Algal Blooms

Toi Te Ora Public Health has issued a health warning based on the results for levels of cyanobacteria (blue-green algae) from ongoing monitoring of levels of cyanobacteria by the Bay of Plenty Regional Council. It applies to Ohau Channel, Upper Kaituna River, Lake Rotorua, Okere Arm and Te Weta Bay at Lake Rotoiti, whilst Ngongotaha Stream has elevated levels of bacterial contamination.

Dr Jim Miller, Medical Officer of Health for Toi Te Ora Public Health said it was important to avoid any activity which could result in contact with the lake water. The toxins that may be released by cyanobacteria can trigger asthma and hayfever symptoms, skin rashes, headaches, breathing difficulties and visual problems.

Algal blooms can develop rapidly and unpredictably and can sometimes produce toxins that are harmful for people as well as animals. If the water looks discoloured, has an unusual smell, or has green or brown particles floating in it then it is best to avoid contact with it. Take particular care with children and dogs.

There are four main contaminants that can impact surface water and groundwater, affecting swim ability and waterway health: Nitrogen, Phosphorus, Sediment and E-Coli.

- Nitrogen is mainly lost as nitrate leaching through the soil profile into ground water and later into surface water. An overseer analysis can be used to help farmers understand their nitrate losses and mitigation to reduce them.
- Sediment, Phosphorus and E-coli is commonly lost in surface run off events, critical source management and erosion control is needed to mitigate these losses.
- Effluent from livestock contains a high percentage of Nitrogen,

· Spray drift of agricultural chemicals can also be of concern.

The Ministry for the Environment has committed \$72.1m for the four priority lakes - Rotorua, Rotoehu, Rotoiti and Okareka. (cont'd on p3)

15 March Public Meeting re 31 Ngongotaha Road

Hosted by Rotorua District Residents and Ratepayers and chaired by Reynold Macpherson, a second public meeting on the proposed Housing Development at 31 Ngongotaha Road was attended by hundreds.

Speakers included Ben Dalton, Deputy Chief Executive of Land for Housing, Housing and Urban Development, Matt Fraser from Land for Housing, Marcus Jacobsen from Watchman Residential, and James Dufty, contracted engineer.

Don Paterson from Rotorua Lakes Council was in the audience. MP Todd McClay was unable to attend as Parliament was sitting.

Further to previous queries about Ngongotaha School, the Ministry of Education will reassess need according to the area's population growth, which is currently at 14-15%.

An application for a Fast-Track process was lodged in December, as this option was due to close in February 2023. It was expected that the application would take a minimum of a further 2 months. This process requires more information than normal consenting, is subject to peer review and must go through the Bay of Plenty Regional Council.

It is hoped to start on about 30 houses by the end of 2024. They are working with Progress Ngongotaha. Only those living in Ngongotaha/Rotorua would be eligible for the ballot.

Modelling adopted the worst-case scenario in view of Western Road and the 2023 Auckland floods – the climate change scenario was for 40% higher than experienced during Cyclone Gabrielle. From the floor there was a query was this compatible with flooding having been seen higher than the deer fences in the area.

Also asked was whether insurance could be guaranteed, the answer being that an insurance company had been approached and indicated yes, with a response from the floor that the Insurance Council had indicated in future they might not be able to cover flood damage. As to whether the houses would be bought back if flooded, the response was no.

Engineer Dufty repeated that houses were not being built on the flood plain. Members of the audience disputed that the flood plain was limited to the area engineers described as such. The floor also commented that the lake can't accommodate the current flows now and tourist activities were closed as a result.

