It is so good to be home!

I apologise now if there are any errors in this newsletter, as I am horribly jet-lagged having just returned from a "whistle-stop" tour of Italy, Paris overnight, London, Hong Kong and home all in 18 days.

The trip didn't get off to a very good start as we had two aborted "take-offs" with Cathay Pacific in Auckland, a bit scary to be flying down the runway, about to take off and on went the brakes, not once but twice. The pilot first said we were on the wrong runway, then the next excuse was luggage hold wouldn't close properly, third excuse was engine trouble.

This not only happened once, but twice eventually Cathay accommodated 200 passengers at a hotel in Auckland. After most of us refusing to fly on that plane again, our Travel Agent got us on to Emirates so instead of flying via Hong Kong, we flew Sydney, Dubai and then Rome, losing about 3 days of our itinerary. All was not lost because we never missed anything that was planned.

The trip was with Rotorua Intermediate following the Maori Battalion through Italy ending at Monte Cassino.

Three Cemeteries were visited where we laid poppies on the NZ Soldier's graves. Faenza, an International Cemetery in Firenze or Florence and finally Cassino. To anyone who has Whanau buried there, please take comfort in the fact that they are all well looked after. The cemeteries were immaculate. We visited some incredible Cathedrals in Firenze plus the Ponto Vecchio which was the only bridge that the Germans didn't bomb as they needed access to Firenze, BUT our Maori Battalion thwarted that plan and saved Firenze. Another highlight was visiting the Vatican City, the Sistine Chapel and of course St Peters, of course the Coliseum was also another must. Formia was by far my favourite as our hotel was opposite the Mediterranean sea, where everyone went swimming. Beautiful views, the only blot on the landscape was an American Naval Base on a very desirable piece of land. From here they launch any attacks for example when war broke out in Bosnia. Formia is of course within easy driving distance of Cassino which was where I had an Uncle wounded in the Rapido river, which now of course has been diverted. We visited the Monastery which was bombed and reduced to rubble by the allies as they believed this housed the Germans, but unfortunately this was not the case. Cassino was where we could see exactly what the Battalion faced. Huge losses. Loved Italy, and who would believe that all the hills around Italy are actually marble. We visited Montagna Spaccata, where legend had it that at the time of Christ's crucifixion he let out 7 screams, and 7 mountains around the world split in two. Montagna Spaccata was one such mountain, this was an incredible sight, and there were even Turke's hand prints still in the marble mountain where he reportedly held the mountain apart.

Only disadvantage with travelling around Europe, they are not into rugby but we managed to find a cafe who was showing the All Blacks playing Namibia, one downfall it was in Italian, but then that was even better than having to listen to Justin Marshall aye Charles.

Travelled from Italy to Paris, where the kids (young and old) visited Euro Disney, the Eiffel Tower and Louvre, Champs Elyse, and did an "illuminations of Paris" tour, spent one night, then the Euro Star to London. I was not looking forward to travelling under all that water, but you are actually only under-ground for about 1/2 hour. Amazing experience. Arrived in London, and you would not even know they were hosting the World Cup, apart from the fact that each car on the London Eye represented the countries participating.

Went to the amazing Lion King Show - fantastic experience, and as this was my second visit to London, I did the "shopping thing" rather than the "Tourist thing".

Left London for Hong Kong for even more heat but there was rain there as a typhoon had hit, so was a bit cooler, but still very humid. When the Typhoon hit, we thought great we are going to be delayed, like so many other people coming home, but for once we got away about a half hour late.

Weather wise, absolutely beautiful in Italy, bit cooler and windy in Paris, London cooler, but still warm for London.

There is no place like home and sure glad to be back.

So sad to hear of the passing of Mrs Palma Sturt - to Charles and Denise my sincerest condolences, and also to Judy Edmonds and Whanau on the passing of Paddy.

Hon Todd McClay
Trans-Pacific Partnership good
for Rotorua

Last week the largest free trade agreement in New Zealand's history was signed by 12 countries, totalling 36 per cent of the world's economy. The Trans-Pacific Partnership (TPP) has certainly had its detractors, but it is set to bring significant gains to Rotorua.

