On Thursday mornings, from 8.00 to 11.00, the Trinity Centre, on the corner of Hall and School Roads, comes alive with people committed to working together to build each other's lives.

Exclusively for Ngongotaha residents, a wide variety of options is available, from crafts, reading, music and videos, play, hot and cold beverages and soup, a pantry (items just \$1 or \$2) and a wardrobe of pre-loved clothing. There's also an extensive vegetable garden tended by volunteers which contributes to available food supplies.

People who come to the Centre looking for practical help are respected, and often, the important elements provided are communication and companionship.

The Centre's Kaiawhina, Chrissie Clement, is a trained addiction counsellor, but confesses to not being able to cure her own addiction to clothes! Here Chrissie considers a garment with volunteer Lou.

The principles of the Centre are: tu Rangatira – dignity; oritetanga – equality; and Whakahoa – partnership.

It's okay to go back

It seemed like a good idea at the start, but then it all turned to custard and I had to rethink what I was doing. My brother Morgan and I were up in the bush on Mount Ngongotaha on one of our Sunday afternoon childhood expeditions when we came across a big black water pipe that protruded out of the side of the maunga.

The further you walked out on it the further you were from the ground. It would have been about 20 metres long. My brother had walked to the end, now metres above the ground and was calling me to join him. It seemed like a good idea, until I had walked halfway to him.



At that point I realised that I could do myself a serious injury if I fell and I can't remember if I started shaking and had to drop so I did not fall, or if I dropped down on the pipe and started shaking so much that I could not move. The end result was I was stuck halfway out on a water pipe above the ground, and I needed my bros support. I remember him telling me it was okay to go back before he helped to turn me around and get me back safely.

I am not sure who had the idea to go diving for mussels with surfboards, but it seemed like a good idea to me until I found myself shivering with cold while lying on top of one of them. I had a wetsuit, but it was not keeping me warm like it was meant to. Fortunately, the sea was perfectly calm as far as seas can be. We were about 100 metres offshore and the diving was going well, but I wasn't. I was too cold to get back in the water and was trying to get some respite from the weak sun that was now hidden behind clouds. Fortunately for me, one of my uncles realised how cold I was and allowed me to go back into shore, with a sack of mussels in tow. That 100-metre swim back to the beach on that surfboard with a sack of mussels remains one of the coldest, longest, darkest swims I have ever experienced. I lay on the beach for ages totally exhausted when I finally safely arrived back, the rest of the party arriving soon after my recovery. At least I had a sack of mussels to show for it.

We were keen for a game of golf. Too keen. This was my definitely my cousin's idea. He shall remain nameless. We were all staying at Awahou during one of our Christmas holidays at our whanau papa Kainga. He thought it would be a good idea to chuck a set of golf clubs in one of our whanau row boats and row from Awahou to the shores of Hamurana, go for a game of golf and row back. The day was perfect for it, so it seemed like a good idea to me too. Knowing that the whanau rule was to always stay within our swimming capabilities of the shore we had to row quite far to get there, but hey, we were keen for a game of golf. Very keen.

We also had no money. So, after reaching our destination around midday and hiding the boat we ran across the road and jumped the fence on to the third hole. Or rather we climbed through the wire fence and were walking to the fourth tee when we heard a guy yelling above a tractor that was now speeding towards us from a distance. Suffice to say we did not even have one golf shot and scampered through the fence and back across the road before he got close enough to recognise us. I am sure he must have had a good laugh as we returned to the safety of our rowboat and started the long journey home, egos frayed, but laughing anyway. My cousin and I returned to play golf at Hamurana many times after that, in cars and paying our fees, no rowboats involved. Many years later I would become the President of that golf club and never told anyone about my feeble attempt to have a free round of golf. The only reason I am confessing to it now is because we did not actually hit a shot, so therefore as far as I am concerned, there was no crime to answer for, there was definitely intent though.

Intent has got me into difficult situations throughout my life. However, the years have taught me wisdom such as who I should listen to. For example, my brother Morgan has always been one of the most courageous, inspiring, go get 'em guys I have ever known. He has always been there to encourage me to do stuff and help me if I fail. That's what good brothers do I suppose.

I have dived for seafood many times since that surfboard incident. In fact, years later I swam out to dive for mussels with my adult son. The waves were huge. However, this time my wetsuit fit me and I was a lot fitter as well. He was so strong that he dragged back our sack of mussels through the surf. I guess that's what sons do for their fathers. They teach Papas not to be hindered by past experiences and to continue trying new things. Things that may not be easier but can safely achieve the same result of kai on the table. No surfboard required.

