

Conservation remains a big focus for us. Our trapping programme continues to reduce the number of predators in our beautiful environment thanks to our volunteers who check our traps and move them strategically around the course. For the year 24-25 we were able to rid the environment of 55 rats, 67 mice 10 possums, 4 rabbits, 1 stoat and 1 weasel! These numbers are significantly down on previous years which we hope is a positive sign although we are very aware this is an ongoing commitment as predators never give up, but nor do we! We will be planting more native plants at the end of August with the help of Mamaku and Ngongotaha Schools. This will complete one specific area: thanks to Environment Bay of Plenty for the funding that made this possible.

Supporting seniors and families during tough times.

As the economy starts to recover, for many it is still hard to make ends meet. It's clear that when the Government took charge things needed to change. So far, we've tackled inflation, dropped mortgage rates and introduced a number of initiatives to make things easier, including for seniors.

This year the Government addressed rates rises and the financial stress it places on seniors who want to enjoy their hard-earned retirement or go to the local café and not worry about the price of a sausage roll. To make things more manageable for SuperGold Cardholders we've made targeted changes to the Rates Rebate Scheme. From 1 July, the income threshold increased to \$45,000, expanding eligibility to thousands more. The maximum annual rebate will rise to \$805, and those receiving only NZ Super will automatically qualify if their annual rates bill exceeds \$2,000.

Senior citizens living in Ngongotahā are among an estimated

66,000 more who will be able to access financial relief that wasn't available to them previously. You can apply through the Rotorua Lakes Council or download a form online.

I've also heard from local families how challenging it is balancing expenses. Childcare is a stress factor, which is what the FamilyBoost initiative aims to help with. As of July, qualifying families are entitled to a refund of 40 per cent of early childhood costs up to a maximum payment of \$120 a week. The maximum payment a family can now receive is \$1560 a quarter, or \$6240 a year.

We'll continue to focus on economic growth and finding ways to help ease things for you and your family.

This term has started with weather extremes - from very soggy, wet days to gorgeous fine winter days with heavy frosts and icy roads.

We have a couple of new staff members who have joined us this term - Whaea Rosa, who will be teaching in Whakairo (Y7/8) for the rest of the year; and Whaea Ashley, who is a learning assistant working with some of our tamariki who need a little extra support.

Parent-Teacher Interviews: In the first week of term we held parent interviews to discuss each child's progress and achievement so far this year. This is always a great opportunity for our kura and whānau to work together to support every student's learning journey.

Tuckshop: Our Friday tuckshop opened this term, with lots of new items chosen after consultation with the students. All profits go to the year 8 Legacy Project - this year they are hoping to build a court for 'wall ball'.

Projects: The PTA have generously funded a revitalisation of the **junior sandpit** in the front corner of the school. As part of this redevelopment, there will be a new fence built along the corner of the playground as this is a dangerous place for children to cross the road, especially when wet.

With council funding we have developed the tree grove and boardwalk (in 2024). The final piece of this project is the '**Tipuna Project**', where we are having sign boards made that tell the local stories students are learning at school in line with the Aotearoa NZ Histories curriculum.

The **Community Oral Health Dental Service** is visiting us this term to do dental checks and treatments for all students enrolled with the service.

Sports Camp: A group of intermediate tamariki from Kaharoa and Selwyn Schools have been training in preparation for Sports Camp at Tōtara Springs near the end of this term. They will be competing against other schools from around the North Island in a range of different sports.

Ngongotaha Sport's Exchange: On Thursday 24th July a group of year 5 and 6 students from Ngongotaha School visited our school to compete in different sports, including netball, soccer, basketball, and rugby. These exchanges are a fabulous way



for tamariki from both schools to connect and build friendships, with a dose of healthy competition. Many of

these children will attend Western Heights High School together in year 9. Our children put in 100% effort and displayed the values of sportsmanship and respect for their opponents.



The Hall is also an Emergency Response Hub for Initial Registrations: In the Event of an Emergency in Ngongotaha, the Ngongotaha Community Hall is the first place to go to, to Register. It doesn't have any overnight stay facilities and anyway the best option is to stay home if safe enough to do so. It would be good to hear that you and your whanau/family is safe.

