What not to buy at Kmart – Consumer's guide (October 2023)

Anyone who has walked into Kmart for one thing and walked out with a bunch of extras knows there's a lot of bargains to be found. But not everything with Kmart's Anko brand on it is gold! Our testing has found some are duds.

Here are some Kmart products to avoid:

1. Anko 9L Twin Air Fryer \$149

This air fryer has the lowest score out of the 31 we've tested. It was easy to use and did a good job on chicken wings and roast pork, but was poor at cooking frozen thick-cut chips. It's not terrible but there are models from other brands that cost about the same and are much better.

2. Anko 1.2L Food Processor \$69

Our testing team made a long list of things they didn't like about using this food processor, although they thought it did an excellent job of chopping and emulsifying. We think you'd be better to spend just \$10 more on one that's available at The Warehouse.

3. Anko Cordless Stick Vacuum \$189

We've got test results for 40 stick vacs at the moment and this one gets the worst score. There are actually cheaper vacs on Kmart's shelves that score higher.

4. Anko 24cm Aluminium 3 Layer Non-Stick Frypan – Stone Grey \$21

Not many products get our "Don't Buy" label – but this frying pan did so badly in the test kitchen we thought it deserved it. Its surface durability was terrible and it didn't cook evenly.

Age Concern

What a busy year it has been for Age Concern. The continuing saga of the Tiny Homes, over 100 new members, the Positive Ageing Expo, the Staying Safe Senior Driving courses, several seminars, the Out and Abouters minibus trips, recruiting and training volunteers, Talking Tech on Tuesdays and various other events including our members.

Just when we thought we were ready for the delivery of the Tiny Homes, one arrived unexpectedly at Tally Ho Industries yard, and we discovered that the foundation plan did not align with the under – carriage plan sent to us to get our consent. As a result, we must go through the process of a further variation which could take up to 3 weeks and more money.

Our very special Chairperson Glenys Searancke resigned from her position on our Age Concern Council after 7 years of service. We held a farewell for Glenys, hosting a lunch at a local restaurant, and presenting her with some gifts as well as a short Ode about her life. One of our shopping volunteers, Diane Mitchell, has been given national recognition and recognized as a Dignity Champion. Apart from a letter and a Certificate she was also given a chilly bin full of ready meals from Tomorrow's Meats.

The Drop-in technology, free sessions with SeniorNet, have continued to be reasonably popular and because they are consistently held each week on Thursday at 10.00, people are using the service more. Our Out and Abouters are proving to be very popular, and we have also had to run two trips to the same venue to accommodate everyone who wants to be involved. During October one of our volunteers, Maureen, has been running some extra Social Connection activities: Easy Peasy Art, Media Studies Discussions on news events, Skyline coffee group, walking groups and board games. Most of these activities were carried on by interested attendees in Maureen's absence and have grown in numbers.

The dire situation with Pensioner Housing in Rotorua was highlighted when the council met to discuss the 23 units that are sitting unoccupied because they need to be refurbished. Rotorua's council is considering

spending \$1.6 million to get 23 empty pensioner units to a tenantable standard before leasing its full portfolio to a community housing provider. Councillors decided whether to approve a staff recommendation to add \$1.1m to about \$500,000 available to renovate the homes, valued at \$25m. Rotorua Lakes Council says its portfolio of 152 units costs about \$1.3m a year to manage. The 23 vacant units would need a full refurbishment, costing on average \$60,000 each.

The recommendation was discussed at the Community and District Development Committee meeting. If approved, the work would be done over two years from 2024 and involve community and tenant consultation. The other concern would be that if the units were handed over to a Community Housing Provider there would need to be some sort of guarantee that they would remain as Pensioner Housing and not go on the open market.

Let us hope that we do not get to a situation like Hastings where rent hikes in Pensioner Units are causing much angst. A sizeable rent hike for 220 council-owned flats around Hastings will cause "a lot of hardship" for pensioners already struggling to pay their bills.

Rents are currently set between \$117 and \$178 a week, which is slightly higher than Rotorua, at the senior flats, owned by Hastings District Council. Residents were informed last week their rent would be bumped up to \$260 a week at the end of January for all flats - an increase of at least 45 per cent. The one-bedroom homes are full and there is a lengthy waitlist, as they provide an affordable housing option for seniors.

Our main event, to wrap up the year, is our Xmas luncheon to recognize the sterling work done by our volunteers who are the life blood of our charity. This year also we are resurrecting a trophy for the Volunteer of the Year which will be a hard task, given that we have so many deserving recipients who have gone above and beyond the call of duty.

Have a safe and enjoyable Xmas season with family and friends.




The Christmas Season Is Upon Us!!



Firstly, our sincere Condolences to the Staunton Family and the Kerr Family, on the recent loss of their senior family members. Both George Staunton and Bruce Kerr were supporters of the Ngongotaha Life Memories Museum.

Bob can remember playing Rugby with George and when he had the ball, he would run a straight line to the Goal Post 'woe betide' anyone who got in the road. Bob jogged along behind just in case he was needed. The Rule was "don't take a kick at goal, give it to our 'Big Man George' and, nine times out of ten, he would just flatten the opposition players and SCORE!!!!!

