

Rotorua Airshed shakes off "Polluted Status"

On 24 May, Rotorua officially lost it's reputation for particulates in our air. For years, monitoring in Rotorua showed the city struggled with poor air quality over winter, primarily due to wood burner emissions being trapped by the city's unique topography.

At its worst, Rotorua was the city with the worst winter-time air pollution in the country, impacting air quality and those vulnerable to respiratory issues. Over the past 15 years, a series of measures have been introduced by Regional Council to address winter-time air quality issues. These include banning older style burners, launching an extensive education campaign, and enhancing compliance efforts.

Understanding the 3G shutdown at the end of this year

Mobile network providers in New Zealand and around the world are shutting down 3G networks to make way for faster and more power efficient 4G and 5G technology. This means customers who are still using 3G reliant devices, not just phones, will need to update device settings or upgrade to a newer device before the networks are switched off to retain connectivity. If you are affected, there is support available to make this transition and ensure you stay connected. This page will explain everything you need to know about the 3G shutdown and how it might affect you.

What is 3G and why is it being shut down?

The 'G' in 3G, 4G and 5G stands for 'generation' – the third, fourth and fifth generations of mobile technology. As technology evolves over time, older generation technology types are shut down to make way for newer and faster types. Many operators around the world are shutting down their 3G network.

Shutting down 3G provides more room for 4G and 5G networks, bringing with it increased consumer benefits, ranging from faster internet speeds, improved call quality, and faster media-rich data activities like video streaming.

3G technology was first introduced in NZ in 2006 and while it has been a reliable technology, closing these networks will free up radio spectrum that will be used to increase the availability of more highly capable 4G and 5G services, especially in rural areas.

When is the 3G shutdown happening?

All 3 mobile operators will be turning off their 3G networks in 2025.

• 2degrees will close its 3G service from late 2025.

- One NZ will close its 3G service by 31 December 2025.
- Spark NZ will close its 3G service from late 2025.

What does this mean for customers?

Most customers won't need to do anything as they are already using more recent 4G and 5G capable devices. Customers who are still using 3G-reliant phones may need to either upgrade their phone to a newer device or make changes to their software or settings to make sure their device continues to connect.

After the 3G shutdown devices that are 3G reliant in any way will simply no longer connect, so calls will not go through. This includes calls to the 111-emergency number. It is important that you check with your provider directly if you are unsure whether your mobile device is affected.

Some business customers also have other 3G devices that will also be affected, including lifts, vehicle trackers, alarms and other systems which may use 3G to connect. These customers should contact their suppliers to discuss whether they are affected and how they plan to upgrade them. Specific device information is available on all mobile providers' websites, or you can contact your mobile provider directly if you have any questions or concerns.

Will I still be able to make emergency calls on older devices?

Once the 3G network is shut down, phones that are 3G reliant for data or calling will no longer connect. This will affect consumers ability to call 111 emergency services so it is important that consumers upgrade their devices. If you are unsure if your device is 4G capable, contact your mobile provider directly for more information.

How can I check if my device is 4G ready?

Affected models vary but customers can find a list of compatible devices on your mobile provider's website, including those models which are 3G only.

OTHER FAQS:

What if I didn't purchase my phone from my mobile provider? Some phones purchased overseas or from local importers have different specifications and may not be compatible on your mobile service provider's network. Customers with these devices may need to change the settings to use 4G or 5G for voice. More information about this can be found at 2degrees, One NZ or Spark

Will my mobile work for international roaming?

Operators around the world are shutting down their 3G networks so you will need a 4G or 5G phone for mobile roaming services. For 4G or 5G voice calling when overseas, you will need to ensure that your phone supports both VoLTE (voice over 4G) and VoLTE roaming. Check on your mobile provider's website to confirm that your 4G or 5G phone supports VoLTE and VoLTE roaming.

Do I need to change my SIM card when I upgrade to a new phone?

This may depend on the type of SIM card you have and the type of device you are upgrading to. If your old SIM card fits into the new devices' SIM card slot, then you are sorted.

Can I recycle my old 3G device?

Yes, you can donate your old device easily and for free via the TCF phone recycling scheme RE:MOBILE, with mailing or physical drop off options which are easily accessible. Drop your old device into any mobile store, or one of 480+other drop off locations across New Zealand, where they will be passed onto RE:MOBILE to make sure all reusable parts are recycled.

Age Concern

Age Concern Rotorua have some funding from Head office to provide some Health Promoting programmes for the 2025 -2026 period.

The programmes we have decided to attempt are: Aqua Jogging which is a new programme which will be free to participants and continue with our theme of improving fitness in a low impact environment.

