Ngongotahā Rallies for Salvation Army as Kick for a Cause Raises \$12.5k

Ngongotahā's community spirit was on full display over the weekend, as the third annual 'Kick for a Cause' event brought together well-known locals for an afternoon of friendly football in the name of a good cause.

Hosted at Ngongotahā Football Club in Stembridge Road, the charity football event saw more than 50 prominent personalities - including CEOs, school principals, and community leaders - lace up their boots and take to the pitch for two exhibition matches to raise funds for Rotorua's Salvation Army.

While the scoreboard tallied 13 goals across both matches, the biggest win belonged to the Salvation Army, with the event raising just over \$12,500 in cash and canned goods to support their vital foodbank services. Rotorua Salvation Army's community ministries manager, Darnielle Hoods, expressed deep gratitude for the support. "This will go towards

our choice model supermarket, meaning we can provide kai to those in our community who really need it."

The event drew its largest crowd yet, with around 300 enthusiastic spectators waving homemade banners and cheering from the sidelines. For Alan Cobby, one of the organisers, this community spirit was the highlight of the day.

"The players gave it their all for a great cause and had a lot of fun on the field. The crowd was with them and got behind it, creating an amazing atmosphere and sense of community," Cobby says. For those unable to attend in person, the entire event was captured on camera and streamed live online by the event's sponsor and broadcaster, Local Gecko Productions. Through this event, and previous editions in both Ngongotahā and Hamilton, Kick for a Cause has now raised over \$30,000 for the Salvation Army. Organisers extend their heartfelt thanks to everyone who has supported them. They look forward to bringing the event back to the community again in early 2026, and welcome expressions of interest from anyone who may like to be involved.

Our Venturer section (ages 14-18) has been hard at work earning funds for their big AdVenture early next year by helping a past member family with a big garden project. This builds a picture of any animals of concern and can help the AC team to better understand the local landscape. Good information can ultimately lead to prevention or even prosecution in the event of an attack.

On behalf of the Ngati Rangiwewehi war veterans committee I would like to invite you all to our ANZAC @ AWAHOU MARAE day starting at 10am on Friday April 25th 2025. This is a public event that we look forward to hosting you at. The main purpose of our hui is to remember those from Ngati Rangiwewehi who served in armed forces.

Aotearoa. My saving grace was the warm interiors of the cottages and accommodation we stayed in which had triple glazing and awesome heating.

Please spread the word in our communities as the best advertising for these types of events tends to be word of mouth. Our day will commence with a welcome from Ngati Rangiwewehi kaumatua. We will have formalities including the laying of wreaths, the reading of the Flanders Field poem and the remembrance reading of those from Ngati Rangiwewehi who have served. Our day will end with everyone having a kai in our wharekai followed by socialising at our Awahou activities club behind the marae if you choose to do so.

This is a whanau event and children are most welcome to attend.

How has 2025 started for you?

This has been a particular busy one for my wife and I. We were invited to the Netherlands and UK for business events in January. This saw us staying in the Utrecht, the Netherlands and travelling to places such as Manchester, London, Ghent and Brugge. It was an excellent way to start the year although it was a bit cold for me. A bit like when I used to stay in the Awahou river a bit longer than I should have.

The lakes did not quite freeze over enough to ice skate on them during our time there, but the waterways had ice over six inches thick on them. It felt a bit strange wearing my thickest jersey and coat in January, especially knowing you were all sunbathing and swimming in rivers back here in heating.

Having said all of that, my wife loved being in the cold and was hoping it

would snow! I guess opposites really do attract.

We then went from the highs of travelling to the UK to having to do a trip to Melbourne for the funeral of our friend's daughter aged 35 who had been murdered. It was a very sad occasion which highlighted the terrible stats of domestic violence in Australia where 7 women had been murdered in 4 weeks through domestic violence. It was good to be able to attend the tangi at their home alongside other friends from Aotearoa who had made the trip to support them.

The whanau had their daughter at home for a few days before the funeral which gave us and them space to mourn in semi-privacy. There were many tears shed as well as laughter as people remembered the precious life that had been terribly taken.

