Controlled Area Notices

You may have noticed signs recently erected in our area near waterways. Biosecurity Act CANs have been issued around all 13 Rotorua lakes because of the menace created by the discovery of Golden Clams (Corbicula fluminea) in 116 km of the Waikato River. Golden Clams are out of East Asia and can be found in North America & Europe. They attach to infrastructure and create issues around fouling water pipes, irrigation systems & hydro-electricity facilities. No-one worldwide has eradicated Golden Clams and the plan is to contain them in known areas. They are tiny organisms so thorough cleaning is important.

- CHECK Check for mud and vegetation.
- CLEAN Clean the exterior of vessels. Clean life jackets, carpets & interior of vessels with hot water. Freezing items will also be effective.
- DRY Ensure everything is dry e.g. carpets & wetsuits. Drop outboard motors so they don't contain any water pockets. Remove the boat bung and drain hull to remove any trapped water. Allow to air dry for several days before using elsewhere. Regular cleaning also makes your boat and gear last longer, reduces vessel running costs because you'll use less fuel and reduces maintenance costs.

Deputy director-general of Biosecurity New Zealand Stuart Anderson says "Wash stations are just one tool to help prevent the spread of the clams. It is critical that boaties check, clean, and dry their gear if they have been in the infested part of the Waikato River or lakes and before moving to another waterway. These requirements mean people can enjoy the Te Arawa lakes while keeping the freshwater gold clam out. We thank fishers and boaties for their patience during this time. "The designated wash station is at The Wash Place, 338 Te Ngae Road, Rotorua. This is a commercial facility and there will be a cost. Additional mobile wash stations will be introduced.



Delivering in 2024

There is a lot of work to be done and the Coalition Government has been working hard to deliver on the 100-day plan we announced at the beginning of December last year.

The "UTE Tax" has now ended. The previous governments scheme offering subsidies to individuals buying electric vehicles, whilst imposing taxes on hardworking farmers and tradies who have little choice about the type of vehicle they need for work, was inequitable and financially irresponsible. The scheme paid out more in rebates that it received in charges making it the taxpayer who footed the bill to cover the costs.

Blanket speed limit reductions have now been removed. Instead, Transport Minister Simeon Brown will implement a new rule to ensure that when speed limits are set economic impacts including travel times, and the view of road users and local communities are taken into account, alongside safety. This will include the implementation of variable speed limits on roads approaching schools during pick up and drop off times to keep our young people safe.

Our new school year has commenced, and our Primary and Intermediate school students will spend at least an hour each day on reading, writing and maths preparing our young people for greater academic success. Schools have also been preparing to implement the cellphone free learning environment. The policy will enable increased student engagement,

greater concentration, and better wellbeing.

I was pleased to recently announce that all New Zealand dairy products are able to enter China tariff free, with the end of safeguard duties on milk powder starting. This is good news for our dairy sector with the removal of these tariffs expecting to deliver additional annual tariff savings of approximately \$350 million.

33 new graduate Vets have been accepted into the Voluntary Bonding scheme for veterinarians. This will see them work in rural communities across New Zealand including Rotorua. Each recipient receives funding to help pay off their student loans providing a significant head start to their career, whilst boosting much needed veterinarian support in our rural communities.

There is much more work to do. Prime Minister Christopher Luxon has restarted the parliamentary year early so that the government can get on with the work that needs to be done to get New Zealand back on track.

Revelations in our Bush/Ngahere

20,000 previously unknown insects discovered in Kaimai-Mamaku!

Kawai Kaimai's invertebrate project is working with Steve Dawson from the University of Canterbury, Scion entymologists and summer interns from Toi ki Tua to monitor insect life in the Kaimai-Mamaku bush. The process of monitoring involves the use of a high-tech malaise electronic tool on various sample locations and comparing over time.

The purposes of the study are multiple: checking whether overseas insects have migrated from the Port of Tauranga, and observing whether pest eradication of possums, rats, wallabies and deer is helping to increase the population of insects. Also, the 6 interns from Toi ki Tua are on a scholarship, which will enhance their academic credentials for future endeavours, and University of Canterbury and Scion are furthering their scientific knowledge about newly discovered insects.