Bay of Plenty Regional Council and Rotorua Lakes Council matched this funding with \$72.1m for these four lakes. In 2010, a nitrogen limit was set for Lake Rotorua, allowing only 435 tonnes of nitrogen to go into the lake each year. The Bay of Plenty Regional Council's Water and Land Plan addresses key issues through regulatory and non-regulatory methods which include:

- Sewerage reticulation and sewerage plant upgrades
- In-lake treatment options e.g. alum dosing
- Retiring land from grazing and identifying land use changes and options e.g. the removal of gorse which leaches around 38 kilograms per hectare of nitrogen into the soil
- Rule 11 to cap the existing nitrogen and phosphorus loss from land use activities. A recent meeting of small block owners discussed changes needed, many of which landowners are already complying with, and incentives available
- · Detainment bunds and biodiversity work
- Encouraging fencing and planting in riparian areas

Alum dosing

Alum dosing under the Rotorua Te Arawa Lakes Programme refers to treating incoming streams with alum which helps reduce the impacts of phosphorus in certain lakes. The continual low dose of alum binds phosphorus in the incoming streams so when the streams reach the lake, plants (like algae) cannot use the phosphorus to grow. BOP Regional Council is conscious of any effect interventions may have on the lakes' ecosystems and environment and is working with the University of Waikato to monitor the project (to date there's no indication of alum having any adverse effects).

It was originally estimated that alum dosing would remove two tonnes of phosphorus from Lake Rotorua. Scientists now think it is actually getting 10 tonnes of phosphorus out of Lake Rotorua.

It is likely that with climate change predictions of higher ambient temperatures this type of bloom could occur regularly.

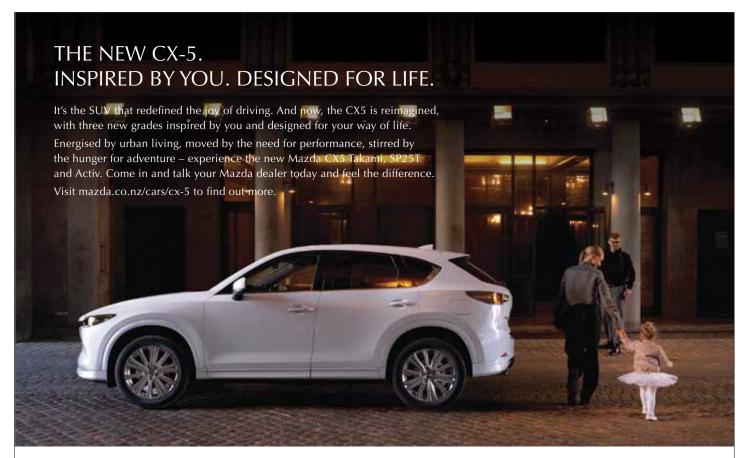

Waka Kotahi had acknowledged that traffic over the last 2 years was lower because of Covid and the community should have faith in those doing the modelling to protect the community. Geoff Rice from Ngati Tura/ Ngati Te Ngakau stated that they support housing, but the devil was in the detail. RDRR shouldn't dominate the discussion and Ngongotaha's own community group should be created. Others expressed concern that Ngongotaha's infrastructure was poor now and the community would end up with the problem. Some distrust of Rotorua Lakes Council and Waka Kotahi was expressed.

RDRR summarized the show of hands at the end of the meeting as 10% in favour of the proposal, 25-30% were undecided, and 55-60% were opposed. Community engagement providing more detail is due to start in a month. The Chair suggested this should include information and feedback on the boundary of the flood plain.

I will soon be presenting a Keynote to a group of Wellington School Principals. The theme of their upcoming conference is "Telling our story."

So, I thought I would create a new keynote presentation based on "Taku Purakau, My story" and I would start by writing the beginning of my story for this Ngongotaha Newsletter article. Let's call it "The story of an MBA, A Maori Boy from Awahou."



I was named before I was born. So, my story starts before I saw the first rays of the sun. Incidentally the name I was given by several Maori Kuia is Ngahihi o te ra – The Rays of the sun. As well as my name these Kuia prophesied that I would be a sick boy when I was born but not to worry, they would come and help look after me.

So, they did, and here I am! No.5 is alive! Not that I am number 5 or anything, I just like that line from that movie and say it to myself when I need a personal boost.

