BOPRC School Sustainability and Resilience Fund


As he drove down the road he realized that his visibility was horrible. It was too dangerous so he turned around and went back home.

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Tommy Bidois: a Gentleman and a Warrior. MBA

In an earlier article I wrote that my father is a person I love and highly respect. He is one of my eagles. Eagles are people I confide in, learn from and trust. They are people I aspire to be. I then outlined one of my father's key pieces of eagle advice: to look after number one.



We cannot look after others unless we look after ourselves first.

Many of you reading this article will know my father Tommy Bidois or know of him.

Last week on May 24th at 11.13am my father died after doing his best to look after number one. He had spent his life looking after others. After 8 days in Rotorua hospital facing untold challenges, despite excellent care, he returned to his beloved Bach at the centre of his universe at Awahou and passed peacefully with his smile on his face.

He was near his awa, the Awahou river, on his Papakainga, just down the road from his marae, Tarimano and Whare Tupuna Tawakeheimoa. That is next to The Church of the Good Shepherd, which he helped build. He was at the heart of his iwi Ngati Rangiwewehi, where he served on the paepae. My father was a real McCoy MBA, Maori Boy from Awahou. He was 88 years of age.

Dad taught us many lessons which I would like to share with you as I celebrate the life of a gentleman, a warrior, and an MBA. Humble, hardworking, gentleman, soldier, speaker, fisherman, outstanding husband, father, uncle, koro, great grandfather, friend, kaumatua, mentor, were words used to describe dad during his tangi.

Dad was a gentleman. He taught us manners. Words like please and thank you. Simple kind words that have taken me and my whanau a long way in these days when many forget to use them. He showed us humility by doing mahi when people weren't looking.

I remember as a young fella working with dad at our iwi cemetery. It was getting dark, and my siblings and I were getting scared. Dad taught us not to fear our own ancestors, especially if we were doing something for them.

When you enter Awahou Puhirua cemetery there is a sign that dad and his good friend Tamahau Palmer put up. I must ask Tamahau if it was dark when they recently put that sign up!


My Papa loved sports and was good at them. He encouraged us into many sports. That helped shape our character and friendships.

Dad holds athletics records, was a Kiwi rugby league trialist, a very good golfer at Springfield where he played pennants and enjoyed the company of his Twenty club mates. He then went lawn bowling and holds a record for winning the club champs 5 years in a row. He recently told me he only gave up bowls to teach his grandchildren trout fishing.

Dad's father Harry was a fisherman, my brother and I are fishermen and dad has many grandchildren who fish. My father taught us all to fish. He also taught us to gather kai, and there are now two generations who know how to collect mussels, kina and paua, pikopiko and watercress. My Papa grew up gathering kai and ensured his future generations did the same. Leadership manuals call that succession.

My father's full name is Michael John Bidois, but he was always known as Tommy. That's a whanau thing because his brother Walter was known as Stubby and his other brother Martin is known as Popeye. People know me as Ngahihi o te ra, but dad named me Patrick, after my koro who gave his life serving in the Second World War.

Names were important to dad. Every ANZAC day he had a roll of honour of the Ngati Rangiwewehi people who served, which is read out to remember them. Next ANZAC we will add dads name to that roll of honour.



My father was a hard-working warrior who served his whanau, community, iwi and country. He made coffins. He saw active service as a rifleman in 1 NZ Regiment B Company in Malaya in 1957 and 1958. At his graveside, our relative John Treanor, who used to call dad bro until he did our whakapapa and then had to call him uncle, read out the following:

"Tommy.

The flag you defended so loyally has been lowered to half-mast in your honour. The wreath reserved for warriors rests lightly upon you. You have served your iwi, your whanau, your Queen and your country and you can do no more.

You are hereby given your last order here on earth, known and acted upon by all those who have served.

Pass comrade/friend - All is well."

Love you dad. Moe mai ra.



Delivering more Nurses and Midwives.

Worryingly an increasing number of local people have been talking to me about the health system and how much it has changed over the last five years. In fact, they have become increasingly concerned as they or friends and family wait for an operation or medical treatment. For some they just can't get to see a GP or specialist.

At a time when our doctors and nurses and healthcare workers are under extreme pressure the Labour Government has made some terrible decisions that's made it harder to get treatment, not better.

More Wellington bureaucrats and an expensive health restructure has resulted in a considerable increase in wait times for surgery and overcrowding in emergency departments. Furthermore, there is a growing list of Kiwis who are facing increasing delays for those who need access to urgent cancer treatment.