Another new direction is following on from our Innovation win where we supply our members with frozen meals. We hope to be able to erect a glasshouse, some internal raised gardens, and provide some vegetables with our meals. Our frozen meals are a great hit, and we are giving away a lot of meals each day, as well as using a variety of outside charities to provide us with the meals.

The other programmes carry on from the ones we have already successfully started this year: **Steady as you go** which is a dedicated Age Concern balance programme, has now grown to 3 programmes run by volunteers and a new group will start up later this year. **Walkers with Walkers**, after a slow start (excuse the pun) has picked up and we now have some regulars who enjoy the walk and the social connection following.

The Seminar Series has proven very popular with the latest Seminar on Wills and Enduring Power of Attorney attracting 37 participants. We still have the majority to do using last year's funding. These are very worthwhile and desirable so make a point of coming along as they are free and very educational, not just for the elderly.

One of our generous members, who wishes to remain anonymous, gifted Age Concern \$10,000.00 to be used on a project of our choice. In discussion, we have decided that because of the popularity of the Out and Abouters and the minivan being used almost full time, that we may use it to purchase a smaller people carrier vehicle which can carry up to 7 or more members. How lucky are we though, as another of our generous members has donated her vehicle to Age Concern as she is not confident that she will get her driver's license next time around.

Funding for wages and general running costs is becoming more and more difficult as there is less money being generated by the pokie machines and some bars are shutting them down completely. While on the one hand this is making things harder for charities, it is a good thing that less is being generated.

Some good news for the elderly over 65 years

The Government will spend \$7.7 million on upgrading and enhancing the SuperGold card after years of the scheme being "neglected". It will also be shelling out more than half a million dollars to pay for a digital literacy program to give seniors computer skills training. NZ First leader and Deputy Prime Minister Winston Peters said the changes to the GoldCard would make it a "super, SuperGold card". Minister for Seniors Tracey Martin who made the pre-Budget announcement, emphasized how important the scheme was for over 65-year-olds in New Zealand. According to the latest figures, there are more than 750,000 SuperGold cardholders across the country.

An interesting take on an old misconception

All the lonely people — where do they all come from? A famous line from a Beatles track that we all know. If you think they're in retirement villages or living alone in their own home, you're wrong. More likely they're at high school or University, statistics and psychologists reveal.

A deeply ingrained stereotype that old age = loneliness has wrongly led us to believe that grey-haired nana - let's call her Eleanor Rigby - is lonely. Her friends are filling the obituaries, she is afraid to drive so can't get out as much, her family have left town, only a cat and talkback radio fill the void. Perversely, her grandson is more likely than she to report feeling lonely, as he seeks real connection through social media. He is unsure where he belongs, who his real friends are, even who he is or where life is taking him.







Kia ora Koutou, Katoa, Hello Everyone!!!

These months are flying by, aren't they? What is on our radar this month? We have noticed that we have some empty shops appearing again. The Hairdresser in the Hub Dairy Block has closed down and the Fruit and Vegetable shop next door to Wheat Sheaf has gone as well.

Several years ago ex Cr Bob Martin noticed the same thing happening and was very proactive in establishing a shop, which sold second hand goods (moving into the shop vacated by Cottage Flair). He also made a space for Progress Ngongotaha Inc to set up their very first community accessible office. This service was called 'The Village Focus' and some of you will remember how convenient it was to visit 'The Village Focus' to engage with a Justice of the Peace and to have him or her to witness something important for you.

You could also talk with any of our visiting Rotorua Lakes Councillors, about things Council i.e. Long Term Plan, rates, future developments and the like. You will also know that it was where our Ngongotaha Life Memories Museum began its life nearly nine years ago.

I know that 'James and wee Kiwi' (Big Teddy and little teddy) sitting outside on a chair delighted many of our visitors and locals alike. There was a dog called 'Charlie' who was walked by his Mum on a regular basis past our shop. Charlie's Mum would stop, while she caught up with the happenings of the week. Charlie simply flopped onto the footpath for a well-earned rest.

On other occasions both Bob Martin and Colin Brake were outside, large as life sitting very comfortably in large arm chairs situated out on the footpath. People stopped and talked about all sorts of really 'important stuff:' we often made a cuppa to go with the chat. Really great Community Building Fun!!

People don't stop outside of empty shops, there is very little life outside of empty shops. There is definitely no life inside either. It leaves those passing by with questions as to why the shop is shut? Is this the sign for potential future closures? But more importantly, we are losing some of our most important community minded people.