So here I am, but I was a very skinny kid, like a lot of Awahou kids in those days. So skinny that my mum, Doreen's nickname for me was Slab. Like those skinny trout.

Speaking of trout. I learnt to fly fish, or I should say fish for cockabullies and row a boat before I learnt to ride a bike. Trout have always been a part of my diet and enjoyment. Nothing like that first tug on a fishing line. No doubt a part of the reason, why I chair the Eastern Fish and Game Council.

Well, that and my father Tommy Bidois accompanied by a couple of Fish and Game rangers "encouraging" me to go onto their council a few years ago. No names will be mentioned though Anthony and Matt! Tight lines.

My father also insisted I be given another name, Patrick, to honour my grandfather who gave his life in service of Aotearoa while serving in the Maori Battalion in Egypt in the second world war. My koro Pakau (Patrick) Tanirau is lying in a cemetery in Tunisia. Nga mihi ai ki a koe e koro.

So, my full name is Ngahihi o te ra Patrick Bidois. MBA.

I have a couple of degrees but have kept the self-proclaimed MBA to honour my Uncle Tauri Morgan who gave me that name after I did a couple of things for our iwi. Humbly speaking.

Names are important in our rohe /region. Names like Hamurana or Te Kaikaitahuna, Kaharoa, Mamaku, Awahou and Ngongotaha, Ngati Rangiwewehi, Ngati Ngararanui, Ngati Tarawhai and others including two of our guardians Pekehaua and Hinerua are all Maori names. They have always been Maori names.

So, when I hear about other places changing their names to Maori names I feel a sense of pride that our rohe has always had Maori names. Just like I have always been called by my Maori name. Good on all of us I reckon. That Kiwi guy Shakespeare once said, "a rose by any other name would still smell as sweet" but I reckon our names smell sweeter. Humbly speaking.

One of my standing jokes has been when people ask me if I have a shorter name I often say Nga as though I am saying Nah, and then tell them my friends call me Ngahi so they can call me Ngahihi o te ra! Speaking of names, I don't think we have shortened many of our rohe Maori names. Besides "Nongi", Mamaku is still Mamaku, Hamurana is still Hamurana, Kaharoa is still Kaharoa and Awahou is still Awesome! Humbly speaking?

Our Bidois Te Pitini whanau mana whenua is at the mouth of the Awahou river. It is a special place. It is where our Grandmother Rangikahiwa Pitini lived after also living in Hamurana. It was her that gifted the land between the road and the lake near the Hamurana bridge to a doctor who was living there. I see they have several houses there now. A small piece of whanau history there.

Awahou is the place I say I am from even though our house was in town. I grew up swimming in the Awahou river alongside all my Ngati Rangiwewehi cousins. We have special swimming holes like Liza's Drop and Green Acres.

Our marae still echoes with waiata that we learnt as kids during kapa haka and we still have one of the best performing kapa haka groups in Aotearoa, humbly speaking, coming fourth in the recent Matatini competition 2023.

The places we all live in our rohe are special places too. I know I say that a lot about our rohe but I mean it. For example I smile when I see kids swimming at the Hamurana bridge, playing golf, fishing, or walking along the waterfront cause those are things I used to do when I was a kid. Hopefully our kids' kids will do the same for generations into the future.

Well, that is the start of my story. What is your story? What will your story for our rohe be? Our story started with our Nanny Rangikahiwa and her Ngati Rangiwewehi whakapapa and their connection and engagement with our rohe. Your story can be started by you for your grandkids and mokopuna by frequently engaging with the whenua in our rohe.

Kia kaha kia maia kia manawanui – be strong, be courageous, be steadfast.

Go for lots of swims, catch lots of trout and be a lousy golfer like me!

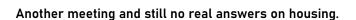

A second meeting has been held in Ngongotaha to try to get more information and a few answers from the government on their proposal to build 350 houses on flood plains beside the Waititi stream. This is after the government turned down a plan five years ago to build 87 houses on the same site.

