What's Happening at the Agrodome?

The Agrodome on Western Road was started in 1972 by Godfrey Bowen and George Harford.



In 1953 Godfrey Bowen became 'world-famous in New Zealand' when he broke the world record by shearing 456 full-wool ewes in nine hours at Opiki, Manawatu. A British newspaper once compared Godfrey Bowen's shearing with the 'grace' of Nureyev's dancing. The key to the Bowen technique was using the non-shearing hand to stretch out the skin on the sheep to produce an evenly shorn fleece. Uneven fleeces left more wool on the sheep (or on the woolshed floor) and failed to attract the highest prices. The method was eventually adopted by shearers all over the world, adding billions of dollars of value to the international wool industry.

Ngai Tahu, the owners of the Agrodome since 2011, now run 3 shows and 4 tours daily. The National Kiwi Hatchery from the old Rainbow Springs site has been transferred to the Agrodome farm on the Dansey Road side, and is visited as part of a tour. The Hatchery takes kiwi eggs from the wild (where only 5% would make it to adulthood) and, through their careful conservation methods, 65% will make it to adulthood. Ngai Tahu are gearing up to involve the Ngongotaha Community more. Children particularly will appreciate the playground, and the presence of Shaun the Sheep and friends. There is a souvenir shop and an upgraded restaurant which is available for functions and casual dining. Also, a monthly Farmers Market is being held on the last Sunday of the month from October to April.



Locals are invited to attend their forthcoming Locals' Day on 10th November in conjunction with aMAZEme and Velocity Valley with proceeds going to the Ngongotaha Fire Station and Fish and Game (details on page 9).

On 21 September, the Ngongotaha Sports Association held their very successful Wild West Gala themed Awards Night.

Many talented locals were recognized, with one player, Jessie Wharekura receiving awards for MVP, Most Points, Players Player and the Joe Tauiwi Memorial for Most Outstanding Club Person of the Year. 
Butterfly Garden visit- Sunday November 10

David Fischer worked to establish a butterfly-friendly garden in Rotorua. Neil Hunt Park Native Butterfly Habitat is an area of about one third of a hectare behind the clubrooms. It was once a small quarry which has been planted in native plants and trees to create a small oasis of wilderness in the city.

In particular the habitat has host plants for our native butterflies. Ongaonga (stinging nettle) for the Admirals and Muehlenbeckia for the coppers. If the weather is fine there is a good chance of seeing a red or yellow admiral.





FamilyBoost childcare payment registrations open.

Earlier this year I assured families in Ngongotaha that the Coalition Government would deliver on tax relief and help with the cost of living. For families balancing work and childcare, ECE fees can be a significant cost.

Registration has now opened for families with young children to claim for the FamilyBoost payment to help with early childhood education costs. FamilyBoost will help by reimbursing up to 25% of ECE fees, with up to \$75 per week or \$975 every three months.For example, a couple earning \$150,000 and paying \$350 per week for ECE can expect a refund of \$731.25 for the quarter. Families with different income sources, including self-employed parents, are also eligible, and single parents earning \$85,000 can receive a refund of \$812.50.

Separated parents sharing custody can each apply for FamilyBoost, each receiving refunds based on their ECE payments and income levels.

Families earning up to \$180,000 can register now through Inland Revenue's myIR, and from 1 October, claims can be made for fees paid between 1 July and 30 September. If your child attends one of these local

ECE centres, then you could be eligible for support under this programme.

Open Class: Includes birds, rabbits, mice, rats, hamsters, etc. ONLY ONE ANIMAL PER STUDENT







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AGE CONCERN

Age Concern Rotorua held a very successful Positive Ageing Expo at Parksyde on Saturday 21st of September. We managed to attract 4 more stalls than last year and those who attended for free were treated to a variety of stalls and a mine of information. Most stalls were free Not for Profit, but this year we attracted 8 businesses who paid for their stall. During the time we were open, about 300, mainly the elderly, came through and Age Concern were able to attract several new members and new volunteers. We also signed up people for several new programs we will be running soon. Just Cook4 Healthy Ageing, and Steady as you Go which is a proven balance programme. We also had our newest addition which is a Cookbook with favourite recipes from our members. The next major event we will be involved in is the International Day of the Older Person, which is a day set aside, internationally, to celebrate the older person. We will be setting up a stall at Woolworths Supermarket to give out information about us and what we offer.

