Young local man wins Harcourts Dancing for Hospice (Alternate Title: Wife Takes Big Risk!)

Teaching intern at Ngongotaha School, Talor Kahu and his dance partner Mahia Keepa-Hale recently won the Harcourts Dancing for Hospice contest. The Principal at Ngongotaha School, Craig McFadyen also danced in the contest, the evening raising \$130,000 for the running of the Rotorua Hospice.

Talor had always enjoyed dance as well as a variety of sports, but did not intend to participate in this event this year. His wife, Janey-Rose Kahu, however had other ideas. She signed him up and sent him along to the first session, without him knowing what the appointment was about! The challenge didn't stop there. He was partnered with Mahia, who is an active sportswoman, and rather than being assigned the vigorous dance style they preferred, they were directed to waltz, a much slower style than they would have chosen for themselves. Obviously though, they both met the challenge over the 15 weeks of training for the event.. Talor now really enjoys the waltz and is considering continuing dancing. He was impressed by the skills of the other couples, and said his and Mahia's dancing the night before would not have been a winning performance.



But, on the night, in front of a large audience including his family, he and Mahia found the impetus to impress the judges.

This is not the first challenge Talor has faced. At the age of 11, he was paralyzed for over 6 months from a rugby injury, and initially was not expected to walk again. However, he persisted with rehabilitation. When he began to recover, Buck Shelford visited him in hospital, and suggested he should try another sport. He went on to represent NZ, playing volleyball at a tournament in Myanmar in 2013. With his youthful experience in overcoming obstacles, it is not surprising that he was initially keen on joining the police, but decided that teaching would give him more opportunities to support young people at a face-to-face level (kanohi ki te kanohi), and Ngongotaha School suits perfectly, as he grew up here.

When asked what his advice to young people would be, it is to find your passion and follow it. Block out the noise from people around you, including your mates, if they try to distract you from what really matters.

It has been a very busy term, and we apologise that Kaitao Intermediate has not updated you recently on all the wonderful things that have been happening. Today's submission will briefly outline all the great initiatives and events that have dominated our time. I hope that you enjoy the update.

AIMS Games

For the first time in what feels like forever, the Association of Intermediate and Middle Schools (AIMS) games are back on. More than 50 students braved the elements and participated in hockey, badminton, rugby, soccer, and basketball. This is an elite tournament that attracts the very best in their fields from across the country. Our students demonstrated resilience and persistence throughout the week and walked away with lifelong memories. This could not have been achieved without the sacrifice of our coaches, all volunteers, and we thank them for their hard work and dedication.


Dyslexic learning

The Rotorua housing crisis has been decades in the making, but our Government have taken it seriously and I want to tell you about the real progress that we've made. There's a lot to be proud of that you might not know about.

- Rotorua secured \$85 million of funding from the Infrastructure Acceleration Fund, to enable local storm water solutions which will support 3,000 new homes to be built
- We have 300 public houses under construction. Together with the houses we've already built, that's over 500 new homes for families who will no longer have to rely on emergency motels
- Te Pokapū on Fenton St is a one stop shop for emergency housing grants – providing professional wraparound support and getting much needed data on those accessing support.
- The new Affordable Housing Fund supports not-for-profit housing providers to help by building more affordable rentals
- We've lifted price caps for First Home Grants and removed price caps from First Home Loans, to encourage more first home buyers.
- We've invested heavily in our roading infrastructure a significant upgrade to the Ngongotaha roundabout, redesign at the Lynmore roundabout, and \$35 million of road works along Te Ngae Road making our roads and paths safer and future proof.

There's definitely more work to do but I'm really proud of the progress that we're making for Rotorua. I hope you can share some of the good news about what we're doing.

Age Concern

It never rains but pours and following my bout of food poisoning, I tested positive for COVID. I was fortunate that I only had a mild dose which lasted a couple of days. I had both of my booster vaccine shots and I think that helped in my recovery. Despite the uncertainty around COVID, Age Concern continues to thrive and over the last year we have attracted about 100 new members which has put a strain on our core programs as we have not had many new volunteers sign up to be part of our visiting service.