I enjoy golf whenever I have the time and opportunity to do so. Would I row a boat for ages to go for a game of golf? No. Would I drive or fly for ages to have a game? Yes. Would I climb through a fence to get a free game in the middle of the day? No. Especially if there was a guy on a tractor around. There are lots of memories to make in our region. We really do live in paradise. No rowboats required.



Five years of progress with Labour

Our Government has a very clear vision for New Zealand's future. It's one where our economy provides security and opportunities for everyone, we all have a healthy, affordable place to call home, we all have access to world-class healthcare and we look after our environment for future generations.

It can be easy to forget just how far we've come since 2017, particularly as we've faced a global pandemic and an economic shock. While there's more work to do, I'm really proud of our Government's record.

Age Concern

Our biggest shortfall at present is our lack of retired tradespeople for our SuperGold Skills Programme.

During Covid our numbers dropped off and we have been unable to recover. We need all sorts of trades to help our members. The services are not free, and the tradesperson is able to negotiate a price with the client and is normally paid in cash which can be a bit of extra income on retirement.

An example would be a lady who rang this week looking for someone to do her lawns and has her own ride-on mower, or the lady who rang wanting someone to fix her gate which is becoming hard to open but at present we do not even have any gardeners or builders on our books.

Age Concern Rotorua had a presence at the 21st celebrations for Parksyde which was held on the 5th of November, and we provided information to older adults in our community. The Parksyde celebration and Open Day began with the official welcome and karakia and speeches by Peter Fitchett, Chair of Parksyde, Stuart Edward, Rotorua Trust, Tania Tapsell, new Mayor, and Lianne Dalziel who opened the facility when it first opened.

After the speeches and cutting of the cake, people were invited to look at the displays, stage performances and interactive activities. Age Concern was fortunate to be able to have a static stall at the Open Day celebrations, and we were able to provide information on what we can provide. Age Concern is an organisation whose focus is contributing to the overall wellbeing of older New Zealanders.

Age Concern works to prevent abuse and neglect of older adults, support health and wellbeing so older adults can live well for longer, advocate for their rights to ensure they are respected and treated as valuable members of their community and end the loneliness and social isolation many older adults experience.

Covid has had a strong impact on our service delivery. We have experienced a huge increase in welfare issues, social isolation, and mental and health issues. Recently we have been able to appoint a welfare officer, thanks to lottery funding, and they are visiting all our members to assess their mental and physical wellbeing. Although many social connection programs and activities were cancelled over the lockdown periods, the staff's community work and practical support services increased.

Now that we are back to having our weekly excursions to various venues the good thing is that many of these trips are oversubscribed, especially the one to Maketu for a fish and chips lunch. Our staff are also enjoying taking turns to go on these trips in the absence of a Social Connection Coordinator, even though they are all very busy in their respective roles and the limited time they all have allows them a break from their normal routine.

We are still battling with the council over the development

of our tiny house pocket neighbourhood in Ngongotaha. They seem to be putting up barrier after barrier which we must overcome, and we are at the stage of not being able to order the buildings and start the build until we have some confidence that the Resource Consent will be approved. Hopefully this week we will have some good news.

A new initiative is set to be a one-stop shop for elderly people to gain guidance and information. The Parksyde Older Persons Community Centre Trust, is in the consultation stage of establishing a Hub, aimed at elderly people who are seeking advice and guidance from a wide variety of local charities and organizations.

The Hub aims to get agencies into the Centre and remove barriers that people may face getting to them when they are scattered around the community. With the rising cost of fuel, people may not be able to travel all over town to reach these services so having them in one space makes sense and in a one-stop shop. The idea for the hub came from a conversation held over several years with a number of interested parties, and the first of many consultation forums has been held and a steering committee established. Now it is a matter of watch this space.

This is a very sobering article and indicates that we all must be careful and question everything, if it seems wrong or too good to be true, it probably is. SBS Bank has been labelled "heartless" after refusing to refund \$134,000 siphoned by thieves from a pensioner's online accounts, saying the recent heart attack victim failed to take adequate precautions.

The distraught man is recovering from triple heart-bypass surgery which he believes is linked to stress from being swindled. He says he has been rocked by SBS's decision and the bank's hardline stance is ironic, given it advertises as "putting the heart back into banking".