The meeting was a good idea and an opportunity for the government to address local concerns. Sadly, those who attended were left disappointed with some expressing frustration and anger.

Questions over congestion in the village and mitigating flooding or the effect the development will have on local health and education services or homes downstream of the proposed development remain up in the air.

So too does the question over whether the government will use its special powers to fast track the consent in Wellington or go through the normal process with Rotorua Lakes Council where local people can have their say and all these important issues can be considered.

Proponents of the project are quick to say 'we need houses' which is true. They are just as quick to reject local concerns. as nimbyism - which it is not.

The government has largely caused the problems we face on Fenton Street by using Rotorua motels as a dumping ground for the country's homelessness problem. Recently released Cabinet papers show they were warned of the negative effects this would have on our city. They chose to ignore this advice and pushed ahead anyway.

That's the very reason they need to take seriously the concerns of Ngongotaha residents. No one is saying we should not have more houses. What local people are saying is show us how you are going to address our concerns so that we are not worse off.

Otherwise, all that Labour is doing is moving Fenton Street to Ngongotaha.

Age Concern

Age Concern are the lucky recipients of the proceeds of the next Ray White Charity Garage Sale to be held on April 8th at 8am at the Ngongotaha Railway Park. Age Concern were the very first charity to be granted a garage sale and since the first one, several community groups have benefitted from the sales with a great deal of money being raised.

On a personal note, I attended the second meeting, along with many other Ngongotaha residents, about the proposed subdivision to be built on Ngongotaha Road. I think the number attending showed the concern of the locals about the way the subdivision will change the infrastructure and dynamics of our village. I, for one, was not convinced that it was a good idea and oppose it until more research is done into the land and its predisposition to flood.

Age Concern National, along with the statistics department, have produced a snapshot of each Age Concern in NZ and what the future may look like, not that I am going to be around to see it. At present there are 10,511 over 65 with 4,914 Maori over 55 and 435 Pacifica over 55 in Rotorua. That is about 14% of the total population in Rotorua compared to 15% in NZ. Of that number 2,664 (25%) are living alone and 7,480 (71%) are earning less than \$30,000.00 a year.

Projections show that in Rotorua the expected number of over 65's in 2028 are 14,770, in 2038 18,200 and in 2048 19,540. I wonder what percentage will still be in the work force, more out of necessity than desire. A report on the labour market suggests the country will be short of a quarter of a million workers in 25 years' time.

The Business New Zealand commissioned research shows that gaps remain and will get worse - despite a record share of the working age population in employment. To counter the ageing population, higher workforce participation was needed along with long-term migration. The report concludes that without migration, by 2048 there would be shortages in education, engineering, and healthcare, with overall worker numbers shrinking from the early 2030s.

However, it also pointed to an over-supply of workers in management and commerce, creative arts, food hospitality and personal services in two decades' time. Stable immigration policies were needed, as similar countries were also looking at how to deal with their changing demographics and drawing in more overseas workers. We need stable, long-term policy planning in the immigration space, or we will be some quarter of a million workers short by 2048.

We also need more policy development to occur in enabling more diverse populations to come into the workforce. We can achieve this by increasing the participation and employment of Māori, Pacific Islanders, women and older people to help close the workforce gap. It's important for this government and future governments to ensure that they have stable, consistent immigration policy, and keep it simple so that New Zealand remains attractive globally for people to come to.

On Thursday the 9th of March we had our ballot (draw) for the people who will be your new neighbours living in our Tiny Homes in Paraone Street. The lucky recipients of the draw, and who will be paying about \$100 per week rent would prefer, at this stage, to remain anonymous. The Tiny Houses are due for delivery in June as the factory in Whangarei was affected by the recent cyclone. We are still on the look-out for businesses or groups that can help us by sponsoring any of the items we intend to use for landscaping.

