#### **Proposed Housing Development at** 31 Ngongotaha Road

You may have noticed a digger on site recently, obtaining additional geotech samples as part of the Resource Consent application.

Watchman Residential applied for a fast-track consenting process for this development and this was approved in June 2023. The Government had a short-term consenting process to fast-track projects to boost employment and economic recovery in response to Covid-19 but this was repealed on 8 July 2023.


Extracts from the approved application to the Ministry for the Environment, subject to Work in Progress, follow.

"The Watchman Residential proposal is to develop an approximately 15.9 hectare site into a residential development comprising approximately 196 residential units and constructing supporting infrastructure including roads and reserves intended to vest with RLC including accessways, carparking areas and 3 waters services.

The project will include the construction of a new intersection with SH36, landscaping and planting of open spaces and the creation of a series of wetlands for flood mitigation on a large balance lot.

From the relevant information sources, we have identified the relevant iwi authorities for the project area, as: a. Te Arawa Lakes Trust, representing Te Arawa Iwi and Hapū b. Te Pūmautanga o Te Arawa Trust, representing Affiliate Te Arawa c. Te Maru o Ngāti Rangiwewehi Iwi Authority, representing Ngāti Rangiwewehi iwi d. Te Komiti Nui o Ngāti Whakaue Trust, representing Ngāti Whakaue iwi e. Raukawa Settlement Trust, representing Ngāti Raukawa iwi.

We note BOPRC identified all of the same iwi authorities which we consider to be relevant and Ngāti Ngararanui and Ngāti Tura Ngāti Te Ngākau iwi, which we consider their representative bodies may have an interest. We note LRC identified Ngāti Rangiwewehi iwi which we consider their representative body to be relevant and Ngāti Ngararanui, Ngāti Tura Ngāti Te Ngākau and Ngāti Tuteaiti iwi, which we consider their representative bodies may have an interest.



We have noted that both local authorities have identified Ngāti Ngararanui (includes Ngati Rautao), Ngāti Tura Ngāti Te Ngākau and Ngati Tuteaiti, however this is not supported by any other available information. We recommend they be included and their representative bodies be identified as an 'other party' which may have an interest.

We have identified the following post-settlement governance entities associated with the Treaty settlements: a. Te Arawa Lakes Trust under the Te Arawa Lakes Settlement Act 2006 b. Te Pūmautanga o Te Arawa Trust under the Affiliate Te Arawa Iwi and Hapu Claims Settlement Act 2008 c. Te Tāhuhu o Tawakeheimoa Trust under the Ngāti Rangiwewehi Claims Settlement Act 2014 d. Raukawa Settlement Trust under the Raukawa Claims Settlement Act 2014.

We have included the Te Arawa Lakes Strategy Group as a relevant treaty settlement entity. We have identified the recognised negotiation mandate relating to the project area for Ngāti Whakaue iwi. The project site lies within the area of interest for this settlement negotiation.'

Watchman Residential plan to hold a drop-in clinic on the proposed development shortly. A tentative date has been set as Wednesday 11th October from 3.00pm to 6.00pm at the Ngongotaha Lawn Bowls Clubhouse in Domain Ave. Check www.ngongotahanews.co.nz for confirmation. Readers may note that the fast-track consent does not apply to the approximately 350 homes originally indicated for the site.

And then there's the use of homeless motels for emergency housing that has become endemic in Rotorua under this government. Labour's experiments have failed and it's time to get the country back on track.



#### Kaimai Kaponga (Kaponga is Mamaku's original name)

Te Poari Newton reported on Kaimai Kaponga's activities to the Progress Ngongotaha AGM recently. They cover 150,000 hectares with a crew of 12, all of whom have been through a 3-month training programme.

The crew currently are on a Government contract to 24 June 2024 for pest eradication but are looking to replace this with other contracts in a sustainable way. Private groups are often targeting selected pests, but Kaimai Kaponga look to eradicate all pests damaging forests, crops and pasture -such as possums, mustelids and wallabies, the last being of huge concern in this rohe.

Dama wallabies – one of the smallest – and Parma wallabies predominate in our area. The crew use Garmin GPS's to track their catches- the "solar highway" - uses the animals' heat to track them.

Exciting news: Kamai Kaponga have discovered a new insect which is undergoing DNA sequencing by Canterbury University.

Ngongotaha Community Collective - 'Making a Big Difference'

Hi Everyone, Kia ora Koutou, Katoa

Firstly thank you to those who came along to our Annual General Meeting held on Thursday 21st September. It was a good opportunity to discuss topics of interest including an update on the progress of the Ngongotaha Community Emergency Response Plan (Draft) thank you Heather Brake. This was followed by an interesting thought-provoking presentation by Te Poari Newton from Kaimai Kaponga, (situated next door to Gull Service Station), see Editors article on p 7.

