
Cost of Living Payment

The total Cost of Living Payment is \$350 which will be split into 3 monthly payments starting 1 August.

For most people, the 3 main payment dates are:

- 1 August 2022 \$116.67
- 1 September 2022 \$116.67
- 3 October (the first business day of the month) \$116.66.

Age Concern news August

I have been away from work with Salmonella which took 11 days before I started to feel better. During that time, I was able to do limited work from home, but it was quite debilitating.

I read where there is a particularly terrible strain of stomach bug doing the rounds and those people who have been unfortunate enough to catch it have really suffered, some up to 6 or more weeks. It is very contagious and can be caught in several ways from surfaces and airborne particles. Hygiene is most important and having suffered a stomach bug I would not wish this on anyone. Some people are even saying it is worse than COVID and the symptoms last longer.

The good news is that we are beginning to make good progress on our tiny homes project. Sigma Consultants have been employed to do all the preliminary work and they have come up with some designs for the layout of the homes which our Age Concern Council are happy with and will be submitted to the Rotorua Lakes Council, along with foundation plans for Consent. Once the RLC give the go ahead we will inform our preferred builders to begin, and the building process can take up to 2 or 3 months. We already have several people who have expressed an interest although we have not opened it up yet.

Another event being organized by Age Concern is The Positive Ageing Expo which will be held on 24th September at Parksyde. This will be a similar format to the Expo we held last year and to date we have about 26 interested groups who would like to be involved. The event will be free entry and free to all the not-for-profit groups who deal with elderly and wish to take part.

The population of New Zealand is ageing rapidly. Around 80 people a day are turning 65, meaning in six years, New Zealand could see more

than a million older people. The latest population projection figures from Stats NZ show there are currently around 842,000 people aged 65-plus - and this is expected to hit a million by 2028.

An ageing population presents unique challenges. While population ageing is not new, it will really accelerate over the next decade. The increasing number and proportion of older people in the population has implications across New Zealand's society.

As Aotearoa's population ages, the proportion of old to young changes with it. By 2028, there could be 30 people aged 65+ years for every 100 people aged 15–64 year and by 2050, this could be as much as a 40/60 split.

The number of people aged 85+ years is also increasing, with about 93,000 people currently in this age group but by 2025 it is expected there will be more than 100,000. This will also increase the elderly's representation among the general population. Currently 1 in 50 people in the population are aged 85+ years and this could increase to about 1 in 30 during the 2030s, and to about 1 in 20 in the 2040s.

Helping older people to work if they want to and countering ageism are key aspects of the Government's plan to support New Zealand's ageing population. The strategy, called Better Later Life – He Oranga Kaumātua 2019 to 2034, was launched and aims to ensure older people can participate in society and be valued as they age. It has also been designed to ensure New Zealand is prepared for and makes the most of our ageing population.

By 2034, 1.2 million New Zealanders - about a quarter of the population - will be aged 65+, and an estimated 179,000 people will be aged 85+, twice as many as last year. The number of Māori aged 65+ will more than double (from 48,500 to 109,400) between 2018 and 2034, as will the senior Pacific population (from 21,300 to 46,700), (continued on p7)

while the number of senior Asian New Zealanders will almost triple from 59,500 to 171,900). Seniors currently make up around 6.2 per cent of the workforce, but that is expected to grow to 10.6 per cent by 2033.

One of the other very important and valuable programs that Age Concern provide is Staying Safe, which is designed to bring elderly drivers up to date with the Road Code and defensive driving.

So far 209 people have died on New Zealand roads this year and a quarter of them are aged over 60.

Statistics show our older generation is more likely to be involved in a fatal crash - or one that involves injuries - than our younger drivers.

Fifty drivers aged over 60 have already died on our roads this year, that's more than twice the number of drivers aged between 15 and 19 and also 20 and 24.

Senior drivers actually crash less than junior drivers - other factors are they probably drive less and in better conditions. But what is true is when senior drivers have an accident, they are more vulnerable and likely to be injured more. Once Kiwi drivers reach the age of 75, they have to renew their licence and a medical certificate is required. From the age of 80 their licence has to be renewed every two years.

But driving means independence and, understandably, our older Kiwis are reluctant to give that up.

There are options. Driving Miss Daisy is a nationwide taxi service that focuses on the elderly. Age Concern also provides a service called Total Mobility where clients are assessed for half price taxi fares and this includes Driving Miss Daisy.

More health workers for Rotorua and the Bay of Plenty

Help is on the way with our Labour government taking new steps to boost the health workforce and ease pressure on our local health system.

Since we came into office in 2017, we've made building our health workforce a priority. Thousands more doctors and nurses are now working in the system and more nurses are being trained. We've also changed immigration rules to make it easy for health workers to come here.