However, SBS, which recorded a \$61 million operating surplus last financial year, says the matter is now closed and the man is free to complain to the Banking Ombudsman. Criminals had "hacked" the man's accounts, then used a secure messaging function to contact bank staff, posing as the man, and changed his cellphone number to circumvent SBS's two-factor authentication security checks. They then added several new payees before moving large amounts of money to six different accounts at four separate banks in 11 transactions over five days.

The man, from Invercargill, learned the money had been taken only when he logged in to his internet banking to pay bills and found his revolving mortgage account had been drained to its \$134,000 limit.

Te Waikai Otaota: Te Arawa Lakes **Aquatic Weed Treatment Set To Launch**

Te Arawa Lakes Trust is ready to deliver Te Waikai Otaota - Te Arawa lakes aquatic weed treatment plan as part of a multi-faceted approach to restoring the lakes and waterways across Rotorua.

Operations Manager William Anaru says Te Waikai Otaota is one of the many biosecurity methods being used by the Trust's Taiao team to, "aid in the lengthy battle of restoring the quality of our wai along with the protection of our taonga species like oura, tuna, kākahi, kōaro, inanga and morihana".

The herbicide Diquat will be used to control aquatic pest weeds on six lakes including Rotorua, Rotoiti, Tarawera, Ōkataina, Rotomā and Ökāreka between 14 November and 2 December.

"We are notifying whānau and communities kanohi ki te kanohi, letter drops, text messaging, emails and social media - to help inform those who are living nearby and are regular lake users.

"To keep our whānau and communities safe we will place a Rāhui on treatment areas which will prohibit swimming, food gathering, and collecting drinking water for 24 hours following control operations."

Pou Whakamōhio (signage) will be erected during this time to ensure all lake users are aware of the Rāhui.

Covid Vaccination & Boosters

Everyone in New Zealand aged 5 or over can get a free COVID-19 vaccination, available at 1140 Fenton Street (the old Radio Network building). It does not matter what your visa or citizenship status is. No appointment is required and there's plenty of free parking. Children under 5 cannot get vaccinated for COVID-19.

Vaccination is one of the most effective steps people can take to reduce their risk of death from COVID-19. The analysis shows a 62% reduction in the risk of death from COVID-19 among people who had two or more doses compared to those who had received one dose or no doses. There is evidence that boosters further reduce the risk of death from COVID-19, and this will be the subject of future study.

The options available are:

- Pfizer vaccine (12+ years)
- Child Pfizer vaccine (5-11 years)
- Novavax vaccine (12+ years)

Pfizer is the preferred COVID-19 vaccine for use in New Zealand. If you are 18 years of age or older and either cannot get the Pfizer vaccine or want a different option, you can get the Novavax vaccine. You will be given the option to choose your vaccine type when you book. The Novavax vaccine is not available at all vaccination sites. Whichever vaccine you get, you will need 2 doses.

If you have had COVID-19

- you should still get any COVID-19 vaccinations you are eligible for.
- Being infected with COVID-19 does not provide the same level of protection as vaccination. Although your antibodies will be high after an infection, we do not know how long this natural immunity will protect you.
- Getting vaccinated is your best defence against COVID-19, and can help protect you against future variants.

The majority of routine vaccinations can now be administered before, after, or at the same time as your COVID-19 vaccinations. The exception to this is the Zostavax (shingles) vaccine where a 7-day gap before or after receiving the Pfizer COVID-19 is advised. If you have any questions, please discuss with your health provider

How long to wait before getting vaccinated

- It is recommended you wait 3 months after testing positive before getting any COVID-19 vaccination or booster.
- A gap of 3 months gives your immune system time to recover from the infection and get the most benefit from vaccination. Getting vaccinated sooner than 3 months might mean your immune response is not as strong.
- If you are at high risk of severe illness if you do catch COVID-19
 again, talk to your doctor or other specialist about when to get
 your next dose. You may be able to get it sooner than 3 months.

Getting a vaccine booster

If you are 50y and over (or 30y plus and immunocompromised, a healthcare, aged care or disability worker), you are encouraged to get your booster as soon as possible.

You can get a free booster now if:

- you are aged 18 or over, and
- · you are fully vaccinated, and
- it has been at least 3 months since you completed your primary course (for most people, this is 2 doses).