Our nurses are at the frontline of this and are bearing the brunt of the nursing shortage New Zealand is experiencing. We now have a shortage of at least 4000 nurses and hundreds of midwives across the country.

Over the last five years we have lost 19,000 nurses from the public system, which is far more than we have trained. Nearly 5,000 have registered to work in Australia since August last year, and a third of our nurses say they are considering moving overseas.

National has a plan to change this. We will deliver more nurses and midwives to address the shortage so you can get the treatment you need. Christopher Luxon recently announced policy that will:

· Provide Incentives to encourage more Kiwis to study nursing or midwifery

To provide the level of health care we need, there has to be a significant increase in the number of people studying for a career in nursing or midwifery. National will pay nurses' and midwives' student loan repayments up to a total of \$4,500 per year for the first five years of their career. This means a nurse or midwife over five years would be \$22,500 better off.



• Bonding to retain nurses in New Zealand once they graduate

To access the student loan repayment scheme, nurses and midwives will need to enter into a bonding agreement with Government where they commit to working in New Zealand in their profession for at least five years after they graduate.

This scheme will also be open to registered nurses and midwives who are already in the workforce on a pro-rata basis. For example, a nurse who has already been in the workforce for two years would be able to sign up for the remaining three years of student loan repayments in return for three years of bonding. This will provide more support to the health sector to retain early-career nurses and midwives in New Zealand.

· Competitive immigration setting to attract more overseas nurses and midwives

Given the significant and urgent shortages facing our health sector today, we need to supplement training and retaining more nurses at home by recruiting more from overseas.

National will make it easier for competent, qualified overseas nurses and midwives to choose New Zealand as their next home by removing barriers to migration and making our offering more competitive with other countries.

We will do what it takes to ensure we get the skilled migrants we desperately need into our hospitals and other health care facilities so we can bring down waitlists and ensure Kiwis get access to the health care and maternity services they deserve.

Age Concern

Age Concern had a successful day at the Community and Family Day held at the Arts Village recently. We managed to attract several new members and the bonus was that we signed up 4 new Volunteers which are the lifeblood of our organisation.

We also supported the Breast Cancer Foundation by holding a Pink Brunch at Lakeview Villas who kindly offered the use of their clubrooms to hold the event. We had 20 people enrolled and our staff did an amazing job of the catering which meant we were able to give more money to the

Breast Cancer Foundation. Pictured are Age Concern staff at the Pink Brunch.

The Tiny Homes Pocket Neighbourhood project is moving along, albeit very slowly, and at present we are just waiting on the issuing of the Building Consent from the Whangarei District Council. Once we have this, the Contractors can begin to prepare the foundations and piles ready for the delivery. While we are waiting, we are building fences and doing some of the extensive landscaping.

We welcome Kirsten Harman back to the position of Administration Secretary, a position she was in before.

A major event coming up for Age Concern is World Elder Abuse Awareness Day which this year is on the 15th of June and is over the week of 15th to 22nd of June. Although Age Concern Rotorua does not have the MSD contract for Elder Abuse, we are still getting reports about Abuse happening and we then refer people to Family Focus.

Twenty percent of retired New Zealanders don't own their home and 40 percent of pensioners depend entirely on their \$25,000 a year of superannuation to live on. It's a grim reality for many older Kiwis who chew up a large of chunk of their fortnightly pension paying for sky-high market rents and inflated food, which increased by 12 percent for the year to March for the average household, according to the latest figures from Stats NZ.

There are increasingly more elderly people living in poverty, some of whom told their stories to TVNZ's Sunday, which included accounts of sitting in the dark or not flushing their toilet to save power and forgoing vegetables and living on two-minute noodles to survive.

Our Age Concern Rotorua member, Warwick Pryce, also starred in the programme and he can look forward to being one of the lucky recipients of the Tiny Homes.

Though no political leader will commit to means-testing superannuation, as it would amount to political suicide, there's an argument to be made for applying stricter criteria to the more recent winter energy payment policy and freeing up hundreds of millions of dollars to help those elderly most in need.

Stripping back the criteria for the winter energy payment would save \$379 million. It would mean that the people who really need the support would still get it, while the retired couple who might put it towards a holiday in Fiji won't.

Last year the Government, via Inland Revenue, rolled out a means-tested cost-of-living payment, which had its hiccups but for the most part was received by those who were entitled to it. Superannuation and the winter energy payment are administered by the Ministry of Social Development.

Currently anyone who receives superannuation also receives the power-saving payment, and trying to break it down any further than that would require MSD to have access to all forms of income received by pensioners.