This agreement gives our exporters much better access to more than 800 million customers in Asia, North America and the Pacific, and is expected to add \$2.7 billion to our economy by 2030.

The TPP completely eliminates tariffs on all forestry products going into Canada, the United States, and Vietnam, and 69 per cent of the tariffs for products going into Japan. This will mean significant savings for the industry – estimated to be around \$9 million once TPP comes into force.

The deal also means that it makes far better sense to export value added processed products such as sawn wood, fibreboard, and builder's joinery. This has huge potential for more jobs and higher wages in Rotorua.

TPP is also a good deal for the sheep and beef industry. Savings for the industry thanks to TPP are expected to be around \$59.8 million for beef farmers, and \$2.6 million for sheep farmers – all of which goes back into our economy.

We are a small nation that relies on trade with the world. This deal is a game changer for New Zealand, and not being part of it would have been a missed opportunity. I welcome and celebrate its conclusion.

In 2011 Lions International President Wing-Kum Tan challenged Lions Clubs all around the world to plant over one million trees – taking up this challenge John Smale a member of Ngongotaha Lions came up with an idea to take the International President's dream and carry it a stage further, with the idea being to create a Lions' International Tree Grove in TECT All Terrain Park on State Highway 36 between Rotorua and Tauranga.

Ngongotaha Lions' Club members had spoken to the Management of TECT All Terrain Park and the response from them has been one of enthusiasm, being very pleased with the concept as it fits in with their plans. Since then other Lions' Clubs from the Bay of Plenty area have added their support to this project and a Steering Committee of members from other Lions' Clubs has been set up to oversee the development of the Lions Tree Grove. This area will be one of the places within the park that would be open to the general public and not just for club members of the other organisations who are users of the park.

The two and a half hectares would be planted with NZ Natives to increase the wild life and to include walking tracks and grassed areas to cater for picnics and places for children to be active in a safe environment. "The Lions' Tree Grove" will be available to all who wish to enjoy the beauty of NZ's flora and fauna.

The overall idea is to develop this area in perpetuity which will be known as "The Lions' Tree Grove."

It is expected that the development will take up to five years with ongoing maintenance. The land that is being developed is cut over pine forest. Tracks are being developed and the 4000 understory trees that were planted in August 2012 are growing well. In June 2013, 800 understory trees were planted with further plantings of canopy trees taking place in September 2013 and September 2014.

Tracks were upgraded and sealed in November 2014 making access to the Lions Tree Grove more user friendly.

In 2015 seats from Opotiki Lions have been positioned around the Grove and chicanes installed to restrict horses from entering and damaging the tracks.

The goal in 2016 is to grade and seed the grassed area thus encouraging families to enjoy picnics and explore the Grove.

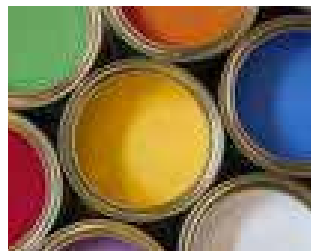

In my view.....

Council

Judge me by my actions. If anyone wants to see the facts on what any councillor is doing at any time in a committee meeting or at the full council meetings they are Live streamed. Go to Councils website and follow the link.

Recently Council signed off the Long term plan which sets out the debt reduction plan, the recent rates increase which while I did not want to support the increase to get councils spending and debt under control it was inevitable we had to increase the rates. Reasons include the need to treat sewerage and the issue that we can't spray irrigate after 2019 into Whakarewarewa Forest. The need for a sewerage scheme in Rotoma/Rotoehu which has to date cost us 4.3m with design and land issues having to be paid after the Environment court ruling and Land use changes required by EBOP Land plan and Water plan and the absolute waste of money in a so called joint marketing venture with Air NZ to promote the Rotorua to Sydney Flights etc etc. This is a one off increase and increases are planned to be returned to inflation next year and beyond. We must look at the positives Building consents up, Real estate Sales at record levels, new development i.e. Lynmore and Fairy Springs road, new logging operation at the old Tachykawa mill in Vaughan's Road and the revitalisation of the CBD, New Youth spaces in Mamaku, Koutu, Puketawhero park, New toilets at Puketawhero park, the purchase of a new cemetery land in Tarukenga, need to search for a new water supply for the Ngongotaha reservoir (if required), Gardens and parks etc. A Long Term plan as agreed too had heaps of submissions and while we can't appease all requests we have covered most bases. The rates increase on top of a RV increase for many has seen 50% get rate increases and 50% get decreases as its where the value fall. We helped in particular the farming community as there rates increases were unsustainable and that money has been spread across all ratepayers.

