#### Age Concern

I attended a Regional Manager's Hui in Rototuna, Hamilton, on the 6th of August. Managers from Hamilton, Taranaki, Tauranga and Rotorua were in attendance and the day was about sharing what we are doing in our local area and about problem solving issues we had. They were all amazed at the amount of work, and number of programmes, we were able to sustain with the small staff available and recognised how hard they all work to achieve such a wide variety of programmes.

The common theme was the difficulty attracting sufficient funding to maintain those programmes and staff wages although most of them had National contracts, like Elder Abuse, which gave them a large financial backing for staff and resources.

The event that is taking up most of our time now is preparation for the Positive Ageing Expo which will be held at Parksyde on the 27th of September. To date we have 27 stall holders, of which 5 are businesses that are expected to pay, and the rest are free. Entry to the event is also free and there will be a variety of Not-for-Profit groups and something for everyone to learn from and take away. There will be something for elderly and for those approaching their elderly status.

Some of the stalls at the Expo are Age Concern, Seniornet, Heart Foundation, Parksyde, Maori Women's Health League, Multi-Cultural Council, Hospice, Lara Lodge, Cantabria, Eye Health Day stay, Resonate Ear Health, Grey Power, Coffin Club, Collingwood Funeral Home, Probus, U3A, Genealogy Society to name a few.

Welcoming Week will be celebrated in New Zealand from 5 to 14 September 2025. It is led by Immigration New Zealand in partnership with the Ministry for Ethnic Communities. In Rotorua, the Rotorua Library is taking the lead in coordinating events being planned by various organizations. The Rotorua Multicultural Council's contribution will include a Welcome to Rotorua

Swarm Season is Coming! Contact us for collection 027 481 5230 seminar being held at the Library on Saturday, 13 September 2025 from 11 am to 3 pm.

This is an invitation for me to speak at 2.30 pm to welcome migrants to Rotorua and to talk to them about the services available to seniors in our city and what is available to the 55+ or 65+ year old new residents of Rotorua.

About 20% of retirees do not own their own home, a rate expected to double over the next 30 years. What happens to those seniors when they find themselves priced out of retirement villages?

Abbeyfield Hornby house is a communal living centre for seniors. A resident, a sprightly 92, has called it home for a decade. On this day, armed with her Total Mobility taxi card and walking stick, she is heading out to a doctor's appointment. The cab is on its way. The lounge, kitchen and dining area of Abbeyfield Palmerston North house. The setup is like many other Abbeyfield homes.

Flatting is typically a young person's game, but Abbeyfield is a registered community housing provider offering communal living for over 65s. It targets people whose main income is superannuation but who do not qualify for social housing. It is a style of living that is growing fast as more seniors retire without owning a home and find themselves priced out of retirement villages.

There are now 15 such homes across the country. Nine of them are in the South Island and three in greater Christchurch – Hornby, Wigram and Leeston. The aim is to combat loneliness, and provide a safe, secure home for residents live out their lives independently, with companionship.

Abbeyfield rents are about \$485 a week. This covers the costs of two employees providing cleaning services, three meals a day, and other general expenses. Residents who rely on a standard single-person pension have \$53 a week left over. The homes have individual studios with en suites, a communal lounge, laundry, and breakaway room. The kitchen is off-limits for safety reasons. The rent does not cover healthcare, and residents have to do their own laundry and keep their studios clean and tidy.

About 20% of retirees, roughly 166,000 people, do not own their own home, according to Stats NZ. With the ageing population, this is expected to increase to about 600,000 seniors (40%) by 2055.

Auckland's shortage of quality, affordable rental housing for older people has received a significant boost recently with the opening of Haumaru Housing's new Greenslade Court apartment complex in Northcote – a purpose-built development offering warm, dry homes for seniors in the heart of a revitalized community.

The five-storey building provides 52 one-bedroom rental apartments, designed specifically for older tenants. Demand has been high, with all 55 new residents (including three couples) due to move in by the end of August. Developed in collaboration with Kāinga Ora, Auckland Council and the Ministry of Housing and Urban Development, the construction of the Greenslade Court building was completed in just 12 months. All tenants qualify for the Income Related Rent Subsidy, thus easing their financial burden.

#### Interest rates down, more work to do

New Zealand's economy is changing for the better, showing the work the Government is doing to help communities like Ngongotahā is working.

The Reserve Bank in August announced it was reducing the Official Cash Rate (OCR) from 3.25 to 3 per cent and signalled two more cuts this year.

This latest drop means it has fallen from 5.5 per cent to 3 per cent in just a year. For homeowners like many of you it means the easing of financial stresses - when this Government first came in two years ago, one-year fixed home mortgage interest rates were at 7.73 per cent. Now, it's about 4.79 per cent. For a \$500,000, 25-year loan that's a significant saving of \$419 a fortnight.

Things are looking positive going forward, with headline inflation expected to return to around the 2 percent target midpoint by mid-2026.

I also know how power costs put strain on your budgets – both at home and at work - and this Government is pushing for affordable, reliable electricity.