We have had a change of staff at Age Concern with all of the original staff leaving for various reasons. Our new staff comprises of Karyn Rogers, who is the new Visiting Service coordinator and Staying Safe coordinator, Lisa Wilson who is our new Shopping Service Coordinator and Total Mobility Assessments, Diana Walker who is in a new position and deals with assessing the mental and physical wellbeing of our members and Kirsten Harman who is the longest serving new staff member and does the administration and SuperGold Skills coordination where retired tradespeople help out our members for a reasonable fee.

As mentioned previously we are not far off our Positive Ageing Expo which will be held at Parksyde on the 24th September from 9:30 to 2:30 with free entry. We have attracted over 25 stall holders who represent a wide range of different groups dealing with the elderly and some cross-over to other groups of people. There will also be entertainment throughout the day provided by local talent.

Our tiny house development has had a brief hold up while we deal with some LDC legislation prior to us getting resource consent. Sigma Consultants are doing this work for us and have developed some exciting plans for the complex. We have decided on three homes on the site and will be looking for support from various businesses to help us with the landscaping. (See bottom of p.9)

In the latest scam, vehicle owners are being targeted by scammers pretending to be from Waka Kotahi NZ Transport Agency. Waka Kotahi is encouraging people to be vigilant, because of a number of online scams targeting vehicle owners. The transport agency was aware of three scams that were targeting vehicle users. They included scammers pretending to be Waka Kotahi representatives and asking drivers to urgently renew their licenses, another saying the driver had overdue toll payments, and another claiming the driver was owed a refund.

Unfortunately, it's just the latest example from some very persistent scammers – using both fake vehicle licensing and driver's license reminder emails.



There has been a "frightening" increase in the size of home loans held by people aged over 65 and a rise in the use of reverse mortgages to clear them. There are now 134,000 mortgages on which money is owed by borrowers aged over 65, up from 118,000 in June 2018.

What is frightening is how much the value of mortgages has moved in the past five years. In June 2018, over-65s owed \$16.9 billion on their homes but that had risen to \$23.4b and the average owed had gone from just over \$143,000 to nearly \$175,000.

Exactly why there has been such a run-up in over-65 mortgage debt is a matter of speculation but some reasons could include life events like divorce throwing people on to tougher financial tracks, people who had used their homes as security for an investment property, or those who had extended their home loans to help their children on to the property ladder. The bank of mum and dad is a big one. People top up their mortgages to help the kids.

Whatever the reasons, a rising number of retiring people are turning to reverse mortgages to pay off their home loans. A reverse mortgage allows people to borrow against their homes but only repay the loan and accumulated interest when they eventually sell the property.





Solar panels & choosing wisely

Some clients called me recently, extremely distressed because they'd installed solar energy panels on their home a year ago with a 20-year rental lease contract and were now selling to move for work. The agent wanted a copy of their lease contract that they now couldn't find, nor the 'installation guy' to get a copy. That home solar system had quickly become a bit of a headache for them.

I confess I couldn't believe my ears when they told me about the 20-year rental lease contract. I was shocked and concerned that any consumers could be tied into a 20-year chattel payment agreement for anything other than a home mortgage loan. I did a bit of googling into home solar systems and quickly realised that the decision to install home solar systems is significant. Further, glossing over the finer details without doing your homework or properly understanding the scope of the contract could have significant future financial impact for consumers. I note Consumer New Zealand's website* also has a bit to say about this too.

It would appear there are generally two main options for home solar systems: buy outright or locking into a 20-year rental lease contract with little or no upfront cost + a monthly payment over the 20-year term.

Pros

Little or nothing paid upfront with monthly payments (some advertised in the vicinity of \$90/month) over a long term is an attractive financial option for some homeowners. On the other hand, if the system is purchased upfront, the homeowner owns it outright.

In my google travels, I also noted some banks are specifically offering short-term energy upgrade home loan top-ups at reduced interest rates, which could be worth finding out about if you're considering investing in a solar system for your home.

Cons


Firstly, if you choose the rental lease option, I'd point out that not even a car hire-purchase would ever be over such a lengthy term.

Secondly, any product warranty is only as good as the company who installed the system and/or the manufacturer even still being in business if the system needs maintenance or fails and needs replacing. Do your homework on the history of the business you're buying the system from, as well as the product manufacturer.