I supported a change in how council handles RMA Hearings with two independent Commissioners and a Te Arawa rep forming the hearings panel committee. The Planning policy matters are only decided by councillors who have to be trained at extreme costs. The independents are career planning hearings people who are experts in their field. We have always heard the big barrier to Rotorua is nothing happens unless Maori are on board and to a certain extent that's true as they are major land owners so the inclusion of a Te Arawa rep makes sure the costly lessons of the Rotoma/Rotoiti Environment Court ruling which cost you and I millions will not happen again. This is risk management and best practice.

The people who read this know who to come to if they have an issue involving council sorted and I do not 'run with the Hares or hunt with the Hounds' and I will not tolerate Racism, Bullying or any change that is not inclusive and in the best interest of the whole district. Personal attacks are treated with contempt but I won't tolerate a subversive campaign to undermine the standing of the Mayor, Councillors and more importantly Rotorua and District. Look in the mirror and say have I done something that will improve the perception of Rotorua and can I focus on the positive today. We are so lucky to live in paradise here in a district that has everything except Tsunamis, major threats from floods and has an abundance of water, the great outdoors and have a great place to bring up your children or grandchildren.

Feedback from 195 residents on inner city parking changes

Rotorua Lakes Council received written feedback from 195 residents on changes proposed for inner city parking, during a public consultation period which closed last week. Council Transport Solutions Director Stavros Michael said staff were currently working their way through the feedback forms to analyse comments before cost/benefit assessments could be undertaken.

The parking proposals had been put forward by the Inner City Focus Group's Block Champions and were open for public comment for a month. They follow a two-year rolling trial of various parking arrangements in the inner city area.

The Block Champions recommended that all existing 90 and 60 minute free parking along the length of Tutanekai Street become 60 minute free parking, along with shorter adjacent sections of Arawa, Haupapa, Pukuatua, Hinemoa and Eruera streets. In the remaining sections of the five cross streets motorists would be allowed to park for up to three hours at \$1 an hour.

The group also recommended the council's Pukuatua Street Carpark Building have no time limits, and parking be \$1 per hour with a maximum of \$4 per day for casual parkers and \$2 per day for concession holders.

Mr Michael said information compiled from public feedback would form part of a report to be considered by the council's Strategy, Policy & Finance Committee at its 4 November meeting.

Recommendations from the committee would then go to the next full council meeting for final sign-off he said.

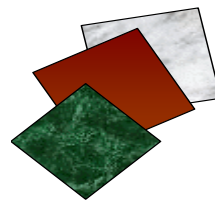

The long, winding, remote, Dansey Road seems to encourage speeding, occasional dangerous overtaking and most irritating of all a compulsion to jettison rubbish along its entire length. Then when the culprits reach the village instead of decelerating they drive Tarena Street as if it were an open-plan speedway! 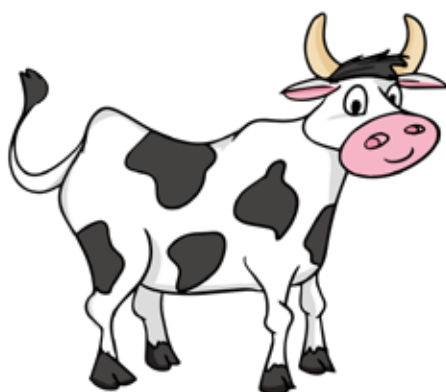