Age Concern Rotorua has secured some funding to run a programme entitled Just Cook4 Healthy Ageing. This programme caters mainly for those elderly who have recently lost a partner and would like to learn how to cook a cost-effective nutritious meal. We are hoping to be able to involve some High School Food Technology students and their cooking rooms to have an element of Intergeneration practice.

Adequate housing is still a high priority for our elderly and one of the main reasons why we set up our Tiny Homes, although it became a nightmare and took way longer than anticipated as well as costing us an extra \$75,000.00 with all the RLC variations we were put through. We will be having our official opening on the 10th of October and inviting all those who have been involved in their development.

Many of you will have been following the Tiny Homes saga over the last 4 years. I was humbled to receive an award from Age Concern National which recognised the work I have done over the last few years to ensure that some Age Concern members, who have fallen on tough times, are housed in safe and healthy rentals that do not cost too much. The presentations were made at Parliament by the Minister for Seniors, Casey Costello.

Many more New Zealanders will be renting in their retirement, but the country's rental market isn't prepared for that silver tsunami. The demographics of New Zealand's renters are changing.

With the decline in home ownership and ageing population predictions are that there will be around 600,000 New Zealanders aged 65 and over needing to rent a home by 2048 – a 100% increase on 2022 levels. It means the assumption that New Zealanders will be settled in their own

mortgage-free home by the time they turn 65 no longer holds.

A study of more than 700 landlords, eight property management companies and nine build-to-rent operators showed surprising results. The private rental sector is unlikely to meet the demand for age-friendly housing. Age-friendly housing means housing that is accessible, that's configured to prevent injury for older people to live in, that is healthy and affordable and secure as well.

New Zealand is not well placed now for the major shifts that are starting to happen and will pick up pace in the years to come. The quality of New Zealand's existing housing stock is one problem. Housing in the private rental sector tends to be less well maintained and less well positioned to support people.

There's a problem with the quality of the housing stock that's already built, and the pipeline of new housing has tended to be larger dwellings and not built to accessible standards. We're missing that supply of smaller, accessible one to two-bedroom properties that have handrails or modifications or kitchens and bathrooms that are appropriate.

The issue is also exacerbated by councils selling off pensioner flats and not enough social housing being built. For those who are most financially vulnerable, where are they going to go? Some older people are already struggling to find somewhere suitable to rent.

We are seeing a greater number of people that are struggling to get a private rental in later life or might be having to move on from where they've been for quite some time. It's a huge stress trying to find an appropriate rental.

With 600,000 older renters due to enter the private rental market in the coming years, landlords should know being able to provide them with good quality housing is likely going to be good for business.

Ensuring the rental market is ready for an ageing population would benefit everyone. People living in poor housing that isn't safe for them can increase their likelihood of having accidents and of going into aged residential care facilities or hospital care, which is so much more expensive.

If the system can keep people ageing in their house rather than needing hospital care or medical intervention, that's going to be really useful for keeping our health expenditure lower at a time where it's going to go up because the population is ageing anyway.

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Why is it so expensive to fly domestic?

A recent Consumer investigation found the cost to catch one Air New Zealand domestic flight had nearly quadrupled, with other flights anywhere from 34% to 178% more expensive in July 2024 than when they were originally booked in 2019 and 2020. Stats NZ data confirms an increase, with domestic fares up 47% from the start of 2019 to 2023

Even in the face of market challenges, like recovering from Covid-19, inflation, and paying back a sizable loan from the government, our national flag carrier posted one of its highest ever profits last financial year - \$412 million, following a \$591 million loss the year before. Despite Air New Zealand forecasting a smaller profit for the 2023-2024 financial year, there's still good reason to question whether prices are fair.

Air New Zealand said its costs have risen more than 30% since 2020, while its domestic airfares have only increased by 22% on average. Our selection of flight comparisons showed there are much larger increases at play here, so what accounts for the difference? Dynamic pricing, also called surge pricing, refers to airlines' practice of varying the price of tickets based on demand. Customers booking indemand flights pay more than customers who book earlier.