However, with the worst flu season ever and COVID-19 putting pressure on systems, we know we need to do more. So, I'm excited that our Labour government has announced new initiatives to grow our health workforce.

We're making it easier and cheaper for international health workers to get professional qualifications recognised. We're providing up to \$10,000 to support overseas nurses with registration costs, and covering international doctors' salaries during induction courses and training internships. We're establishing a one-stop recruitment service within Health New Zealand, to make it easier for health workers to move here and find jobs.

We're also focused on our homegrown workforce. We're providing financial support to help New Zealand nurses get re-registered. We're training more doctors, nurses and radiographers, and encouraging our many volunteer COVID-19 workers to consider a health career.

Initiatives like these weren't possible under the old structure with 20 district health boards all working separately. I know that there isn't a quick fix, but these measures will help ensure we have more health workers here in Rotorua to look after us and our families when we need it the most.

Parent/Teacher interviews -



VACCINATE ON TIME

All childhood vaccines on the National Immunisation Schedule are free to all children in New Zealand before they turn 18. All immigrant and visiting children can have free immunisations and free Well Child Tamariki Ora services.

The first vaccine is at 6 weeks and at this age the Doctor will also check mum and babies general health. This is a very important appointment for baby and mum. If you qualify, please contact the Surgery to book a nurse appointment to have the vaccination.

Earthquake and Fire Drill -

We continue this month holding regular Earthquake and Fire Drills to practice scenarios so we know what to do in the event of a real occurrence. Our children are becoming familiar with the procedures that will keep them safe.

ICAS Assessments -

These assessments have been developed for schools and they combine engaging content and high standards. Students can opt in

to sit these assessments which give students insights to improve learning and to reward academic excellence. This month students who choose to, will sit Science & Spelling assessments.





House Event -

Our students are divided into 4 house groups, Tui, Kokako, Kereru and Kahu. This month a house group activity will be organised by our senior students that will include all the children in our school.

Keeping Safe -

Is the housing market all that bad?

I periodically write about the state of the residential housing market when there's something worth writing about. And not in a long time have we seen such a roller coaster like we're seeing now. So what are we seeing in our office?

Well quite a bit of stress and nervousness actually. For a start, the numbers of property sales in Rotorua are around numbers not seen since the effects of the 2008 global financial crises — reportedly only 57 sales in June and 69 in July, including lifestyle properties. It's my personal view that the buoyancy of the housing market has a flow on effect to public confidence or nervousness flowing into household spending in general: buoyant housing market, open wallets - depressed housing market, wallets shut.

In the current climate everything is taking much longer to get over the unconditional line between LIM reports, building reports, and bank finance and valuation processes. We're also seeing the stress of buyers in escalating commitment cycles emotionally over-invested in a property because of the time taken to meet conditions and often \$2,000-\$3,000 sunk getting their conditions across the line.

This is exacerbated by the domino effect of buying and selling chains where every transaction is dependent on other properties in the chain going unconditional, and everyone is stuck in a holding pattern. We have clients who have elected to take risky short-term bridging finance or large loans from family to settle the purchase of their next 'dream' property before their current property has even sold.

One of our vendor clients is currently in the situation of having granted something like 8 extensions so far to their buyer. Why? Because there aren't any other buyers, their buyer's buyer is struggling meeting their own conditions, and everyone in the chain is trying to keep the transactions in bed.

So what's happening over with the banks? Bank lending has tightened significantly, including because of global events other than the Pandemic. It's no secret the financial sector knows an economic crunch will happen, and they're well aware of their banking code of conduct lending obligations that boil down to ensuring responsible lending so people aren't set up to fail when the market shifts. So lenders won't confirm finance approval for an on-purchase if an existing property isn't sold (in case it sells for less), and rarely will banks approve lending for purchase at auction either.

And yes, those media reports of banks trawling through bank statements asking about Big Box store and takeaway spending are true, no matter who the customer is. Because of lending difficulties we're hearing of open homes with either no buyers showing up, or very few at best. In short, buyers are simply not out there and can't just be 'magicked' up.

And then there's Vendors who sometimes have unrealistic expectations ranging from the worth of their property because a neighbour's sold for some inflated figure, or another agent did an appraisal a while back at the height of the market "so it must at least be that still", or they've have had their property listed for several months unsold and want to "fire the agent as they're useless and doing nothing". I have some sympathy for agents managing vendor expectations in these situations where there's a lack of familiarity with real estate market dynamics – particularly



in the current climate where there are very few buyers to begin with.

On the other hand, I know vendors are equally as stressed: they may need to move on if, say, they are stuck in bridging finance or a chain of buyers and sellers themselves, or moving out of town for work, or perhaps down-sizing into a retirement village. We are also seeing an increase in separations where people are finding they bought at the height of the market, and now there's no equity to divide so each can move on.