Furthermore, this knowledge will be shared with schools in workshops on 8 and 9 February, culminating in community engagement sessions for Ngongotaha School and Ngongotaha residents. Further down the track, Aorewa Creative are planning a documentary on the work being done.

What you can no longer put in your recycling bins

From February, all district and city councils will accept only glass bottles and jars, cans, paper and cardboard (including pizza boxes), and plastics numbered 1, 2 and 5 in their recycling collections.

Plastics 1, 2 and 5 include milk, soft drink and juice bottles, large yoghurt containers, 2L hard ice cream containers, cream cheese, sour cream and cottage cheese containers, some dip containers, and some tomato, BBQ, and mustard squeeze bottles. It also includes meat trays and some takeaway containers.

New items excluded from kerbside recycling are items less than 50mm, aerosol cans, liquid paperboard, plastics 3, 4, 6 and 7, aluminium foil and trays, all lids and items over 4 litres.

Plastics 3, 4, 6 and 7 include small yoghurt/sour cream pottles, styrofoam, PVC pipes, polystyrene, biscuit and cracker trays, pill packets, some dip containers, soft plastics (plastics you can scrunch in your hand such as biscuit and cracker bags and trays, packaging from bread, rice, packaged vegetables and fruit, shiny gift wrap) and some tomato sauce, mustard and BBQ squeeze bottles.

Saving money on fruit and veges

Frozen and canned produce - these are just as good for you as fresh. Frozen/canned produce generally maintain nutrition levels because they are usually packaged soon after harvesting. They are often cheaper, plus they last way longer and allow you to eat your favourite produce out of season. When you're buying canned, check there's no added sugar or salt.

Rejected or 'imperfect' produce. - An alarming amount is wasted because it doesn't look good enough for supermarket shelves. Online initiatives such as Perfectly Imperfect, Misfit Garden or Wonky Box are combatting this issue by selling reject veges at affordable prices. Countdown has also introduced The Odd Bunch range with the same idea: funny-looking produce for less.

Local farmers' markets or greengrocers -often these have lower prices than supermarkets, as they focus on what's in season and locally available. As a bonus, you'll be supporting agriculture and small businesses in your

Community gardens and vege co-ops- you may have access to a community garden in which you can care for a plot and grow produce eg at Ngongotaha Rail Park. Or check out public boards or Facebook groups to find out whether gardeners have excess produce that might otherwise go to waste.

How unit pricing can keep your grocery bill down

For most of us, working out which supermarket item is the best value requires some tricky head maths that we simply don't have time for at the supermarket.

Enter unit pricing – it's when we can see the cost per unit. For example, how much we're paying per 100g or 100ml. This also helps us decide whether a "special" price is really the best price.

From 31 August 2023, mandatory unit pricing regulations made under the Fair Trading Act came into force. Supermarkets have a year's grace period before they must comply with the regulations. They get another year - until 31 August 2025 - before their websites must display unit pricing too. Smaller stores, under 1000sqm, don't have to display unit pricing – but if they choose to, they'll have to stick to the unit pricing



Age Concern

Another year is upon us, and it is a blessing each day to wake up and look forward to each new challenge with renewed energy. Our population is getting older year by year and the roles of organizations, like Age Concern, are becoming a more vital link and support to the elderly.

We are looking forward to the final completion of the Tiny Homes which have now taken over two years and have been fraught with delays and hold ups, causing a great deal of frustration and angst, and I feel for the winners of the draw who have been waiting since last March.

Our new Chairperson, taking over from the long serving Glenys Searancke, is Kath Henderson who was elected at the last Council meeting of last year. We wish Kath the very best for the future as she takes the helm of a charity that has its sights set firmly on the future of our elderly, growing old in an environment that recognises the huge contribution they have made, and continue to make, to society. Age Concern have re-signed the lease with Parksyde, so it looks as if we will be in our present premises for a while yet. Although we have become very busy and almost outgrown the office space.

We drive on our roads every day. For many of us they are our lifeline – driving is a means of independence, social connection to family and friends and access to essential services. With the generous support of Waka Kotahi (NZTA), Age Concern offers free Staying Safe: Refresher Courses for Older Drivers all over New Zealand to help keep older people safe on the roads.