George's father Jack used to deliver half pint bottles of milk to all of the Primary Schools in Rotorua, which were supplied from the Rotorua Milk Factory. That 1948 Bedford Truck showing up at school, with its milk on board, was a welcome sight for those who never had a breakfast.

Now, Bruce Kerr is a Life Member of the Ngongotaha Life Memories Museum and holds that status for all time. Bruce's father Frank, owned the Blacksmiths Shop where the Gull Station is today. The Kerr Family are a very old and respected family in Ngongotaha. Our Museum has a photo of Frank at his Blacksmiths Shop taken in the 1930's and many tamariki /children waiting for the bus outside the Blacksmiths would keep warm in the winter by staying near the forge (fire). Our rural neighbours have just received a flyer about the forthcoming A & P Show, to be held on 2 December 2023, at the Western Road site. This sparked the following 1960's memory for Bob Martin. There was much laughter as we recorded this.

The Day the Farmers Came to Town

Back in the day; the A & P Show was held in Rotorua at the end of Uta Street (then farmland) opposite the Boys High. It was quite a stately occasion for 'Country to come to Town'. This is the day that the Farmers polished their cars, and the ladies wore their best ensembles, WOW!!! The Grand Parade: Normally led by the A & P Chairman of the Association and accompanied by the beat of the Highland Pipe Band which would be up front and they would be lead by their Parade Commander.

On this particular day the Parade Commander was absent and the cattle & sheep which were being led by their handlers were up front. The Pipe Band not being organised due to some members being late, waited for the other Band members to arrive and this positioned them (continued on page 19)



at the Rear of the Parade instead of being with the Parade Commander at the front. The Farmers and their entourage of helpers, many of them children, would normally lead their sheep and cattle at the rear, showing off their ribbons of First, Second and Third class to the public. BUT !!!!! as the Highland Band was late the Farmers and helpers were the first to march off with the Band behind on a nice steady drum beat...bom...bom...bom...bom ..you get the picture.

Halfway around the arena the Bag Pipers had now finally got themselves sorted out and were 'In Step' with everyone else. BUT !!!!!!They were behind the cattle and not in front of the cattle....When the BAG PIPES squealed into action the cattle BOLTED.. dragging their handlers along the ground, jumping over the fences and disappearing into the car park, running between the parked cars and off down Uta Street towards Rotorua.

Mothers were trying to save their children, farmers were trying to stop the cattle from heading to town, and the one and only Policeman left the scene and went off down Uta Street to close the gate, but there was no gate to close. The pipers were left sitting on the ground, dodging the cattle, and Bob told his Dad "you can stick your cows": he was 14 years old at the time.

All Stock were found grazing on the arena grass and no ambulances were called and no arrests made and no one was hurt.


The End of a very good day and the Farmers left the town.





Everything has a consequence

As the year draws to a close and I find myself acting in bitter court disputes between parties about estates, inheritances, and division of relationship property matters, it is my observation that there are two common denominators to them all: 1.) money and 2.) that for every action there is always a consequence – even if not immediately foreseen.

Take, for example, an estate or inheritance dispute between beneficiaries. One party claims certain assets either are, or were to be, theirs and produces a document purporting to confirm that position (signed letters by the deceased are a classic!). 'Hmmmm', says other party, 'except over here is this other document which doesn't align with what you claim'.

Even worse when it transpires the first document had quite a bit of the original content omitted by the claimant, or other less-favourable documents were conveniently not produced either. Readers won't be surprised that half-truths and antics like cherry-picking supportive evidence will eventually be found out. And it looks even worse reputationally when the matter is already before the court.

How are things found out? Because just like a plagiarised essay, the plagiarism usually stands out because it doesn't make sense in the surrounding context. In more common division of relationship property proceedings, the same applies. For example, a dispute about whether there was a 3-year relationship in the context of a house bought together and disagreement on separation about how long the relationship was, and who contributed what financially. One party claims the relationship only began barely 2 weeks before the house contract was signed. The other party claims they lived in a rented house for several months before buying and produces dated supporting screenshots of them together and other houses they were looking at. Clearly the first claim doesn't make sense in the first place.

Another example, a couple separate, and one produces documents to show that their small business was constantly in the red and now has creditors and accrued tax arrears. The other party claims funds were diverted from the business with 'cashies' and believes they can identify those people (people turning up to the former family home and handing over cash is always a reasonable starting point ...). Trust me, a review of bank account transactions and/or business financials always tells the story, even if one party decides to hide chunks of income by operating in cash.

Meanwhile, vindictiveness sets in, all trust between the parties about what the other has been hiding goes out the window and a dispute arises about who's paying for what post-separation until things are sorted out. One party often doesn't have the means to meet the payments (usually the party with the lesser income and/or greater childcare responsibilities), and so mortgages and hire purchases etc go into default often just to pressure the other into a quick settlement, unfortunately.



What can we learn from this? That all actions have consequences, good and bad, and people can find themselves impacted in ways they hadn't contemplated much later down the track.

Credit ratings can be affected resulting in the inability to obtain credit after separation. Other documents will always find their way into the process, and the truth will eventually come out.

And there is also the uncomfortable reality that people who pay others in cash can inadvertently get dragged into third party disputes even though they've not done anything wrong themselves...