Overall, there is little that anyone can do right now but hurry up and wait, keep looking and planning, and be sure to get your ducks in a row so you're ready to make a move when the market turns. And remember to be kind: things are not what they were on a bunch of levels, and everyone is under pressure.

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It's becoming a buyers market!

How much deposit do you need to buy your first home?

If you have less than 20% deposit, you are referred to (by the banks) as a Low Equity (or Deposit) Borrower. You are required to meet a different set of criteria to borrowers with 20% or more.

The ideal deposit for any own-home purchase in NZ is 20% but typically, the minimum required is 10% for an existing property and in some rare cases 5% for a turn-key build. Note: your income needs to be very good for a 10% deposit but it is possible. You'll also need to explain why you haven't saved more on your good income (for example, you've been paying down debt).

If you meet the income criteria of the First Home Loan scheme which is administered by Kainga Ora, you only need a minimum of 5%. The rules have changed about lending to people with less than 20% deposit, and banks only have a certain amount of money they lend to low-deposit borrowers. Currently 10% of the money lent out can go to low-deposit borrowers. Borrowers with less than 20% deposit will need to have a higher income than those with more deposit.

The short answer is, main banks are still lending to low equity borrowers and it's well worth talking to a mortgage adviser to see if you meet the criteria. Even if your preferred bank isn't lending this week, they could free up some money at any point.

Can I be gifted my entire deposit or do I need savings?

The banks want to see that you are responsible with your money. If you have been renting and have not been able to save money, then are you likely to pay down your mortgage? Most banks, therefore, require that you have saved at least 5% of the purchase price – often referred to as "genuine savings". So, if you are buying a \$500,000 home, you would needed to have saved \$25,000 on your own. The rest of your deposit can be gifted by a parent. At the time of writing, one bank will allow a fully gifted deposit but responsible spending must be shown.

What counts as "genuine savings"?

- Money in the bank (obviously!)
- KiwiSaver including the amount received from the government and your employer.
- A bonus from your salary.

What doesn't count as "genuine savings"?

- Money available on your credit card. Some people try to withdraw it to use as a deposit. You can't do this!
- Debts that are being repaid unless you can prove the original loan and show an
 agreement.
- The First Home Grant. Note: The First Home Grant can be used as a deposit but doesn't count as part of the required "5% genuine savings".

Can I get a loan from my parents rather than a gift?

Yes, the money from your parents can be a loan. If there is interest to pay or regular payments to pay back the loan, this will be taken off your income so be careful around this. The terms and repayments for this loan will need to be clearly laid out for your mortgage application.

What are some tips for getting a mortgage with a small deposit?

- Keep your spending to a minimum. Banks prioritise giving mortgages to clients who are showing that they have their spending under control.
- Minimise your secondary debt and risk. Don't let the banks increase your credit card limit and don't take out any new lending.
- And finally, a number 1 tip! If you're a couple, bank at separate banks. Banks
 can often lend to their own customers first. But if you both bank with the same
 bank, you only have one option. If you bank separately, you now have 2 banks
 to work with.

Summary:

In summary, a 5% deposit is the minimum typically need for Turn Key construction lending and only in rare cases. 5% is also all that is needed for the First Home Loan scheme. A 10% deposit is typically the minimum required for existing homes. Most banks don't allow a pre-approval for low deposit borrowers so you have to have a conditional offer accepted on a property before you can apply. This means you are going to want to look for "offer" type sales rather than auctions. Otherwise, a 20% deposit is the best amount of deposit to offer the bank.

Three elderly men were relaxing on the beach in Pauanui.





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
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How to be Bee Friendly

When it comes to creating the perfect bee friendly garden, planting flowers that produce plenty of pollen and sweet nectar is a sure way to attract the humble honey bee.

It's also good to note that bees cannot see the colour red and prefer orange, yellow, purple, blue, violet and white.

Plant flowers such as:

Annual Flowers: Camellias, Borage, Sunflowers, Foxgloves, Cloves, Marigolds, Pansies, Daffodils.

Trees, shrubs, bushes, & climbers: Bottlebrush, Lavender, Rosemary, Wisteria.

Herbs & kitchen plants: Sage, Basil, Chives, Fennel, Squash NZ Native Plants/Trees: NZ Jasmine, Pohutukawa, Rewarewa, New Zealand flax (harakeke), Lemonwood, Hoheria, Tea tree.

To make your garden irresistible to honey bees, plant flowers in clusters of the same species and focus on plants with single flowers with flat and open shapes, rather than complicated ruffles of double or triple flowers. Your garden should also have a shallow water feature, like a bird bath or fountains with gentle sloping edges to encourage the bees to stop for a quick drink. Also be careful what you spray in your garden as most pesticides are lethal to bees. Opt for organic solutions where possible such as pyrethrum and only spray in the evening when bees have gone to bed.

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