For example, I know that Pervinda (sp?) who ran the vegetable shop with her husband, was very keen to be involved in our community. Her interest was to become involved in the environment, she could not get involved immediately, as they were working really hard to set up and strengthen their business. However, she expressed an interest to become involved at the Ngongotaha Awa (river). In particular she wanted to help with any planting Working Bees.

There are many among us who can remember the days of the late Des Craig IGA, Andy Burnett, Charles Sturt, Salesh Patel, and the difference that they each made to our Village community. Each of these business people and retailers were a positive influence on Village Life. Like us at the 'Village Focus' they were never too busy to chat and to find out what was on the minds of those in our community. They worked quietly at times, sponsoring some of our rangatahi/young people in their sports and academic lives. Some even made sure that our seniors with special needs were catered for. We have retailers and local business people today, who are very much the same.

The last Ngongotaha News May 2025 shared that the Ngongotaha Sports and Community Association "had successfully upgraded the training lights for its playing fields, made possible through the incredible support of the community." It also mentioned Grant Plummer the co-owner of our Four Square and rugby sponsor and the difference he is making to our community. We have businesses and retailers in Ngongotaha whose owners are very much involved and generous towards our community and they don't ask much in return. Let's support them and hopefully save them from the need to close their door for the last time. We can make a difference.

I don't know about you or your whanau, but I do try to support as many businesses and retailers as I can in Ngongotaha. Please can I encourage you to do the same? 

Migration and Asylum

It would be fair to say the world is currently in a state of deep unrest, driven by politics, war, and the relentless struggle for power and control. International media reports highlight tragic and heartbreaking events, with the poor and vulnerable often impacted the most. In the last decade in particular, millions have sought better lives or safety in other countries, sparking diverse perspectives on immigration and asylum.

For decades there has been significant migration of people to new countries, particularly after World War II where people from Europe and the United Kingdom migrated to places such as Australia, New Zealand and America to build new lives. From Government perspectives, this is a win-win as it brings skilled workers and expertise, and often foreign money and investment.

Asylum also sees migration of people to other countries seeking safety from poverty, war, persecution and so on. International agreements addressing asylum largely took shape in the aftermath of World War II.

The 1951 Refugee Convention, expanded by the 1967 Protocol, became the foundation of international asylum law we see today, along with other international agreements protecting civil and political rights among ratifying countries. In addition, the European Union has the controversial Dublin Regulation which requires asylum seekers to register in the first EU country they enter to prevent 'preferred asylum country shopping'.

Broadly, the international agreements recognise the right to seek asylum or protection on certain limited grounds (although asylum is not guaranteed) and protect against forced return to home countries while a claim is being heard through the courts. The basic rules of asylum are where a person faces a real chance of harm in their home country due to race, ethnicity, religion, political opinion, nationality, membership of a particular social group (EG: LGBTQ+), torture, arbitrary deprivation of life, or cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment.

But times have changed over the last decade and arguably so has the global political and public appetite toward immigrants, due to actual and perceived abuse by overstayers and asylum seekers. Why? Because a new migrant cohort has emerged: the so-called 'economic migrant' - those who leave their home countries in hope of better economic opportunities elsewhere, then claim refugee status but don't meet the refugee or protected person criteria in the first place. Claimants simply arrive, then rely on the length of time, often years, to process large numbers of claims through the courts in the hope they will get to stay. Others simply overstay any visa or disappear and live under the radar.



The key issue for Governments is people risking their lives trying to get to UK and Italy on small or unsafe boats organised by human smuggling networks (with passengers tragically regularly dying) or trying to cross into America from South America in similar dire circumstances.

A secondary key challenge for host countries and their taxpayers is the government's responsibility to fund support for new arrivals, especially when taxpayer-funded social services—such as legal aid, housing, healthcare, education, and welfare—are already under strain meeting the needs of their own citizens.

It has been reported these cost countries billions per day. Governments in the UK, Europe and America are right now actively clamping down on arrivals to try and deter illegal migration and disrupt human smuggling and other criminal networks.

New Zealand has overstayers and also receives asylum seekers at its borders, though in far smaller numbers compared to other countries. New Zealand operates under the same international conventions and protocols as other ratifying nations or follows applicable immigration policy for visas etc. Interestingly, New Zealand also resettles up to 1,500 refugees annually through the Refugee Quota Program, with an additional quota of up to 200 for large-scale emergencies, such as conflicts.

This article is intended to give readers a broad but interesting overview of international law behind migration and asylum, including relating to New Zealand, which we're perhaps not as familiar with on a day-to-day basis.