I have attended many funerals in homes over the years and it has certainly become an accepted practice here in Aotearoa. I especially like how whanau are able to have that first night together on their own in their home sharing their farewells and grief before the many arrive over the next few days. Funerals are never easy. But farewelling our loved ones is

important for all involved.

We stayed in Melbourne for a week before coming home and going to Taranaki for a week to attend the national Te Matatini Kapa haka competition in New Plymouth. The real added bonus was seeing our mokopuna who now live in New Plymouth. However, it was nice to attend such an amazing event in such a beautiful place after the Melbourne funeral.

The Kapa haka event was made even more awesome when our Kapa haka team from Ngati Rangiwewehi, based at Awahou came second. Our whanaunga (relatives) did our tribe proud and upheld the mana of Awahou.

Congratulations to Ngati Whakaue from Ohinemutu who won the event. In all a very successful event for Te Arawa Kapa haka and all of the teams who travelled. Na mihi ki a koutou katoa.

Last weekend consisted of travelling to Kihikihi for the National Rodeo champs, returning home for the Bay of Plenty Superstock champs before sneaking down the lakefront to watch the fireworks. The next day saw us sitting in the sun at the lakefront (without jerseys and coats on) watching the same Kapa haka groups from Te Arawa perform for their home crowds. Awesome weekend. I hope your year and weekends have been awesome in 2025. Whether it has been travelling, sunbathing, swimming, comforting others or watching sports and Kapa haka. All the very best for 2025 to you and your whanau.

Te Waititi Stream Mouth Wetland Project 2025

Before Christmas 2024, two volunteers, Tracey and Chris came to help with clearing willow, alder, and wattle from the wetland.

Since Christmas we have had two working bees, 8 volunteers on the first occasion, 4 on second occasion, the conclusion of which is that we are getting older and maybe the best thing we can do is to clear the overgrown track which exists, somewhere in the thicket, clear it of bramble etc so that the peninsula can become an easy stroll.

We started this wetland project back in 2016, now we are all 9 years older ie we are in the mid 70s and above, the best that we can hope for is to clear the track, open it up for all to enjoy. George from EnvBOP came on our first outing. George was full of knowledge of wetland plants and had a very handy App on his phone which identified plants with ease. George and I spent a good 2 hours cutting and poisoning willow, alder and wattle.

On the second outing, Graham and I finished off the willows that George had cut and we cleared 2 clumps of willow along the edge of the water to keep the path dry. Whilst Graham and I were busy down the water's edge, Kevin turned up but didn't see us, that's how dense the wetland has become. The sun being its usual hot self, shone down hard on us and we managed to do a good couple of hours before knocking off. Graham has spent a few evenings pulling out the broom, the more we remove, the more we find to remove. With our limited resources we are best to focus our effort on opening up the path around the peninsula.

We will have a working bee the ANZAC weekend of April 26 & 27, Saturday and Sunday mornings with a view of clearing the "coastal" path around the peninsula. Any assistance is most welcome. As for the birdlife, swallows are in abundance especially in the early evening, the pukeko come and go strutting their stuff. The seagulls and dotterels play their game of "Not in my Space", they are not there every night. As for the mouth of the Waiteti, EnvBoP have dug out some of the tree stumps with a view to improve the flow.

I recently met with Lucy from Predator Free BoP, signed up and have one rat trap to test out down amongst the wetland plants. We'll see how things go.





Team Tōtara: Maketū Beach Camp: Our senior students had a fantastic camp in March, staying at Whakaue Marae in Maketū. A huge thank you to all of our whānau who attended to support and encourage their tamariki, and to the kaiako for their work in organising and helping things run smoothly.

Campers participated in a variety of fun activities, including:

Rock climbing and using the vertical slide and leap of faith at Rocktopia; Swimming, jumping, sliding, and climbing at Waimarino (water adventure park in Bethlehem);



"Well," The boy replies. "It definitely wouldn't be a great loss, and it probably wouldn't be an accident either."


As a Year 7 biology teacher, I was teaching my class about the flow of blood in the body.