This Hall is a Taonga/Treasure and it too has had volunteers step up, offering help to make improvements to the interior and one lovely person took all of the Hall Curtains away, 'one by one' or 'two by two' to clean. Kaharoa Catchment Group

Landowners and members of this group visited Dave Reeve's Farm on 6th July for a Farm Pest Management Field Day. Pest control contractor Tim Day talked about the pest control plan he has developed for Dave's property, the importance of being clear about what you can achieve (and realistically maintain), and ensuring that what you do is done well!

We travelled around the farm amongst the beautiful blocks of Tawa forest, admiring the pre-feeding being undertaken using a trailer load of carrots from Ohakune and seeing what Dave's traps had caught overnight. Dale Williams (BoP regional Council) and Graeme Young (Kaharoa Kokako Trust) gave us an impressive overview of the trapping options available.

To be a member you need to pay an annual registration fee of \$20.00 for a single and \$25.00 for a couple and generally be over 65 although we do have exceptions to the age limit.

Age Concern have had a change of staff recently and the existing staff have had a swap around with jobs. Karyn Rogers has now got responsibility for Keeping Safe (Senior driving Course), Steady as you go (balance classes), Visiting Service and volunteers and Aqua Jogging which will be on a Friday at 11am.

The new Administration/ Secretary is Bethany Gibson who will also do some finances and the Maintenance Service Handyman coordinator and on-line shopping. Diana Walker will be the Wellness Coordinator and Walkers with Walkers. Volunteers will do Just Cook4 Healthy Ageing, Out and Abouters and coffee groups. All staff can do Total Mobility Assessments which gives a 75% discount on taxi fares. All are welcome to phone and make an appointment and you don't need to be a member.

A major event for Age Concern Rotorua which is coming up is our annual Positive Ageing Expo which will be held at Parksyde on Saturday 27th September from 9:00 until 2:30. Entry is free and we have over 30 stalls, all dealing with some aspect of Positive Ageing amongst our elderly. More details as we get closer to the event.

New data paints a picture of an ageing workforce and indicates the weekly hours worked by women will increase over time, while men will cut their working weeks shorter. Stats NZ's national labour force projections indicate the future size, age and sex of our future workforce along with average hours and years worked. The figures indicate that the labour force will continue to expand with population growth, but that growth will slow in the long term.

The workforce is also anticipated to age, with participation among males

and females aged 65-79 years expected to more than double by 2078 when this age group would make up 10 percent of the workforce. The number of Kiwis working past the age of 80 is expected to grow 389 percent by 2078, when workers over the age of 80 will make up 1 percent of the workforce.

Around 44,000 people over the age of 80 are expected to participate in the workforce, compared to 9000 last year. The rate of ageing in the workforce is particularly notable when compared to historical figures.

The median age of our workforce increased from increased from 35 years in 1988 to 43 years in 2013, then eased to 41 years in 2024 following sustained net migration gains.

Stats NZ's projections indicate that half of the labour force will be over 43 years by around 2040 and that the median age will be over 45 by the late 2060s. While the share of the labour force aged 65 or over is projected to increase further, the share of all New Zealanders 65 years and over who are in the workforce – which has been increasing since the late 1990s – is projected to decline, or at least stop increasing, in years to come. The projections, which consider future fertility, mortality and migration, were published several weeks after Stats NZ published its national population projections.

New Zealand's population is expected to grow at a slowing rate over the next 50 years, but the slowing of labour market growth is more dramatic. By the 2070s the workforce is expected to hit a 50-year low of 0.3 percent.






Mamaku School

EnergyMate comes to Rotorua this year

EnergyMate can help you with targeted support about electricity supply through in-home visits and community hui. Households at high risk of energy hardship can be referred into the program by their power company, their local participating budgeting support service, or participating Healthy Homes support services.

At an EnergyMate visit, a coach will do a check of the home, including heating, lighting, hot water, and appliances to find ways the whānau can save on power. Then they can use those savings where they matter most.

They will review the household's electricity bill with the whānau, explaining what it means and different payment options. Then, together with the coach, the whānau will call their power company and check they are on the power plan best suited to their needs. The coach will help the whānau build an action plan of the things they can do to save power and keep their home warm.