Third, technology moves so quickly it's difficult to know how solar technology will look or function in even a few short years from now, let alone 20. Is the system's payback time longer than its lifespan? Should part of the system or panels fail along the way or need upgrading, then what? And who pays if it's rented or leased?

Fourth, you might not even stay in your home for the next 20 years. In fact, Core Logic estimates most homes change owners approximately every 7.4 years! So if you choose the 20-year payment option, you'd need to convince the next owner to take over the contract. And whether you own or rent the system, if any new owner doesn't want to be burdened with it, you'll face the cost of removal and reinstallation elsewhere and/or being stuck having to buy out the remainder of your 20-year rental payments (ouch). Oh, and those holes in the roof where the panels were installed? They'll need to be properly fixed, too.

Fifth, if you go for the rental lease option, what does the contract say about any increase in monthly payment costs? Will it increase? By how much? Does that change if a new owner takes it over? The reality is no one knows what the cost of anything will be over a 20-year span, so how realistic is it to rely on claims or guarantees it won't increase?



Sixth, how realistic is it to rely on claims guaranteeing power savings, or statements on how much you might be able to sell your excess power to the grid for, and is that even financially feasible?

Installation of a solar system is a significant decision. Getting the system installed is just one part of a bigger equation. I recommend doing a lot of research into the pros and cons before committing. Also check out the Consumer New Zealand website* which has some good articles on things to think about when considering solar and the different types, too.

An Historic Event - The Ngongotaha Sheep Dog Trials

As is usual, we often find ourselves chatting enthusiastically with others in the community, about specific events and activities that have added that special something to the History of Ngongotaha. One particular memory has taken us back to the days of the 'Ngongotaha Sheep Dog Trials' which were last held back in 1965. We would really like to know more about the Dog Trials, so if this is a memory for you, please do get in touch.

We know that the Sheep Dog Trials were a regular event on the Ngongotaha Calendar and were held on the Northern side of Mt Ngongotaha. The trials were organised in the later years by Charlie Johnson's Team, who had picked up the mantle from locals such as; Jack Gear, Ben Dockett, Keith Martin, Billy Pompey-Rika who were the organisers and competitors of the trials, which they started in approximately the 1930's.

If you have knowledge of others that we have missed, -whether they be organisers or competitors - could you please forward their names to us, we would be grateful. It would also be appreciated to have the names of all of those wonderful women who worked behind the scenes, supplying lunches and those wonderful cups of tea, especially considering that the Club House was, of a rather primitive nature. (Would you have any photos please, preferably of the people, not the dogs)

Competitors would get quite hoarse, yelling and whistling at their dogs. Commands like 'get in behind!', 'go way out', 'steady', 'speak up', and sit, were heard and believe it or not, this was not at all confusing to the dogs, but certainly confusing to some of the crowd.

And on occasions after much yelling and whistling by the trialist and just when he got the sheep penned, the bell would ring, meaning the trialist was disqualified because time was up. To control his frustration, the competitor would raise his hat and acknowledge the crowd. To which the response was a jolly good clapping of the hands.

There were several events held, such as the The Long Lead for the eye dogs, and the barking Hunterways could be heard, pushing the sheep up the hill. This was a forerunner to the very popular televised Tux Dog

To get to the events, locals headed down SH5 and onto Paradise Valley Road (where the gravel is currently). After parking their vehicles, they and their whanau would track up the side of Mt Ngongotaha for the best vantage point. We know that the NZ National Dog Trials event was held there in the 1960's. But that is all we have.

These events were also an opportunity, for the wives to catch up on the hot gossip, while supplying the gents with cups of tea and lunches. Also, it was very much an outing for the Rural Ladies to catch up on the social events and happenings.

So, what social events and happenings do you know about, or have you been told by your parents, or grandparents?

P.S. How many of you have an old trophy still sitting on a mantle piece, or in that forgotten box? That Trophy, that you are not sure who it belongs to, or what to do with it, could be donated to our future Ngongotaha Life Memories Museum (Stage 3 coming to you soon). One such trophy is called the 'Ngongotaha Long Head Trial'.

What a wonderful feeling Spring is in the air. Daylight Savings is upon us and we can now enjoy the longer evenings of daylight.






Did he conform, did he behave, did he make amends and forgive? Prepare to be challenged, pushed and pulled in all directions as this story seldom has a quiet moment.