A huge thank you to Bunnings who have kindly donated the fruit trees, citrus trees, kowhai trees, grasses and 3 garden sheds. Age Concern has been in the media quite a bit recently and the profile of the organisation has been lifted. Firstly we were in the Daily Post and New Zealand Herald, secondly on the Nine till Noon talkback radio broadcast on Radio New Zealand, and thirdly we may be on the Sunday television programme. The news coverage is about the tiny homes, delayed retirement and the cost of living when you have rent or a mortgage to pay.

Our Age Concern Maintenance man has proved to be a big hit and he is getting plenty of maintenance jobs to keep him busy. I think that part of the recent influx of new members is due to this initiative which is providing cost-effective maintenance work to keep our members in their own homes.

Our Out and Abouters weekly excursions are proving very popular and are usually over-subscribed and our free driving up-date programme for senior drivers "Staying Safe" has also been attracting up to 40 people at a time.

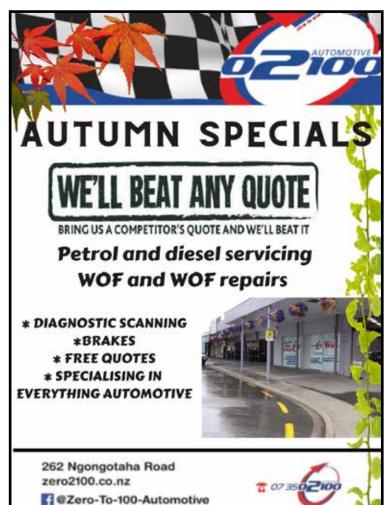

Kia ora tatou katoa.

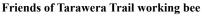

Field trip to Maungatautari Sanctuary Mountain

A lovely day out in sunny Waikato was had by a small group of members. We wandered around the Southern Enclosure enjoying the bush and birds - and our picnic lunches! Those who don't mind heights climbed the observation tower. We also got to see a female giraffe weevil up close as it was being held by a researcher going about her business.

Mt Tarawera Wilding Conifer Pulling Trip (Rotorua Botanical Society Combined with Forest and Bird) was held on Saturday 25 March

We were driven to the top of Mt Tarawera by 4WD bus and vehicle to the crater rim to hear a bit about the history and ecological values of the mountain, led by Ruawahia trustees and Rotorua Botanical Society with assistance from Kaitiaki Tours. This year we crossed the crater onto 'the fan' between Ruawahia and Wahanga domes with time to take in the flora, fauna and 360 degree views of the Bay of Plenty, spending the rest of the day on the Tarawera 'fan' helping to handpull wilding conifer seedlings to assist the Ruawahia Wilding Conifer Project which aims to control the spread of wilding conifers in order to protect the unique values on the mountain.