EnergyMate coaches can also connect households with support from other agencies like budgeting support, free curtains and insulation to help address the drivers of energy hardship. Whānau feel the benefits of an EnergyMate visit in various ways. For some, EnergyMate will help reduce their monthly power bill. For others, it will help make their house warmer in winter without spending any more than they do now.

Missed Appointments - DNA

Recently there has been a marked increase in the number of booked appointments where patient's have failed to attend and have not provided adequate notice that they are unable to attend. This results a wasted appointment slot that can not be reallocated to another patient and with the current pressure on available primary health appointments, the level of DNA's is unacceptable.

Accordingly, we have been forced to review our policy in respect of DNA appointments in an attempt to reduce the level and effective immediately the following policy will apply;

- Patients who do not attend (DNA) a booked appointment and have not notified the practice of their impending non-attendance will be charged for the normal cost the appointment.
- If a patient notifies the practice at least 60 minutes before an appointment that they are unable to attend, they will not be charged.
- On occasions there may be extenuating circumstances resulting in a DNA and these may be taken into account on a case by case basis.

Letting Go and Moving on After a Legal Dispute or Conflict

Disputes or conflict of any kind in life can be deeply unsettling, and emotions often run high. This is particularly so in legal settings with conflict between family members but also disputes in civil legal settings such as business or employment disputes, for instance.

For some, even after the conflict has been settled or faded away, the feelings themselves and heavy emotions aren't resolved, and people sometimes struggle to put it behind them. I personally don't think how to let go and move on from legal conflict is talked about enough. Hopefully readers can take something useful out of this including for conflict in other areas of their life..

I can always tell which party has already moved on during a legal dispute, and which one can't let go. Spoiler alert: in my experience, the one who's moved on has chosen peace by disengaging and walking away to protect their energy and emotional wellbeing, while the one who hasn't often engages in a bitter pattern of behaviour focused on revenge and hurting or figuratively 'crushing' the other person, and sometimes those around them, with whatever tactics they can.

Hardly ever do we find mutual agreement on resolution at the outset. There's a bit of broad psychology behind holding on to conflict and being unable to move on including:

Unresolved Emotions: Emotions like anger, betrayal, grief or humiliation can linger and cloud a person's judgment making it difficult for them to move on.

Need for Validation: Not having their pain or point of view acknowledged, or that they are 'right', can prevent people moving on. Without validation a person can stay trapped by the conflict, endlessly reliving it. Sometimes they keep it going through others around them in search of clarity or support.

Identity Attachment: Conflict often attaches to sense of self, especially when there's a perceived sense of humiliation, injustice or not 'winning'. Sometimes, clinging to the 'known' conflict is an excuse a person unconsciously uses to put off having to deal with the 'unknowns' of other

problems and heavy emotions and feelings like fear and grief.

Fear of Vulnerability: Letting go of hurt, anger and perceived betrayal can feel like admitting defeat. Fear of vulnerability in the process of letting go can also open up other big emotions that can be really hard to process.

People who struggle to let go and move on during or after legal conflict often fall into what I call closed thinking loops: repeatedly replaying events in their mind that reinforce their version of the story and clinging to the belief that they are right, and the other person is wrong, or that 'justice' hasn't been served. This pattern of thinking blinds them to considering other perspectives or admitting to themselves that perhaps they might have contributed to the conflict and its outcome.

Oftentimes things are done and words said that can never be taken back. Suddenly the bridge to understanding becomes irreparable and they look to blame wherever and whoever they can.

Denial and deflection (and sometimes rage) to save face becomes the default position because it feels easier than confronting the truth and the sometimes big emotions and feelings that come with it. Over time, these patterns can take over, making it difficult to know how to let go and move on.

It's rare that all parties to a legal dispute are happy with the outcome, for one reason or another. But it's important to know that letting go and moving on doesn't mean forgetting or excusing what happened. Rather, I think letting go of conflict means taking time to accept and grieve what has happened, acknowledge that rightly or wrongly there are other views different to yours (and that's okay, even if you don't agree).

I think letting go also means that in your heart you feel or know that you have done the right thing. Moving on from conflict then becomes an intentional forward-looking focus, and a redirection of your inner energy toward choosing peace, connection and finding joy again.
