# Ngongotaha Road businesses are coming back to life!

We are pleased to welcome back Indy and his team at Lucky Star Indian Takeaway. After fire closed their store, they managed to continue their service to Ngongotaha residents through their Old Taupo Road branch but they are now back on site.

The Village Store is expected to reopen mid-September, with new shelving already on site, and stocking up taking shape. Welcome back!





Issues with Housing estates in Auckland (Flat Bush 2021 and Ormiston 2022) have been linked to the developer of 31 Ngongotaha Road, Marcus Jacobson of Watchman Capital.

Auckland Council won a successful prosecution against developer DDL Homes Limited for repeated breaches of conditions of their resource consent and the Resource Management Act 1991.

The seven breaches, between 5 August 2021 to 15 December 2021, relate to earthworks undertaken without adequate or effective erosion and sediment control and contrary to the approved sediment and erosion control plan and include charges for contravention of an enforcement order issued by the Court. In the Auckland District Court, the company was fined \$60,000 for failing to comply with those conditions while completing a development at 15 Hera Street, Flat Bush.

In his judgement, Judge Jeff Smith noted the adverse effects of sediment discharge on the environment and to water, including the direct impact on waterways and organisms' living environments. Companies Office records show Marcus Jacobson as the sole director of DDL Estates which is in receivership & liquidation. Source:

Having receivers take control of a 105-home under-construction Auckland housing project surprised buyers of Ormiston's DDL housing project. But having their contracts changed three days before the receivers were appointed has further startled some of those caught up in it. Buyers who contacted the Herald said their original long-standing contracts were with DDL Estates, directed and owned -by his company Rua Whare – by Marcus Brian Jacobson. When approached for comment, Marcus Jacobson stated the actual developer of the Flat Bush project was Harjit Dheil and he (Jacobson) was there as a professional trustee acting at the behest of Arena, the funder. He stated that Watchman has an example of "a large riparian planting completed in Mahia Road, Manurewa, Auckland. This was a full riparian margin planting with stream remediation and fish ladder included to enhance the environment. Auckland Council use this project as an exemplar for other developers to go and look at the quality of planting and outcome created."

Ngongotaha News has approached Todd McClay MP for further assurances about the Ngongotaha project and will convey the response when available.

### 1 July Tax relief take effect as interest rates start to fall.

The last few years have been extremely challenging as food and rent costs have increased and inflation and bank interest rates have reached extremely high levels. All of this takes money out of the pockets of hardworking kiwis and makes it harder for them to make ends meet.

Ngongotaha is a vibrant community full of people who care deeply about where they live – but they too have felt the effects of the rising cost of living.

The Coalition Government has been working over the last 9 months to get costs down for kiwi families and to rebuild the economy. We've focused on reprioritising spending towards the front line – health, education, and law and order – whist reducing government spending away from the back office so you can keep more of what you earn.

Tax relief from Budget 2024 has now kicked in, with a focus on low to middle income earners and families with younger children. We've increased personal income tax thresholds by adjusting tax brackets upwards meaning an average household is \$60 a fortnight better off. We've also increased the in-work tax credit meaning working families with children are on average \$78 per fortnight better off.

The new FamilyBoost payment, which reimburses families for a portion of their early childhood education fees up to \$150 a fortnight also started on July helping those who work with childcare costs.

This work we've done over the last 9 months has seen inflation start to fall and the Reserve Bank drop the Official Cash Rate by 0.25 percent. This in turn flows through to lower interest rates with many of the major banks starting to reduce the rate people pay for their mortgages.

There is still a lot more to do to support businesses and rebuild the economy – but more money in the pocket of kiwi families is an important first step as we continue to focus on bringing down costs.

**Lamb**, **Kid**, or **Calf** Classes: Trophies and ribbons will be awarded to the place getters, with the opportunity to represent the school at Group Day the following week.

Horse Class and Dog Class for Years 5-8 Students.

Open Class: Includes birds, rabbits, mice, rats, hamsters, etc.

Work is being done to ensure the safety of all students and animals. We are fortunate to have an extensive grounds and so able to spread the various events. We look forward to seeing all the wonderful pets and their proud owners! **Group Day**: Group Day is on Friday October 25th and information around it will be shared closer to the date. Only lambs and calves are eligible to compete for the championship rings. Additionally, there will be an open ring available for students who want to participate and try their hand at showing.

**Local conservation efforts**: It was fantastic to see each of the classes visit our local bush last term to learn about and help with conservation efforts. We are relaunching our school trapping club and including weta boxes, bird feeders, and tracking tunnels. Later in the year you will see further planting and development of our sensory

garden area, along with planting of two new native tree groves within the school and domain. There are several opportunities for students and families to get involved with local conservation efforts through the Kaharoa Kōkako Trust.