If you are aged 16 or 17

You can get a free Pfizer booster if you are fully vaccinated, and it has been at least 6 months since you completed your primary course (for most people, this is 2 doses)

Rotorua Museum gathering untold stories of Māori Battalion B Company soldiers

The stories of heroism, camaraderie and sacrifice of the men who served in the 28th Māori Battalion B Company in World War 2 have captivated locals and visitors alike for decades. But with a roll of nearly 1000 soldiers in B Company alone, many of these stories remain unknown to the public. It is these stories Rotorua Museum Te Whare Taonga o Te Arawa is hoping to bring to light.

As the nation commemorates the 104th anniversary of Armistice Day, Rotorua Museum is connecting with whānau to collect the untold stories of those who served with the 28th Māori Battalion B Company and uncover more unsung heroes of Te Arawa, and beyond.

This engagement process will be carried out over the coming months to help shape the new 28th Māori Battalion exhibition when the Museum reopens. The Museum team is seeking whānau members like Zorah Ngahuia Bidois, who recently registered to claim the medals of her uncle Whitiora (Tommy) Mita. Tommy was captured early on in WWII and spent most of the war as a prisoner.

"He was a lovely, gentle person. He was always a lot of fun, so if the war changed him, he never let it show. "He didn't talk about the war, nobody really did, but he did use to say he felt like he cheated death because he was captured early while others fought and died."

A young child at the time, Zorah's memory of WWII and its aftermath was the blackouts and rations, but she says the stories from soldiers need to be passed down and remembered. "It's

important our children and every generation after is reminded that their tūpuna fought so we could have a better life. "So many whānau had multiple men go off to war; it was significant for our whānau and every man came back with their own stories. These stories all deserve to be retold and remembered."

Rotorua Museum Curator Mātauranga Māori, Manaaki Pene, says redeveloping the Museum's 28th Māori Battalion B Company exhibition with added stories and insights will give people a chance to learn about, uplift and commemorate the memory of those who served.

"When the Museum was open, The 28th Māori Battalion B Company exhibition was an incredibly popular and special part of the experience, and while it was an emotional space for many whānau, it also provided an opportunity to remember and share those stories.

"It is whānau across the rohe who hold the knowledge of the lesser known stories from this time in history, and it is these that we would like to capture and share for the benefit of the whole community."

Rotorua Museum Operations Manager, Jo Doherty, says the team is eager to build on what is already known about the 28th Māori Battalion B Company. "So many of the stories we know are about the soldiers themselves, but we also want to dig deeper and understand how their whānau coped at home during that time.

"It's a real privilege to hear these stories, and we want to make sure that when the Museum reopens, the exhibition captures all the elements whānau want to see."

Reverse equity mortgage vs retirement village conundrum


It's a defining moment when the time comes to start thinking about how and where you're going to live out your retirement years, and what that picture looks like. If you're lucky enough to own a home at retirement and carry little to no debt, your options are wider in terms of your accommodation choices and decision making. But being asset rich with a house, yet cash poor raises its own issues. The main two options for over 65's in terms of unlocking value in a home is a Reverse Equity Mortgage or Occupation Right at a Retirement Village.

Reverse Equity mortgages work by taking out a small cash loan secured by a new mortgage against home equity (value) repayable when the house is sold, or you die. You might set up a facility of say, \$100k, but only draw funds down in chunks as needed to re-do the kitchen or bathroom for mobility or upgrade old fittings etc., re-carpet, upgrade your car etc. all for the purpose of making your life more independent, comfortable, and staying in your home for longer. However, with a reverse equity loan the interest is usually capitalised on the amount drawn down – i.e. the interest gets added to the debt so you pay interest on interest so to speak. Broadly, the idea is the capital gain on your home over time theoretically reduces the financial impact of the loan structure. But that depends on house prices increasing in value which is never guaranteed. I would add here that borrowing is usually limited to preserve some equity in the property – otherwise how are the banks going to get their loan and interest back if the amount of the debt exceeds the value of the house?

An Occupation Right is the purchase of a small villa or apartment in a retirement village with the right to live in it until you can't any longer, or you die. Weekly fees akin to rent are paid to the village operator to maintain the building, grounds, and services and so on plus you pay your own rates, power, internet etc. depending on your unit type. When you vacate, the provider takes up to 30% of your original purchase price when on-sold. Occupation Right owners can't sell the unit themselves, and don't get a cut of any capital gain on re-sale either. The Government is looking into the fairness of those aspects at the moment.