The Electricity Authority recently agreed to a new rule that will level the playing field for smaller power companies, boost retail competition to put downward pressure on power prices. It was developed under the Energy Competition Task Force, established a year ago. The new non-discrimination rule will be consulted on later this year.

There is still more to do to make your lives easier and myself and my colleagues will continue to work sensibly, cut costs and lead with strong fiscal management. As Rotorua's MP I value that when locals can thrive, so too do their businesses, employees, families and communities.

#### **Kaharoa School Orientation Days:**

We recently held an information evening, followed by an open day later in the week, for any prospective students considering Kaharoa School as an option in 2026. These orientation events included school tours, information sessions, some fun activities, and a free sausage sizzle. Many students and their families attended and we look forward to welcoming some of them to our kura next year.



**Scientist for a Day**: This is an experience we started back in 2017 to give our learners an opportunity to see how the world of science is in many jobs and careers. Our parents and community members were invited to share with our tamariki how science is evident in their jobs, and to share the passion and wonderment science brings to their world. We are grateful for the support of the families and organisations in our community who supported this event.



**Projects**: The PTA have generously funded a revitalisation of the **junior sandpit** in the front corner of the school. As part of this redevelopment, there has been a new fence built along the corner of the playground as this is a dangerous place for children to cross the road, especially when wet.



With council funding we have developed the tree grove and boardwalk (in 2024). The final piece of this project is the '**Tipuna Project**', where we are having sign boards made that tell the local stories students are learning at school in line with the Aotearoa NZ Histories curriculum.

As part of our school **values** redevelopment, the students created logos and pictures representing each of the values. Some of their ideas will be incorporated into the final designs.

Building of the **Year 8 Legacy Project** - a 'wall ball' court, has begun. Students are looking forward to being able to use this when it is complete (see photo to the left of initial construction).

**Disco**: The PTA ran a **SUPER HEROES & IDOLS DISCO** at the start of September. There was a lot of fun to be had, with some wonderful costumes and accessories, yummy food, and of course some great dance moves!



**Sports Camp**: A group of intermediate tamariki from Kaharoa and Selwyn Schools have been training hard in preparation for Sports Camp at Tōtara Springs near the end of this term. They will be competing against other schools from around the North Island in a range of different sports.





The "partnership" with Ngati Rangiwewehi and how it affects rates might also be of interest given Ngongotaha's water is supplied from 'Taniwha Springs'.

Council's housing policy may be of concern in light of the recent subdivision - particularly the adoption of Medium Density Residential Standards without public consultation.


The council's first thought should be "Ensure Ngongotaha residents are consulted before decisions are made"

Ryan Gray Is Ngongotahā ready for growth? With new housing developments and more people on the way, you might think the answer is "No!" Kia ora, my family has lived around Ngongotahā for generations. It's no surprise to anyone reading this that the main road

through our village is busier than ever. With more homes being built and more people commuting to and from Tauranga, that traffic is only going to increase. Growth isn't a bad thing. It means more customers for our local cafes and shops, more players for our football, league, and bowling clubs. There are a whole raft of more issues there but I don't feel Ngongotaha are being listened to often enough.

Reynold MacPherson 6 Issues Highlighting the Need for Better Planning 1. Flooding and Stormwater Risks - The Village remains exposed to flooding, with outdated stormwater infrastructure below the Waiteti Bridge. This shows the urgent need for long-term planning and investment in resilient flood protection. 2. Infrastructure and Traffic Pressures - Growth is outpacing roads, schools, and essential services. Without integrated planning, Ngongotahā risks becoming overburdened and unsafe. 3. Limited Public Consultation - Decisions on housing and development have lacked transparency. Stronger, community-driven planning is needed to rebuild trust and ensure local voices shape the Village's future. 4. Environmental and Cultural Concerns - Soil contamination on the Ngongotaha Housing Development site, impacts on waterways, and protection of culturally significant sites highlight the need for planning that safeguards both the environment and cultural heritage. 5. Housing Development Challenges – While new housing is essential, projects are being pushed through without adequate safeguards, fair land costs, or proper integration with infrastructure—clear evidence of weak planning. 6.The Ngongotahā Development Framework - Though some consultation has occurred, there is widespread concern over the Village's direction. A truly robust, locally supported plan is required to balance housing, industry, environment, and community needs.









#### Candidates for Rotorua Rural Community Board

Rachel Bidois Since being intricately involved with saving our Mamaku War Memorial Hall from demolition, I have gained a wider appreciation for issues facing ALL our Rural communities. Every community has its unique 'feel' to it. And Ngongotaha has always had a semi-rural feel, even though it's mainly classified as Urban. The village is an absolute gem, and I can only imagine the concern of the residents to try and keep this gem as it is faced with a housing development of 320 new homes. Issues arising from this that are obvious concerns are:

Infrastructure - how is the village roading going to cope? It's a bottle-neck through the centre already.

Schools - more traffic means more risks for the children. Classroom capacities and physical space requirements are a concern. Medical facilities - can they cope with such an influx of new population?

In other areas, more work needs to be done with core infrastructure to help alleviate and prevent flooding. For some, this is a constant worry.

Where at all possible, I will add my voice to ensure the views of Ngongotaha are heard.