## Eastern Region Lakes are the Best in Years!

The Rotorua lakes look to be in fine shape as we move toward the opening of the fishing season on Tuesday, October 1st 2024. (ending 30 September 2025, subject to local regulations.)

Fish & Game's monitoring of the lake fisheries over winter has indicated trout populations are good, and fish size is up on previous years by a significant amount.

The country's most popular trout fishing lake, Lake Rotoiti, has produced a number of trophy fish over the winter. Excellent growth has also been monitored on Tarawera and several of the region's other lakes.

Eastern's streams and rivers have generally wintered well as we run into September. A look into flood damage after last season's cyclones has shown many waterways have fared better than expected. If the weather continues to be settled in September anglers can expect some great fishing this opening.



This photograph shows that Ngongotaha was just a small Village with a large Farming area and the newly developed Fletchers Mill, which itself began in 1961. Another main feature shown was that Western Road was known as the 'Rotorua to Tirau Highway' back then, so the existing road to Hamilton (SHW 5), as it is known today had not been started.

This is a treasured possession for our community, as very few Aerial Photographs of Ngongotaha were taken back then and it is exceptionally clear and in excellent condition.

It's not a White's photograph, so unfortunately we do not know who the photographer was, nor which company flew at that time. So, if anyone knows who would have been using a camera at that time, and any other information it would really be appreciated. R.W.M Contact Lynn 3574565 or 0221404391 or

### The Pros and Cons of Prepay Power

### How does prepay power work?

Much like when you have a prepay phone, with prepay power you top up your account to keep it going. To top up, you make a payment through a website, app or text message. With Globug, you can also top up at a convenience store.

The main prepay providers in New Zealand are Globug, Wise and Contact Energy.

### Why prepay power might sound like a good idea

Sometimes prepay might be your only option. If you've had your power disconnected and have a poor credit rating, it can be hard to find a new power company that will take you on. Prepay power is also marketed as a way to avoid bill shock, as there's no monthly bill, and a way to see how you're using power and what it's costing you. If you're thinking about signing up for prepay, there are some big downsides to be aware of.

### The downsides of prepay power

### When you don't top up, you don't have power

When you're on a traditional power plan, you'll get a few reminders to pay your bill before you're eventually cut off. With prepay, if your credit gets below a certain amount and you can't afford to top up, the power will be disconnected.

### Going without power can start to feel normal – with risks for your household

Once you've realised you can avoid paying for power by going without it for a while, it can start to feel normal to do this regularly to get through hard times. This can have knock on effects, such as the food in your freezer thawing out and becoming unsafe to eat, or your family getting sick because they're not living in a healthy warm home in winter.

### Prepay power could cost more than power on a plan

While power prices fluctuate, when we've looked at the cost of prepay power in the past we've found it can be more expensive than the cheapest non-prepay options. Before you make the switch, it's a good idea to check the kWh rate you'll be paying and compare it to what other plans cost.

### There are usually fees involved

There's also usually a fee each time you top up. If you can only top up a small amount each time, these fees will soon add up.

### You can't get cheaper power during off-peak times

Some power companies now offer cheaper power during off-peak times, such as in the evening or on the weekend. This can help people save on power by changing when they do things – like running the washing machine and dishwasher at night. This isn't an option with prepay.

In June, Powerswitch users found a record average of \$524 in annual savings. That's a whopping \$200 more than last year. More than 250,000 New Zealanders have checked Powerswitch in the last 3 months and plenty have saved money by switching. ### **Age Concern**

After such a long wait and continual frustrations, our tenants are finally in their tiny homes and couldn't be happier. We still have not got our full Code of Compliance signed off, but we are not far away. The homes are now being managed by Ray White Rental Division and have all had their Healthy Homes inspection to ensure they are in rentable condition. We have applied to the RLC Matching fund for our working bee using volunteers and donated goods to match funds with the Council and allow us to purchase some of the things we are now unable to purchase because of the long, drawn-out process to get them established. I am looking forward to the day when I no longer must think about where and what to do next.

Our major event coming up on the 21st of September is our annual Positive Ageing Expo which will be held at Parksyde from 9:30 until 2:30, on that day. To date we have an amazing number, and variety, of charities and business who all deal with some aspect of the elderly health and wellness and are happy to answer questions about their organisation.

Age Concern will be recruiting new members and have prepared a welcome pack chock full of goodies for those new members and volunteers who sign up on the day. Last year we had about 60 new members sign up which was amazing. We are also on the lookout for new volunteers and the goodie bag is available to new volunteers who sign up. If you have a business that deals in any way with the elderly we have a few stalls available for free for Not-for Profit and \$250.00 plus GST for businesses.