The working bee will focus on eradicating Japanese honeysuckle. Sunday 16 April,

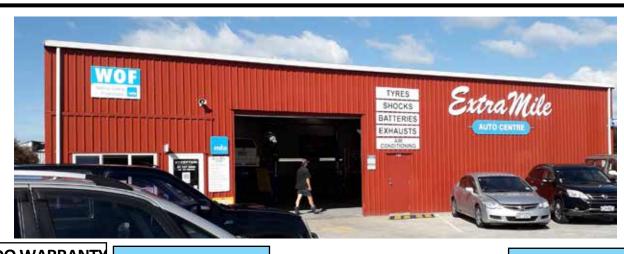

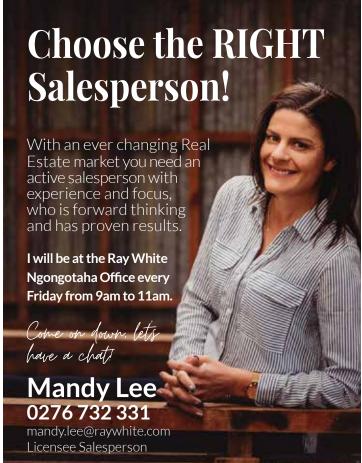

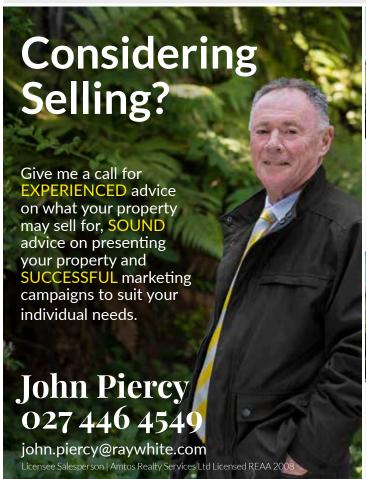

2023 – FLU VACCINATIONS

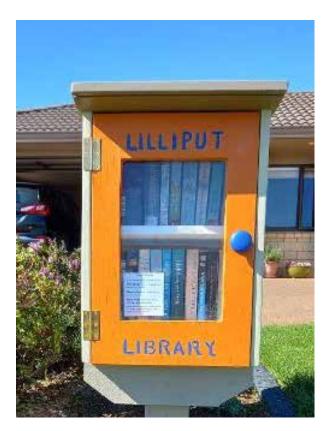
The Flu Vaccine for 2023 will be available here from 4 April

- **❖** We are holding Flu Clinics on Tuesdays & Thursdays throughout April between 8.30 a.m. to 12.30 p.m. and again from 1.30 p.m. to 4.30 p.m.
- The criteria for funded vaccinations remains the same as previous years. If you meet the following criteria, a FREE flu vaccination may be possible.
 - **❖** You are 65 years of age or older (Maori & Pacific People from age 55 years)
 - ❖ You are pregnant
 - You have a chronic condition; Including Heart Disease, Chronic Respiratory Disease, Diabetes or another specified conditions (check with the Surgery)
- ❖ If you are not eligible for a free FLU VACCINE, the cost is \$39.00 including GST

COVID BOOSTER VACCINATIONS

If you are 16 years or older and have had your primary course of 2 doses you are eligible to receive a further COVID booster vaccination. This produces an immune response against the original virus and Omicron variants. It will need to be at least 6 months since your last COVID booster was administered or you tested positive for COVID 19. You are also able to have this at the same time as your Flu vaccination.

The idea is, it is stocked with good reading material for people who like reading and they can:

Take a book if they see something they would like to read Share It and

Return it or pass it on to a friend, they can also **Leave books** to help keep the Lilliput Library stocked.

Since it has been up in her street, Sharyn sees people are using it who are delighted to see it there and think it is such a good community idea.

Internet Documents

The world wide web contains an abundance of downloadable DIY 'legal' documents purporting to cater for pretty much every legal situation.

We regularly get calls from people who've paid good money to buy online documents, adamant that they've "already agreed what I/we want and just want to come in and get a lawyer to sign it or witness signatures ... don't need anyone to look over it ... nothing to it, will only take you a few minutes to sort out ... should be done today or tomorrow ... and it won't cost much, right"?

Errrrmmm ... noooo to all of those.

It'd be fair to say that most people don't generally know the full scope of the nature and extent of their legal rights or obligations until they get full and proper legal advice suited to their circumstances. When people decide to use online document services, they perhaps also don't properly appreciate that the website's job is to provide quick and cheap documents usually based on limited generic and basic questions - not legal advice suited to a specific scenario or their life situation. So, people take a big risk in not seeking proper legal advice when using online documents. And it's usually not until the document pops into their inbox with a large disclaimer likely saying something like 'seek legal advice before signing' that people have second thoughts and wonder if they should get a lawyer to look at it.

But our experience is that the online documents we've been approached with are typically inadequate for the person's particular situation and require redrafting at the outset. Sometimes it's not even clear which country the law relates to either. Also, we'd need to go through and cross-check against our own existing inhouse precedent documents to be sure that no important provisions are overlooked between documents. Suddenly that online document isn't as cost-effective as originally thought.