Karen Forlong Should I be successful in my endeavours to join the Rural Community Board I recognise that there will be issues and concerns facing the residents of Ngongotaha and its wider community that I am not familiar with, however my focus would be to ensure this quickly changed. I would see my position as one where 'my ears would be open and my phone always on'! In so doing, I would endeavour to quickly come up to speed with any matters that needed representation or advocacy through the Board to our Rural Councillor Karen Barker.

The purpose of the Board is to be a conduit between Community and Council. I believe skills honed through governance roles within Dairy Women's Network and Vetora BoP will allow me to deliver in this area. Connection is the cornerstone of our rural communities. Its people, their halls, schools and services are all a vital part of this tapestry. I have resided in the Atiamuri area for 30 years, Dairy farming and raising my family. Rural New Zealand is a passion, with Rotorua and the surrounding areas being first and foremost.

Tina Rose 1) Infrastructure. This is becoming a major problem. The road in and out of Ngongotaha has become so congested during rush hours. It is also a safety issue for school children especially when crossing the main road. This should possibly be a 30km whilst there is so much traffic going through the village.

2) With the new housing development of about 320 new houses this problem will increase, roads will come under more pressure and deteriorate more frequently.

The school will not have the capacity to accommodate all the children who are likely to move into the area, and HEALTH Facilities will become even more stretched. I do not believe adequate planning and discussions were undertaken before the project began.

3) Ngongotaha Floods. This is another major risk to some areas of the community. Flood banks need to be worked on as does the flow out to the lake and in extreme weather the lake level needs to be controlled better with the use of the lake stop logs at the Ohau Channel weir.

# When behavioural tendencies impact legal conflict or disputes

I've written a few pieces this year about the human element when it comes to disputes or conflict in the legal arena. In my last article I wrote about how hard it is to let go after legal conflict and how sometimes people are unable to consider other perspectives or realise their part in conflict, may engage in denial and deflection (and sometimes rage), and place blame everywhere else but at their feet to preserve their view of things and themselves.

Sometimes these behaviours also appear in other areas of people's lives such as domestic relationships, family violence, custody, and workplaces. The behaviours are also increasingly recognised in 'power roles' such as law, politics, media, celebrity, people who run companies, leaders and managers. Ultimately, this is about preservation of self, and power and control over others. Today I'm writing about what I refer to as the 'phenomenon of narcissism' and how it shows up in legal conflict or disputes.

Also known as coercive control, narcissism is a popularised term unofficially describing a common group of emotional and manipulative behavioural tendencies masking underlying insecurity and a deep need for admiration, power and control over others or a particular situation. It shows up as overt or covert manipulative, intimidating, and isolating behaviour (eg: physical, verbal, financial, emotional) that aims to dominate and control. The behaviour is essentially bullying by a sustained pattern of subtle and gradual abuse that chips away at a person's autonomy and self-worth and makes the abuser feel more powerful.

Note it's important to distinguish between the loosely used term "narcissism" describing broad common behavioural traits as I have here, with a clinical diagnosis of Narcissistic Personality Disorder which is a serious psychological disorder well beyond my expertise or this article. Note, too, reference to the word 'narcissism' isn't used in the public arena (eg courts, media), more the behavioural traits themselves.

Unfortunately, when someone with narcissistic behavioural traits is involved in a legal dispute the whole process can become another platform for manipulation, control, and emotional 'lawfare' that continues the abuse and trauma cycle. However, understanding and recognising the

dynamic can help keep you grounded through the process, particularly when you start seeing strategic power imbalance tactics like any or all of the below:

- Using the legal system to punish or exhaust the other party emotionally and financially, may engage in excessive court filings or counter-parenting tactics
- Engages in reputational attacks, nasty snipes, passive aggressive comments cementing and escalating conflict
- Twisting facts, creating false narratives or manufactured scenarios to distort reality and gain an advantage (anecdotally known as 'gaslighting')
- Stonewalling or won't budge on trying to resolve some of the issues
- Accusing or blaming others of behaviours they are guilty of engaging in themselves (e.g., dishonesty, manipulation, psychological violence)
- Flat out denial of their previous words or actions aiming to selfpreserve and cause confusion and self-doubt in others' recollections
- Engages in 'rage' responses to self-preserve when presented with facts or the truth (must be right and seen to be right, cannot be wrong)
- Enlists enablers who vicariously help manipulate, control, or punish by spreading gossip, creating drama, and acting as 'spies' that report back (anecdotally known as 'flying monkeys' hailing from the winged monkeys in The Wizard of Oz)
- Painting themselves as the 'wronged party' to gain sympathy and deflect accountability for their actions (while painting the other party as 'bad')
- Ignores or drags out complying with court directions, makes unreasonable demands
- Triangulates random issues or allegations to shift focus away from their behaviour
- Appears calm and cooperative in court to contrast with the other party's emotional distress.

Unfortunately, these sorts of behaviours can have a significant emotional and financial impact on parties to the conflict, not to mention impacting the trajectory and escalation of the dispute and court time and resources. I have no doubt the court also recognises the behaviour, too. My advice? Watch your behaviour, don't engage in like for like, stay grounded, and don't be 'that' person.