There's an argument for the outdated community services card rules to be updated too. This isn't an issue that is going away, as life for those on a pension only gets harder.

The Retirement Commission says, based on current trends, there's going to be a 100 percent increase in people renting who are aged 65 and over.

Long term the balance of homeownership is expected to shift to 60 percent homeowners and 40 percent paying rent. By 2048, this 40 percent will equate to up to 600,000 people. That's a huge increase in people relying on their pension while paying market rent.

and Beyond strand of the Science Curriculum. This was a good way for our children to put their new learning into an authentic context.




Our junior school visited Parawai Marae recently. As a part of our localised curriculum, the children will learn about and spend time at each of our local Marae during their time at our school. Many of the students



Importance Immunisation Advice

The timetable of recommended vaccines is called The National Immunisation Schedule. It shows when everyone should receive each routine immunisation, starting as early as 16 weeks of pregnancy for mothers, and at least 6 weeks old for babies. For the best protection against serious disease everyone needs to be immunised **ON TIME. EVERY TIME**.

In March 2023 a new immunisation was added to the childhood schedule. BEXERO is a Meningococcal Group B Vaccine to help protect against diseases caused by the bacteria Neisseria Meningitis Group B. This bacterium can cause serious and sometimes life threatening infections such as meningitis (inflammation of the covering of the brain and spinal cord) and sepsis (blood poisoning).

This vaccine works by specifically stimulating the body's natural defence system of the vaccinated person. A common immune response for those under 2 years is a high fever, so for those children it is recommended a dose of paracetamol (pamol) appropriate for their weight is given either just before or at the time of their appointment. This vaccine is now given at 3 months, 5 months and 12 months, however please ask your Nurse about the catch up programme available for all under 5 year olds that have not started their Bexero vaccines.

Bexero is also recommended and funded for 13 to 25 year olds who are at boarding school or reside at another specified close living environment, i.e. University Halls of Residence.

Family Trusts

We had a call from a self-employed client recently: can we put her house in trust even with a mortgage on it? This led me to thinking an article on trusts might be useful this month.

The old days of what a family trust was used for are well gone, particularly with the recent change in trust laws requiring trusts to disclose much more information to beneficiaries than before. Back in the day trusts were used to protect family wealth through the generations, hide assets from Government means testing for superannuation entitlements, and protect entitlement to future rest-home care subsidies. But means testing is long gone, and in my recent experience the notion that a person can put their assets into a trust, claim they own nothing, then put their hand out to the Government (aka the taxpayer) to ask for their rest home care to be subsidised no longer flies. Yes, even if the trust was set up decades ago.

So why not? Well, a couple of reasons. Firstly, public policy reasons like I've set out above: you can't put your house into a trust then claim you've got no assets and expect the taxpayer to support you. And rest assured, the Government will ask because it is responsible for taxpayer's money too.

You see, people who have family trusts will almost certainly be using them to move assets away from their ownership and almost always try to retain a primary (first dibs) beneficial interest in those assets over other secondary beneficiaries such as adult children and grandchildren. And almost always they've been historically told that putting their assets in a family trust means they will be eligible for rest home care subsidies as well as preserving inheritances for adult children under a trust structure – neither of which is quite right.

And as time goes on, the parents decide to sell up and either buy into an occupation right with ongoing weekly fees in a retirement village (while they're still semi-independent), or one/both need to go into rest home care costing in the vicinity of \$2,000 a week and sometimes more depending on their needs and type of room (kitchenettes and private bathroom rooms cost more, as does a fridge).

But, hey ho, remember our family trust? Well, it means the parents no longer own or have full decision-making over selling their home to pay for the retirement care they need. Why? Because they gave their house to a trust and now only have a beneficial interest in the trust's assets, along with the other interested beneficiaries. Trust me, some adult children are actually quite incredulous when they realise that trust isn't going to protect their inheritances, seemingly without concern for their parent's retirement care.

One common use of trusts, still, is by self-employed people who put their homes into trust to protect their family home from any business-related liability. It is common for business owners to consider steps to protect their assets from creditors in this way, but it is equally as wise to hold professional indemnity insurance for any business liability claims, though. If you don't have insurance, I recommend talking to an insurance broker about your options.

When considering to transfer your home to a trust, what you can't do, no matter who you are or what your financial position, is put your house into trust to move assets away with the purpose of escaping existing creditor claims at the time the trust is formed including things like debts owed, taxes, escaping separation and relationship property claims, or to avoid your house getting seized as a proceed of crime, or to get rid of assets in a bankruptcy situation.