But don't get me wrong, I'm all for competition, growth and developing new ideas and ways of doing things. The online legal space is definitely a new and exciting frontier – heck we've even built our own DIY online basic will drafting service – www.willingwills.co.nz – but the difference is that we review the submitted questionnaire forms and make direct contact to discuss anything that might need further conversations, we draft the document, and enable one review before finalising and sending witnessing instructions.

And I should also add that I have seen a couple of online document websites with affiliated lawyers who can be engaged to provide additional (paid) advice if necessary, too. There is no doubt the online document space is here and will continue to develop with time. But I personally think it will be a while before artificial intelligence (AI) in the legal document drafting arena is advanced enough to cope with all the elements impacting people's legal situations in our increasingly complex society.

Kia ora Koutou, Katoa, Hi Everyone,

Out and about...

Over recent months there has been much korero/talk about flooding, and saturated land in various parts of Ngongotaha.

An attendee at a recent sub-division meeting at the Ngongotaha Community Hall commented about the lack of drainage of water that 'ponds' on the high side of the Railway line opposite Fletchers Old Mill site. You will recognise this as the site just down from the Ngongotaha Railway Park, where in recent years the children would race to the large pond and the Fire Brigade would let the hoses play and the children ran under them at the close of a hot 'Kiwi Culture Day' held on Waitangi Day 6th February for a few years.

He was correct in what he said, but back in time when the Stock Sale Yards were across the road (from 1930's), the 'ponding' was as a result of the 'wash down cleaning' of the stock yards. The animals had to be empty prior to arriving at the sales, but there was still a need to wash the yards after the sales.

The yards were hosed down weekly after the Thursday Sales. The water passed through a culvert under the Ngongotaha Road (SH36) and settled on the land adjacent to the high side of the Railway line. Here the water was allowed to evaporate and during the summer period, in the drier months, the small amount of stock waste left over from the wash, had dried and was well sought after by local farmers, as good fertiliser for their pastures and it was trucked out. The bonus for these farmers was that it brought extra fertility to their paddocks and many a neighbour enjoyed a 'Mushroom Pick' from the paddocks, when in season. Today only natural rain water collects and in the hot weather it is completely dry.

The Motor Caravan Association Park is where the Stock Sale Yards once operated. Not all wetland is created equal, and in some cases, wetlands have been enhanced with planting and controlled in areas where people are living. There was a site developed many years ago by Ben Benfield in an area just off of Sunset Road, Rotorua.

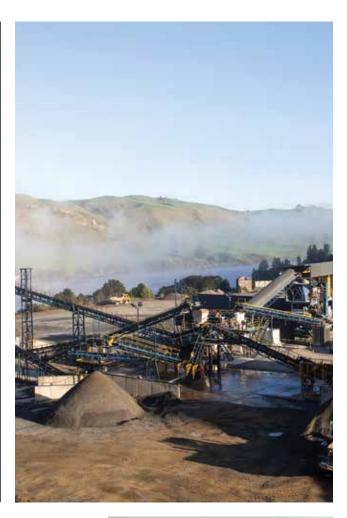

For fundraising we sell shavings for poultry and horse husbandry. The park also sells boxed wood.

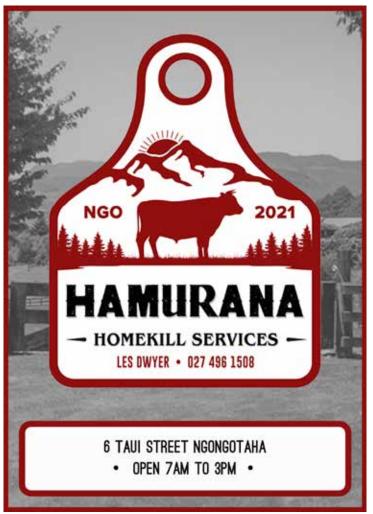