What a Blessing it is that our whanau is looking after our native forest, so that future generations can enjoy what our Tupuna/Elders also lived in and gathered Kai/food from. Kia kaha, John/Te Poari our Aroha is with you and your team.

#### Out and About:

What do you think about your general safety and that of others, when using our crossing outside the Post Shop? This crossing allows us to 'safely' cross this State Highway from one side to the other, but how safe is it really?

I have been shocked at the number of times that I and others have been nearly collected by a vehicle while using the crossing. I knew by the look on the drivers faces that they were just as shocked as I was. It took all of my balance ability, to stay upright long enough for the vehicle to pass through the painted lines while I stood there. Everything just seemed to slow down, I could take in every little expression on the drivers face as he looked at me with his mouth open wide.

We received an email from a very concerned resident just last week. The concerns related not only to the crossing outside the Post Shop on SH36, but to our other crossing on Western Road the email reads;

"I have contacted the Council on an individual basis on this issue without success. I am very concerned about the pedestrian crossing at the bottom of School Road over Western Road and the pedestrian crossing outside the post office. In both cases, traffic turning left is very occupied checking for vehicles advancing from the right and the crossings are too close to the intersecting roads. In addition, with the downward angle on School Road, it is extremely difficult, if not impossible, to see a young child wanting to cross the road, perhaps to go to the skateboard park and playground. In both instances, if the crossing were moved - the Western Road one by about 15 metres and the other to opposite Dynasti - the view would be much clearer and more likely that travelling vehicles would stop for walkers crossing." Have you also written to the Rotorua Lakes Council about your concerns? If you have, thank you, we have also done the same. Unfortunately, our main road is and has been a State Highway for quite sometime now. Our Council can consider, make decisions and act on concerns about our ordinary local roads, but not the main Highways. So, what can we do? Firstly, we would like to hear from you as well, email progressngongotaha@gmail.com as one of our focus areas is Community Safety. We are very interested to hear about your experiences, as well.

Well the end of another very busy term is upon us. It has been great to see some gorgeous spring days to end the term.




We return for term 4 on Monday 9th October.





#### MACULAR DEGENERATION:

#### Early Detection Saves Sight

MD is three times more prevalent than Dementia and about half as prevalent as Diabetes.

Macular Degeneration (MD) is a chronic eye disease that is currently the leading cause of blindness in New Zealand. One in 7 people over 50 years of age have some evidence of it and the incidence increases with age with 1 in 4 people aged 80+ experiencing vision loss which affects their quality of life. Alarmingly it is estimated that the number of people with MD will increase by 70% by 2030.

Macular degeneration (MD) affects the central vision and this impacts on a person's ability to drive, read, watch television, undertake hobbies requiring fine work, access websites and even recognise faces. Loss of vision impacts lifestyle and independent ageing and is associated with risks such as: falls and fracturing hips; developing and increases in depression; inability to access health services and earlier admission to nursing homes. Consequently, people with macular degeneration experience significant emotional harm while the country incurs incalculable financial costs.

Human Rights for Older Persons: Across Generations. Seventy-five years ago, the United Nations General Assembly adopted the Universal Declaration on Human Rights, a monumental document in the history of human rights.

Having a will is one of the most important things you can do for your family. Some people think assets and special possessions will automatically go to your spouse or your next of kin if you don't have a will in place, but this isn't always the case. Wills help make sure that your wishes are carried out and the people and things that matter most to you are looked after once you're gone.

If you die without a will, the process for administering your estate – or dividing your assets and possessions – can be longer and more complex for those you leave behind and may involve the court. Wills form a key part of planning for a more secure future and need to be put in place while you're of sound mind and memory, otherwise they may not be valid. If you already have a will, that's great news. Around half of all Kiwi have one, which is excellent. But it's important to make sure it's up-to-date and reflects your current situation. We recommend reviewing your will every five years, or if you've had a significant change in your life. Maybe you've experienced a death in the family, a divorce or you have a new partner, grandbaby, or fur baby.

We encourage conversations with family when making or updating your will. It can be confronting to have conversations about death, money and the future but having them early with your loved one's benefits everyone. Research reveals an increasing interest in and value placed on 'emotional' legacies, which are less about money and assets and more about passing on values, taonga and heirlooms to the next generation.

Remember that professional trustee services organizations like Public Trust are here to help guide your conversations with empathy and expertise if needed.

Local man Grahame Turner tells how he attended the Rotorua Eye Clinic after failing the eyesight test for his driver's licence. "After tests it was discovered that I had one eye with dry macular degeneration and one with the wet type. There is as yet no current help for the dry type, but fortunately there is help available for the wet condition. The treatment – the eye is numbed in a regular theatre and then an injection is used to instill a liquid which has the necessary ingredients to attack the problem. I was having the procedure done about every six or seven weeks, but now the eye appears to be quite stable and therefore I have not needed the injection as frequently as at first."