The theory-based refresher course is an opportunity for people to refamiliarize themselves with traffic rules and safe driving practices in a friendly and relaxed environment with other older drivers. The course includes information on other transport options available to help keep you mobile for as long as possible, whether behind the wheel or when you stop driving.



How to register for a Staying Safe: Refresher Course for Older Drivers

To register for a Staying Safe Refresher course for older drivers, contact your Age Concern Rotorua, 07 347 1539 and ask for Karyn. All of our staff are trained assessors for Total Mobility, which is designed to help people who can no longer drive, and it gives them up to 75% off taxi fares. Age Concern have just formed a partnership with Driving Miss Daisy which has the same conditions. There is an up-front cost involved but you do not need to belong to Age Concern to be eligible so just give us a ring to get a time to be assessed.

Once you turn 75 there are a few changes to the process for renewing your driver licence:

- Your new licence will be valid for only two to five years.
- You need to present a medical certificate each time you apply.
- If recommended by your doctor, you will have to sit a 30-minute Onroad Safety Test.
- The renewal fees are lower because you are renewing your licence more often.

A free lunch is also provided as the courses generally are run in the morning at different venues and you do not have to be a member of Age Concern to join in.

The first major activity Age Concern will be running for 2024 will be a Member's Big Day Out which will be a Garden Party to welcome our new and old members to 2024. While many people have been enjoying the balmy weather, the heat could be hard on elderly people. It can really exacerbate some health problems that are just made worse by heat-related things. So, for older people, it's just important that they find ways to keep cool.

Keeping hydrated was key. Maybe just sipping water slowly through the day or having just some cool treats that are low in sugar but have got that high water content.





Whats happening with real estate now

I've written a few times about what's going on in the residential real estate market from a lawyer's perspective in the last 12 months.

Now the election is behind us and the holiday season largely over, there seems to be a definite increase in confidence and activity in the market so far in 2024. But with bank finance still not being that easy to get, coupled with high interest rates, it's still not all roses out there.

The activity I'm seeing includes an increase in my reviewing agreements for clients before they sign in multi-offer situations (ie: multiple buyers making offers on the same property at the same time), and an increase in reviewing auction agreements, too. And virtually every conditional contract includes what's called a 'vendor escape clause' of 3 or 5 working days.

This means a seller can accept a second contract on the same property and lawfully give notice to a first contract buyer to confirm unconditional or be cancelled on within the specified number of days.

But the biggest change is people selling only if they can find a suitable replacement property, and on-buying a replacement property only if they sell their existing property (among other due diligence conditions). And that's where the worth of a good lawyer and real estate agent come in: getting all the dates right and lined up can be crucial.

Here's a hypothetical scenario: Sue is selling her home and moving to Australia. Tim and Lou make an offer to buy Sue's property subject to finance, LIM, building report, and the sale of their existing home within 12 weeks. Sue is concerned about timeframes, so on advice from her lawyer and her real estate agent Sue adds a short 3-day vendor escape clause in case a better offer comes along.

Over in the agreement for the sale of Tim and Lou's existing home to their buyer John (subject to finance, LIM, and Building Report

On advice from their lawyer and real estate agent they also add a clause that their sale to John is subject to their securing a replacement property (hopefully Sue's) within 12 weeks. The upshot is multiple conditions across multiple agreements where if one agreement falls over on issues arising from LIM, building report, title, or sale and on-purchase, the rest could also potentially fall like dominoes.

A few weeks later it turns out Sue gets a much lower cash offer with a quick settlement from David. Sue gives Tim and Lou 3 working days' notice to confirm all their conditions, or the agreement will be cancelled.

Tim and Lou can't meet Sue's notice because John can't confirm his finance that soon (he's finding the bank being tougher than expected on his finance application) and he's also raised building report and LIM issues. Sue cancels. John's agreement is separate and continues regardless though.

In a more buoyant market, a potential buyer might have been dissuaded from looking at a property any further if it was already under contract, or in a chain like the scenario above. But as we see here, literally anything can happen along the way.

My takeaway from this article is if you're in the market to buy a house and find a property that's already under contract, don't be put off - talk to the listing agent about making a conditional back-up offer in case the other agreement falls over.

Anything can happen in the current market for a myriad of reasons and people's personal situations can change significantly during the sale process too. Who knows, you just might be surprised and find yourself being David with the better offer after all!