Housing remains a huge problem for many of our members as can be shown by the latest research results. Almost 50,000 pensioners are also receiving an accommodation supplement to help cover their housing costs, and there's a warning that the bill is going to keep growing.

The accommodation supplement is paid according to a person's income, assets and accommodation costs, and is designed to cover rent, board or home loan payment. The amount paid varies according to location but the maximum a single person with no children can get is \$165 a week.

Data from the Ministry of Social Development shows there were 48,789 people receiving NZ Super and an accommodation supplement in December, up from 47,223 in December 2023 and 34,279 in December 2019.

There were 928,029 people receiving NZ Super in total. The share of pensioners also getting an accommodation supplement was steady at about 5 percent but as the number of retirees increased, so too did the number receiving that extra support.

For people who are poor and old they get not just NZ Super but a myriad of other support services, as they should because they need it. But it was something that could be left out of modelling of the future cost of an ageing population.

When NZ Super was designed, people were more likely to own their own home and increasing home ownership was expected to diminish housing pressure as a source of old age poverty. We are dealing with the opposite, an ageing population with more people reaching old age with a mortgage or no homes. The burden on social assistance from housing is going to increase.

Right now, housing assistance totals around \$2.5b which includes support provision to seniors. This may well grow over the longer term as the aged population grows. It doesn't seem especially material in its own right but we assume the Treasury will look at this when they do their statement on the long-term fiscal position of the NZ government, which is due for publication this year.

First Quarter House Observations

Well, we're well past the 2023 elections and change in Government, Christmas and New Year has been and gone, hot cross buns are in the supermarkets, and apparently the economy is 'turning a corner' as it crawls out of the worst slump since 1991 according to politicians and media. So, what does that look like at grass roots for the housing market?

Well, the Government made changes to tenancy laws recently which has increased confidence in private landlords coming back into the market. I've seen a few deals in recent months under the \$400k mark and more people indicating their purchase is for a rental investment or family member, so the lower to mid-price housing is definitely there. The other thing the Government has done is move the brightline test back to 2 years freeing people up to buy and sell more regularly if they want without fear of being stung for property tax on their sale.

Driving round Rotorua and surrounds there is certainly a huge number of town houses being built, which reminded me of a recent visit to Christchurch where the private townhouse concept has taken off in leaps and bounds. Sure, the ones we are seeing locally are likely Kainga Ora builds but, at some point, people are going to have to realise higher density is the living style that is the way of the future and we'll be seeing more and more private developments all over the place as they become more accepted.

The Government has changed the rules around minimum lot size, too, so that means the ability to better utilise and infill the existing city residential land footprint. Also, those building projects need sites, houses removed, sections cleared and prepared, contractors and staff to do all of that and the build, and building products, too. All of that positively contributes to the economy one way or another.

I've also seen confidence in the local market with the launch of a permanent Rotorua office at The Redwoods Shopping Centre by large national real estate chain, Property Brokers. And Mike Pero Real Estate recently announced it had been sold with a national re-brand to Raine & Horne which has already re-branded and launched locally. I've also had a few private sales across my desk already this year, so that avenue is definitely worth looking at if it's the right property or sales method for you.

And what are banks doing? Well, they still seem to be lending cautiously with obvious concerns that inflation and the impact of what's going on in the world right now could impact the cost of money (meaning people could end up with mortgage interest rates they can't afford). Interest rates are unlikely to revert back to the low rates we've enjoyed in the last few years, with higher rates certain to be the new normal.

A few Banks have reportedly recently cut interest rates to under 5%, so that is positive for homeowner cashflows. Banks are also competing for both new and existing customers with very good cash-back incentives for taking out new lending, too. I always tell my clients to ask their bank or mortgage broker for a cash contribution from the lender if they've not already.

Overall, what I've been seeing this year already is a lot of positive anticipation in the housing market as sellers take the plunge and get back in the market because they've held off long enough. Buyers on the other hand are taking their time and looking for good deals. Even though contracts are definitely taking longer for conditions such as finance, LIM, Building report and so on, the contracts that are signed up do seem to stick. Overall, things do really seem to be feeling much more positive locally, and all that filters down into the local economy and community and makes us all feel more positive and confident in our city.