This is only a general discussion about trusts, but certainly Trusts do still have their place and are the right vehicle for some people in certain situations. If you have a trust or are thinking about transferring assets into a trust, I recommend you seek good legal advice about what you've got and how much use it really is, or get advice about your reasons for setting up a new trust.

A phishing scam 'NZTA toll' has been circulating through Aotearoa and looks like a text message from legitimate organisations like Waka Kotahi, NZ Post, Inland Revenue and a number of NZ-based banks.

Do not engage with or click any links before you know a message is genuine. Check directly with the people it came from. Scam messages commonly contain bad or irregular spelling and grammar.

Never provide any card or personal details if you do click a bad link. If you have paid money already, speak to your bank as soon as possible and let them know what's happened.

Anyone who thinks they are a victim of the phishing scam should contact police on 105 and quote Operation Lime Green. The scam text can also be forwarded free of charge to 7726. Source: DIA





"That doesn't matter to me," the man confides.


"Well... I guess one night couldn't hurt..." the woman replies. "It is cold, and I am rather lonely."


Ngongotaha Rail Park

For fundraising we sell shavings for poultry and horse husbandry. The park also sells boxed wood.



Single use plastic ban

From 1 July 2023, plastic tableware, produce bags, straws and labels are banned, and must be replaced by reusable or paper tableware, bags, and straws, or bags and straws not used. Label free produce or home compostable labels phase in until mid 2025.

Consumer Survey of Power Companies

Once again, Powershop has proved to be the retailer with the most satisfied customers and has been crowned Consumer's People's Choice. It's the third year in a row that Powershop has been awarded the title and the sixth time since 2015. This year though, Powershop will be sharing the People's Choice title with another power company – Frank Energy.

The satisfaction rating is the percentage of people who scored their power company an 8, 9 or 10 on a scale of 0 (very dissatisfied) to 10 (very satisfied). Powershop scored a satisfaction rating of 74%, with Frank Energy not far behind on 67%. Third place went to Flick Electric, a provider with a market share of just 1%. It wasn't far behind with a satisfaction score of 64%

Powershop cleaned up the competition once again in 2023. Their satisfaction rating shot up from 66% last year to 74%. Powershop customers were the happiest with what they paid for power. Powershop's customer support was also rated much higher than any other company.

Frank Energy did something right over the last year. Its satisfaction rate jumped from 58% to 67%. However, like last year it scored below the average on Consumer's questions on renewable energy production and green credentials.

Flick Electric is small, but its customers are a satisfied bunch. They rate their company highly on value for money – with 56% very satisfied, well above the industry average of 35%. There was one category where customers weren't that impressed though – 15% were very satisfied with Flick's green credentials, which was below the average of 21%.

Most of Electric Kiwi's ratings were above the industry average, making it a solid performer. It excelled when it came to competitive

pricing and helping customers save energy, where it was rated 14% above the industry average for both.

Pulse did well in the financial questions – it was rated above average on competitive pricing and value for money. But it fell just below the average on four measures – resolving problems in a timely manner, helping save energy, renewable energy production and green credentials.

Despite Genesis' satisfaction rating being just 3% above the average, it scored well in all 8 of the key attributes.

Slingshot customers gave their power company the highest rating for solving problems in a timely manner. But they didn't think much of the company's attempts to help them save energy -19% said they were very satisfied and that was well below the industry average of 30%.

Mercury's rating was just below the average but its customers rate its environmental efforts. Its scores for renewable energy production and green credentials were among the highest.

Nova's customer service got a mention for rating higher than most other companies last year. Not so this year. The only area where customers were satisfied above average was value for money.

Just 26% of Trustpower customers said they were satisfied they were getting value for money – that was the lowest score among the companies.

Contact's satisfaction ratings were below the average for every key attribute but this year it's not at the bottom of the table.

Meridian's satisfaction rating took a big hit this year. From 54% last year, it dropped to 46% this year – putting it at the bottom of our satisfaction table.

Kaimai Kaponga

This iwi-based group is doing conservation work in the Kaimai Ranges, including surveying the insect life. Here's a snippet on one of their most recent findings:

The Kekerewai - Manuka Chafer is a native beetle of the Scarabaeidae family: the Pyronota Festiva or the Manuka Chafer, which is most abundant in warmer seasons of spring and summer. Commonly found on the Manuka bush, these chafers mainly feed on leaves. They were also common during the time of pre-European contact, as a quick food source for our Māori ancestors in times of war or when food with a higher calorie intake was scarce.

Kaimai Kaponga were also part sponsors of the Mamaku Marsupial Madness mentioned elsewhere in this newsletter.