Jetstar confirmed it used dynamic pricing. A spokesperson said, "Our prices vary based on a range of factors, including the level of demand, peak periods like school holidays and whether bookings include optional extras ... we're committed to ensuring we offer consistently low fares and choice to our customers." Air New Zealand declined to comment on its use of dynamic pricing practices.

Some commentary suggests dynamic pricing gives customers more choice. But anyone who has had to book a plane ticket on short notice knows dynamic pricing appears to reduce choices rather than enable them. Instead of dynamic pricing providing consumers with options, we think it provides Air New Zealand with a chance to bump up profit margins.

Each route operated by the carrier has 14 levels of fares called classes. This information is published on a version of Air New Zealand's website designed for travel agents rather than consumers. The data on the site shows a basic fare from Auckland to Dunedin, with no add-ons or checked bags, can cost anywhere from \$109 in class 1 to \$520 in class 14. This is for the exact same flight. Booking later could cost you nearly 4 times as much.

It's unclear just how much Air New Zealand is making from the prices of tickets in the higher classes, or whether the inflated prices are fair or reasonable. Without any transparency, there's concern that this pricing behaviour could be considered price gouging.

Legally, a business can charge whatever price it likes for a good or service. Price gouging, and other predatory and discriminatory pricing practices like dynamic or personalised pricing, aren't illegal. If a trader isn't misleading you, or likely to mislead you, they're in the green.

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But increases in air fares over recent years, dynamic pricing practices and a lack of competition on regional routes means New Zealanders can no longer tell what a fair deal is. To dispel this doubt, we need greater transparency into the pricing practices and rationale and profits of our largest airlines, Air New Zealand and Jetstar.

Consumer is calling for:

- mandated breakdowns of the costs in a ticket at the checkout
- disclosure about airlines' use of dynamic pricing and profits
- a market study to give consumers and the industry clarity about the factors impacting competition including pricing and price gouging.

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

The Homemade Will

Will disputes between beneficiaries is one of the saddest things to be involved in as a lawyer. And it's worse when a dispute revolves around a homemade will. While lawyers are always alert for signs of coercion, duress, and undue influence when an elderly person makes a new will or changes an existing one, the oversight isn't there when it comes to a homemade will.

I have seen quite a few homemade wills over the years, and in my experience the scenario almost always goes like this: an adult child, other relative, or close friend takes on the role of primary support person and bears the bulk of supporting the deceased in the deceased's home in the last few years or months of their lives. Often, other family members are not able to devote the time needed to help, may live too far away to realistically help, or may quite literally be shut out of what's going on. There are usually frank discussions among family about the deceased moving to a care home for professional care and support which suggestion is not usually well received by the support person or the deceased. Things carry on day to day. Communication starts to shut down, and the deceased becomes more and more vulnerable and dependent on the support person.

Along this end of life journey, the deceased may have a change of heart or change of priorities about their estate linked to the support they are receiving. Other times that change comes because of coercion, undue influence, or duress attached to the support person. Instead of going to the bother and cost of seeing a lawyer, the deceased makes a will with a will kit bought for them or something that's been typed or written up for them - typically organized by the support person. And you guessed it, frequently the bequest provisions in the homemade will favour the support person.

Once the person has passed away, out comes the homemade will and the inevitable estate dispute unfolds. Unfortunately, the support person has not recognised the perceived impropriety attached to their role in the making of the homemade will. Did they have a hand in influencing, coercing or pressuring the deceased to make the provisions in their will as they did?

Their response is usually self-preserving along the lines that the deceased wanted their help in organising the will and didn't want the fuss of seeing a lawyer or they stand firm that the will is 'what the deceased wanted'. There is usually a firm belief they are 'owed' over others for their support. The perception and views of other interested beneficiaries surrounding the making of the homemade will is often quite different. Often those concerns are warranted.

The point is this, homemade wills pose an increased litigation risk because they are usually always a problem in either the legal formalities around dating, signing and witnessing, or because of the content and/or circumstances surrounding the making of the will. I have seen very few homemade wills that don't end up incurring extra legal costs to the estate (and ultimately the beneficiaries), either sorting out validity or the homemade will provisions being challenged through the court. Challenges to wills and estate provisions are reduced with proper legal advice in the first place.