So, which is the lesser of two evils — reverse equity or occupation right? Well, it depends, and both cost money one way or the other. I always think about it like this: if you add up the amount of interest paid on a home mortgage over the term, it's an astonishing amount of money — likely in the hundreds of thousands of dollars. The offset is that it is likely the home has increased in value over the years and you didn't need to pay rent to someone else along the way either. So, when considering a reverse equity loan, one way of looking at is that you're effectively just taking advantage of the 'paper equity' or capital gain accrued over the years to fund your retirement living needs.

And then there's the occupation right option. When you consider the weekly fees and 30% of the original purchase price deduction on re-sale, that, too, is often a huge sum of money. Again, one way of looking at it is that you probably sold your existing home and made a large gain which enabled the purchase of the occupation right from money you otherwise wouldn't have had.



One of the biggest issues we find is adult children worried about their inheritance being gobbled up. Hmmmm ... Firstly, parents are not obliged to make sure they leave an inheritance. Secondly, why should an elderly parent not enjoy a more comfortable retirement with upgraded carpet, new tele, modified bathroom or kitchen, a vehicle they can get in or out of easier etc.? Thirdly, with an occupation right it's all about enjoying amenity, knowing medical and care support is on hand, as well as companionship from others in the village.

This article isn't intended to be relied on as financial advice nor advocating for any particular avenue or provider. The point I'm making is that retirement living costs money however you look at it, it just depends on the lens applied to the decision making.

What is a Reverse Mortgage?

Retirees often find themselves in a difficult financial position. Short on income but lots of equity, usually stored in their homes. A typical mortgage top-up won't work in this scenario. Standard mortgages require income and equity to be assessed and are required to be paid down.

Enter the Reverse Mortgage

Think of a reverse mortgage as a regular mortgage top-up every fortnight. There is no requirement to pay any money onto the mortgage and the interest from the debt can also be capitalised. It doesn't take too much to figure out that this debt could get away from the homeowner without the proper controls. So how do the banks keep this service from getting out of control?

LVR rules for Reverse Mortgages

For obvious reasons, banks can't let reverse mortgages get too high. An 80% loan on the 1st of January would sit at around 87% by the end of the year. This is clearly unsustainable for any length of time. Different banks have different rules but generally, you can borrow a maximum of 20% at age 60 moving up to \sim 40% by age 80. Usually, the maximum the lender will allow is 50%.

Are Reverse Mortgages bad?

Consider the scenario of a recently retired 65-year-old person with a freehold house, living on a Superannuation of approximately \$22k per year. Perhaps they need a \$30k per year income to maintain a comfortable life. This will give them enough money to enjoy their retirement and have the ability to visit the doctor if they need it. This scenario doesn't seem to signal irresponsible lending (or spending). The money is simply locked in an illiquid asset. Reverse Mortgages provide a way to free this up.

That's a fairly clean example. What about something a little more in the grey area?

Consider a 75-year-old that would like to use the equity in their home to purchase a car. The car will depreciate and the reverse mortgage will get larger which makes this a double hit on the homeowner. But, maybe the car gives that homeowner significant amounts of additional freedom. Is the debt still bad? In this instance, the client would have an in-depth conversation about their financial needs and capabilities. If they were, say, buying a \$20,000 car and they have a house worth \$1m then it doesn't seem unreasonable. Quite a different discussion if the car was \$300,000!It's important to know that the Reverse Mortgage lenders all have long financial discussions with their clients. They simply don't allow them to withdraw hundreds of thousands of dollars on a whim.

My thoughts on Reverse Mortgages

It's understandable that people who don't know all the checks and balances that go into a Reverse Mortgage product are uncomfortable with it. It goes against the rules that Mortgage Advisers adhere to – arranging an affordable mortgage (based on income) that can be paid off as quickly as reasonably possible.

The client must be under no illusion as to what they are signing up for and the costs involved. These days, the lenders are required to give an accurate forecast of how the debt will grow and strong discussions around how much money they actually need should be done.

Reverse mortgages fill a specific need in society. If the payment information is clearly conveyed and the reasons for the borrowing are responsible, then they can be considered as a possible option for post-retirement equity release.

So the little kid went home to his mother and said "Mum, I know everything!" So, his mother told him to shut up and not tell anyone, and handed him a thousand dollars.


The kid then tried the same thing with his dad, and his dad told him to keep his mouth shut and not tell anyone, and handed him 2 thousand dollars.