Housing for the elderly continues to be at the forefront of all the

issues facing retirees as the number who are retiring without owning their home is on the increase, and the super does not go very far these days with regular costs of rent, power, insurance, vehicles, phones, broadband, groceries, etc let alone the unexpected bills for health care, dental and miscellaneous.

Despite Age Concern being involved in the submission process, the RLC are going to proceed with the alternative plan they proposed in the Long-Term Plan. Age Concern was against the proposal because there was no guarantee that the rents would remain the same and there was no guarantee that the units would remain the exclusive use of pensioners, and the 24 unoccupied units need to be refurbished sooner rather than later.


The Lakes Council owns about 152 pensioner flats and of those 24 are vacant and are awaiting a refurb before they are occupied. RLC are looking to remove themselves as landlord and hand it over to a Community Housing Group.

There is a long waiting list for the housing and at present the ratepayers are subsidizing the units and the RLC have agreed to invest over \$2.2 million over the next two years to do the refurbishments.

### PLEASE DE-SEX YOUR KITTEN/CAT NOW

Ngongotaha, like many towns in New Zealand, has a problem with stray and feral cats and kittens. Cats and kittens need to be de-sexed, otherwise they continue to multiply with kittens having kittens all in a very short time frame. Stray and feral cats wander the area scavenging and often killing native wildlife to survive.

Diseases such as toxo plasmosis can be transmitted to humans and other animals. Education programmes would be helpful to understand the problem and associated issues with stray cats. There are some people in the community working to help stray cats. There is an opportunity for more progress to be made with a joined up approach.

Organisations such as SPCA, Rotorua District Council, Bay of Plenty Regional Council, Department of Conservation and MPI together with local vets are an important part of community collaboration.

SPCA (07 349 2955) have limited resources but may be able to offer a subsidised micro chipping and desexing package.

### The Real Estate Market

There's been a bit of movement reported in the finance and real estate sectors in the last few months, and certainly we're starting to see it on the legal conveyancing side, too.

The new Government has settled in, a bunch of landlord investor tax deduction policies have been reversed, and the brightline capital gains litmus has been reduced back to 2 years (it went from 2 to 5 to 10, now back to 2), banks are slowly dropping interest rates currently, and there does seem to be a bit more confidence in the market overall.

So, what are buyers doing? Well, there's a big glut of properties sitting in the \$700-\$850k bracket, so buyers have lots of choice IF they can get their lending over the line (most homeowners have a mortgage).

The trouble is main trading banks are still currently proceeding cautiously with what they will lend against, and how much. This is because they are restricted in their lending ability by the Reserve Bank whose job is to control inflation by stipulating lending criteria (e.g. loan to value or loan to income ratios – LVR/LIR).

So, while a buyer might have loan pre-approval so they know what their house price budget is, that doesn't mean their bank can or will actually lend that figure on any property unless a valuation stacks up. To top that off, one of the main banks requires their approval of LIM and Building Reports and will turn down finance on a property if they're not happy with those.

I would add here that it is also worth checking with a mortgage broker about non-bank mortgage lender options in the market, too. My experience in working with non-bank lenders for clients is they are competitive and aren't stymied in their lending decisions by Reserve Bank policy. Approaching a non-bank lender might be just the ticket to get you into a property initially if you're a bit short on meeting stringent main bank lending criteria.





What are vendors doing? Well, some still have high expectations of price and think that just because government and lending policies have changed, that values are pushing near where they were in the post-Covid boom.

One of my vendor clients recently said they'd had no interest in 6 weeks on the market and had to adjust their price down by \$20k to move into the under \$750k bracket. They got a good offer straight away.

The other interesting thing vendors seem to do is think they need 3-4-5 real estate market appraisals - and it's probably the appraisal that suggests the highest sale price that's going to get the vendor listing because that's human nature, right? Yet all appraisals are put together from the same information based on location and/or statistics from comparable property sales.

At the end of the day a property is only going to sell for what the market will pay, and secondly what a lender will agree to lend against a property.

There is nothing worse than a scenario of heightened sale price that falls flat, or seeing a contract tipping over because the property is oversold and no one will lend against it leaving the parties to try and salvage a deal by re-negotiating the price down via lawyers. It leaves a sour taste and is wasted time and cost for all parties.

The value in choosing a good agent is one who can guide you through the stress and realities of the market and the sale process and out the other side so everyone is happy. I think it's the same when choosing a lawyer, too. Sometimes, focusing only on the money can cost you a lot more emotionally in the end.
