 or e mail principal@kaharoa.school.nz

Applications from out of zone students will be processed in the following order of priority:

- First priority will be given to students who have been accepted for enrolment in an approved special programme (This category is not applicable at our school).
- Second priority will be given to applicants who are siblings of current students.
- Third priority will be given to applicants who are siblings of former students
- Fourth priority will be given to applicants who are a child of a former student.
- Fifth priority will be given to applicants who are either a child of an employee of the board or a child of a member of the board.
- Sixth priority will be given to all other applicants.

If the number of out of zone applications exceeds the number of places available, students will be selected by ballot. If a ballot is required it will be held on Monday 3 April 2017.

Parents will be informed of the outcome of the ballot within three school days of the ballot being held.

If you live in the home zone and have not yet signalled your intention to enrol your child, please contact the school immediately to assist us to plan appropriately.


This year we have the Life Education team with us at the start of term two, this will be part of our class programme and will tie into our science theme of survival – what do I need to survive?

CHOW CHOW

- 800 g Onions, peeled and chopped
- 800 g Cucumbers, roughly chopped
- 800 g Green beans, topped and roughly chopped
- 800 g Cauliflower, leaves removed, roughly chopped
- 800 g Green tomatoes, roughly chopped
- 200 g Salt
- 1 kg Sugar
- 2 Tbsp Mustard seeds
- 2 tsp Black pepper, ground
- 900 ml White vinegar
- 2 Tbsp Turmeric powder
- 2 Tbsp English mustard, dry

$\frac{3}{4}$ cup Cornflour

Place vegetables into a large pot and cover with water. Sprinkle with table salt and leave overnight. Strain liquid from vegetables the following day then add sugar, mustard seeds, black pepper and 600ml of the vinegar and bring to the boil over a high heat. Reduce heat to a simmer and cook until vegetables are tender. In a small bowl, mix remaining vinegar, turmeric, dry English mustard and cornflour together. Slowly pour the cornflour mixture into the pot, continuing to simmer and stirring until pickle starts to thicken. Add a little more cornflour, mixed with water, to the pickle if more thickening is required. Adjust seasoning to taste and bottle immediately in hot, sterilised jars.

The dignity, pride and respect has grown from being part of these events.” As well as many other neighbourhood projects the Neighbourhood Matching Fund has helped support 12 community gardens around the district. To meet the funding criteria, Parks Week events must; - be located in a park or reserve in Rotorua; - focus on celebrating or promoting the park; - be open to the community; - be free to attend.
